Falmouth, April 6.

He 3d inftant came in here the Samuel and Mary of Briftol from Virginia laden with Tobacco, intending for Holland, telling us of the fruitfulnefs of this laft year, but that a great ficknefs has been lately amongst the Vlanters.

Briftol, April 9. Here are lately arrived from Kirginia, the Richard of this place, the Concord, the Iryal, and the Loves encreafe, all of them laden with Tobacco., The John and Mary of London from Lisbonne with Oyl and Sugars, the Prince trom Rochelle with Salt and Wine; the Charles of Minehead from Fyal, and the William and James of London from Mevis.

Plymouth, April 10. This day arrived here the Advice Pregat bound for Tangier, the St George of London for Bilboa, and the Italian Merchant of London for the streights.

Ueymouth, April 11. The tenth inflant arrived here two fmall veffels of this Port from *Rochelle*, but heard not any thing of any Turks men of war in the *Ghannel*, one of them only mer with a French Merchant thip who had been outwards bound, but fpringing his main Maft, was forced to bear home again for *France*, who told him, that off the *Burlings* he met with an *Argier* man of war, which adviled him to haften away, for that there was a *Sally* man of war neer him.

Vienna, April 5. Several Papers of importance were found at the feifure of the Count de Tattenbach, which have made a great difcovery of the whole defign of the Count Serini: the fame party which feized his perfon at an Affembly of the States of Stiria, found in the fearch of one of his houses, 100 thousand Rixdollats, and above as many French Crowns, with Arms for 5000 men.

Father Forstal who was employd hither by the Count Serini to mediate for hit reconciliation, was difinist the Court on Wednelday last without any fatisfactory answer. Prince Lobkowitz only writing to the faid Count a Letter, but in fuch general terms, as will give him but little reason to prefume of the Emperours favour.

This week arrived here in post from Carelstadt the Count de Paradeis, giving the Emperour this account, that the Marquis Frangipani the Count Serini's brotherin-law, was with a confiderable body advanced neer the Town of Zagrabiato fummon the inhabitants to joyn with the Count Scrini, but the Count d' Herbersflein, the General of Croatia, and Governour of Garelstadt, having intelligence of their motion, had drawn together a body of 3500 horfe, with whom he fell with much courage upon the Marquis, and after a tharp dispute defeated him, who with much difficulty faved himself, in this encounter was feiled a Turkish Aga, with feveral Letters of importance written to him by Count Serini.

Since this defest, Count Serini is with the faid Marquis and about 2000 men tetired into the Fort of Czakonthurne, where the Count d' Herberftein is invefting him with an Army of about 8000 men, thereft of the Imperial forces marching from all places to form a Siege and oblige him to a Surrender.

The Count Serini has by his Letters to the Bilhop of Neufladt, defined to interorde with the Emperor for his pardon. The Hereditary Provinces are raifing forces for the Emperors fervice, whole Army will in little time be encreated so 30 thouland mena befides the forces which are in the leveral Garrilons.

in the leveral Garrilons. Upon the news of these diforders in Hungary, he Electors of Saxony and Brandenburg have sent to offer their affiftance to the, Emperor for the reducing that kingdom to his obedience.

Venice, April 5. Upon the News of the arrival of our Captain-General Mor fini, in Istria, feveral Barks were immediately ordered out to attend him hicker, but were hindred from putting our by contrary winds. On Munday laft the laid Generaliflimo arrived here, fourty Barks filled with his Relations, and the Officers which had ferved, under his Command went out to meet him, and conducted him to this City. Six other Ships which came out with him from the Levant, are yet at Istria, whereon are embarked above 2000 Souldiers , and above 60 Officers ; who, being most of them Germans, it is thought fit to land them at Triefte, being the most convenient Port, from whence they may march with most fpeed to the Emperors Service, who has recalled all the Officers and Souldiers employed in the Service of this Republick, and intends to make use of them for the reducing the Kingdom of Hungary to his Obedience.

General Heifter, and Count Veterani intend to leave this place on Munday next; Count Portia fuddenly may follow them with his Regiments, and the other German Souldiers are here remaining.

Prince Eueff of Brunfwick Lunenbourg, lately arrived here from Rome, is lending away his Train for Germany, and will in few dayes follow in perfon.

The Marquifs de St. Andre Montbrun continues yet in the lervice of this Republics, and is ftill at Corfu, taking care of the Fortifications both there and in Cepha-Ionia.

A Veffel lately arrived at Corfu from Candia, affirms, That the Turkith Fleet was daily expected there from Nigroponte, to attend the Visier to Salonicha.

Hague, April 18. The Duke of Lorrain has employed hither one of his Counfel the Heer Kifencourt, who was yefterday admitted to his Audience, where having communicated his Letters of Credence, he gave thanks in his Mafters name to the States, for the free offer of their Mediation in the differences with the Prince Elector Palatine : declaring the Duke his Mafters treadings to fubmitall his intereft to their arbitration.

The Rhinegrave feems to be very apprehensive leb fome design may be formed against Maesfricht, the place of his Government, upon information given him that the Prince of Conde is designed to command a considerable body of an Army about Charleroy.

The Spanith Ambaffador has by a late Memorial prefented to the States, difcovered alfo the like apprehenfion, and that the Conflable of *Caffil.e* is not fully fatisfy'd with the intentions of the French, and therefore prefles them to reinforce their Garrifons on the frontiers, and to angment the number of their recruiss the Five thoufand already refolved on, being supposed by him to be too fmall a number, confidering the prefert patture of affairs.

Upon the defires of the Rhinegrave, the States have ordered the Heer Bredrodes Troop, and one other greater Troop
