The QUEEN has been graciously pleased to give orders for the following appointment to the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire:

To be an Additional Member of the Civil Division of the said Most Excellent Order, for Gallantry:

Frances Mary, Mrs. CASTLEDINE, lately Nursing Sister, Ashford General Hospital.

Following the crash of a Trident aircraft which killed all the passengers and crew members, Mrs. Castledine was one of the first to arrive at the scene of the disaster. Several thousand gallons of aviation fuel had been spilled around the site, but regardless of her own safety, she climbed into the wreckage of the aircraft to render first-aid or other assistance to those trapped inside. She continued with this work although the firemen present warned her that there was great risk that the wreckage might burst into flames at any moment. It was Mrs. Castledine who took charge of the one person who, for a short time survived the crash. She gave him first-aid and splinted the man's badly fractured legs with pieces of metal from the aircraft. As passengers and crew were removed from the aircraft she checked them for signs of life and assisted in laying out and covering the dead before the bodies were removed to the mortuary. Mrs. Castledine worked in and around the wreckage in heavy rain for about two hours in an atmosphere which was heavy with the vapour of aviation fuel. By carrying out her work in appalling and potentially dangerous conditions Mrs. Castledine displayed courage and devotion of a very high order.
