Milan, October 15. N. S.

ON the 13th Instant Count Tarni, who hath been at the Imperial Court with the Character of Envoy from his Royal Highness to his Imperial Majesty, pass'd through this City in his way to Turin from Vienna. Yesterday the Coaches, Horses and Equipage belonging to Prince Eugene, set out from hence for Flanders. The last Letters from Turin advise, that the Duke of Savoy held frequent Councils on the present posture of Affairs, and was particularly intent upon taking the necessary Measures for recruiting his Army, and regulating the Winter Quarters for the Troops that are returned out of Savoy. Some of these Forces have been sent towards Susa, but the rest continue in the Neighbourhood of Yvrée. These Letters add, that Count Thaun was still at Turin; and his Catholick Majesty had bestowed on him the Principality of Tiano, in the Kingdom of Naples, as an Acknowledgment for his faithful Services. The French Troops continue their March towards Briançon, and have detached two Bodies to be sent into the Vallies of Queiras and Barcelonette. The Confederates have, on the other side, reinforced the Garrison of Fenestrelles, and have ordered two Battalions to march towards Pignerol, for the Security of the Valley of St. Martin.

Berne, October 18. N. S. It was believed that such Methods had been taken concerning the Affair of Tockenburgh, that it would have been speedily accommodated; but the Roman Catholick Priests of that County use their utmost Endeavours to engage the People to submit wholly to the Opinion of those of the Arbitrators who are Papists. The new Council, who have taken upon them the Regency of that County, being advised that the Abbot of St. Gall was providing great quantities of Ammunition and other Stores for his Castle, have set a Guard to every Passage of that Fortrefs, that nothing may be carried into it without their Knowledge and Approbation. Count Trautmansdorf hath given into the Canton of Zurich his Imperial Majesty's Answer to the Letter of Complaint, which was sent him by the General Diet of the Cantons, concerning Count Mercy's March through the Territories of Basil. We are assured that this Answer is expressed in very obliging Terms. The Canton of Basil intends to send two of their Deputies to the French Ambassador at Soleure, to complain of the Proceedings of his most Christian Majesty's Subjects, in retaining the Corn in Alsatia, which belongs to that Canton.

Hamburg, October 25. N. S. They write from Hannover, that on the 21st Instant the Elector, her Electoral Highness the Princess Sophia, and Prince Ernest went to Gevre, where his Electoral Highness designs to stay during the Season of Hunting. The Prince-Royal of Prussia is also on his Journey thither. Advices from Berlin say, that his Czarish Majesty and King Augustus had an Interview near Thorn, and that the King of Prussia was set out from Wolup on his Journey to Marienwerder, which is appointed to be the Place where these three Princes are to meet. The Prince Hereditary of Muscovy attended the Czar, and it was believed he would come to Berlin, and stay some days in that Court. The Danish Troops that came from Hungary have been recruited in Holstein. The King of Denmark hath declared Monsieur Griefe Commissary-General of War. The Artillery which was at Rensbourg is arrived at Copenhagen; and we hear that ten thousand Men who

were in Norway have received Orders to march towards Bahus. We hear that King Stanislaus arrived on the 20th Instant at Stralfond; and that General Meyerfield, who came to the same Place the Day following, was preparing to continue his Journey to Stockholm. General Crassut hath marched his Army through Brandenburg into Pomerania, and is encamp'd at Woldin to prevent any Incursions which might otherwise be made by the Muscovites on that Frontier.

Brussels, October 29. N. S. On Saturday the 26th Instant the Confederate Army decamp'd, and, having pass'd the Rhine, came to Thicuffes, where they continued on the 27th, which was observed as a Day of Thanksgiving to the King of Prussia; and on Friday Morning the Troop General Crassut march'd into his respective Winter Quarters. The Duke of Marlborough led the Army at the same time, and arriv'd about 10 or 12 Miles Place, from whence he designs to set out on Friday next, together with the Prince of Savoy, for the Hague. The Enemies Troops are likewise decamp'd, and march'd towards their Quarters.

Hague, October 29. N. S. Our last Advices say, that when the Garrison of Mons march'd out, most of the Walloons continued in the Town, and enter'd themselves into the Service of the Allies. The Troops belonging to the Household of the French King separated from the Army on the 22d, and march'd into that Kingdom. On Friday or Saturday next the Duke of Marlborough and Prince Eugene are expected here from Brussels. It is believed that Count Zinzendorf will return at the same time. This Day we received Advice that Lieutenant-General Sparr was dead of his Wounds. Yesterday we had a certain Account of General Crassut's march into Pomerania, having in the Night made a Motion into the Territories of the King of Prussia. The last Letters from the North say, that the Danes continue their Warlike Preparations, but had not yet published any Declaration, or committed any Acts of Hostility against Sweden.

Falmouth, October 20. On the 17th fail'd to Cruise the Tin-Pot, Dolphin, and the Phoenix, Privateers of Flushing. On the 18th fail'd the Raby Galley of London for Barcelona. Yesterday put in here a Dogger from Cork for Ostend, and a Spaniard from Bilbao for London; with the Golden Cock of Holstein for this Place, with Pipe Staves.

Dartmouth, October 21. On the 18th Instant came in here from Plymouth (under Convoy of her Majesty's Ship the Breda, which put into Torbay) several Coasters bound for the Eastward, viz. the Unity, of and for Portsmouth; the Union, of and for Livingston; the John and Thomas, of and for Hampton; the Success, of and for London; the Chichester, of and for Chichester, all in Ballast; the John and Elizabeth of this Place from Falmouth, being one of the Transports from St. Maloes. The same Day came in a small Vessel of and from Guernsey, with Salt for Plymouth.

Plymouth, October 21. On the 19th came in the Fortune of and from Jersey with Salt for this Place; and a Dutch Ship with Wine and Brandy from Nants; and the Maria of and for Rye with Fruit, from Mallaga. This Day came in a Sweed with Wine from Bourdeaux.

Yarmouth, October 21. This Day fail'd two Ships with red Herrings for Rotterdam. There continue in our Road her Majesty's Ships the Falkstone and Advice's Prize; and also the Adventure and Lively, with a Dutch Galley

Galley and a Hamburg; or Tiden with Herrings for the S. reigns.

Portsmouth, October 23. Yesterday her Majesty's Ship the Breda came up to Spithead from Plymouth; where are also her Majesty's Ships the Burford, Elizabeth, Ranelagh, Nottingham and Dartmouth.

Thomas Earl of Pembroke and Montgomery, &c. Lord High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, &c. having ordered the Men belonging to the Assistance and Northumberland to be removed into other of her Majesty's Ships at Portsmouth, his Lordship is therefore pleased to direct, that all the Men belonging to the said Ships Assistance and Northumberland, which are in and about London, do immediately repair to Portsmouth, and so they may be put on Board the Ships they are to be removed to (where they will be paid) otherwise they will forfeit their Wages, and be taken up, and punished as Deserters.

Whereas frequent Applications have been made to the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, &c. for the Discharge of Men from her Majesty's Ships, on account of their being by Age, or other Infirmities, rendered incapable for further Service, and on several other Pretences, which Applications do much interrupt the carrying on the Publick, and consequently more necessary Services: And whereas there is reason to believe, that several Persons, for the sake of private Advantage, have occasioned these so frequent Applications, and that Affidavits have been made, wherein the Circumstances of many Men are very much misrepresented, it often having appeared to be so, when conditional Orders have been sent to the Captains of the Ships whereto the Men do belong: His Lordship hath therefore thought it necessary to direct, that whenever the Captains of Her Majesty's Ships or Vessels shall find any Man or Men unfit for longer Service, either by Age, Wounds, or other Infirmities, they do forthwith discharge them, that so the Crown may not be put to the unnecessary Expence of maintaining those in Wages and Victuals, who are not capable of earning the same; and that they insert in their Tickets the reason of their Discharge. And for preventing Irregularities in impressing Men for the Service of Her Majesty's Fleet, his Lordship doth hereby strictly charge and require, not only the Commanders, but Lieutenants and Officers of Her Majesty's Ships, that they do not impress any Persons whatsoever, who are not qualified and capable to do Her Majesty's Service at Sea; nor any who are actually servants by Indentures to Tradesmen, or Apprentices, or others that do actually serve in Ships or Vessels who are or shall be provided for such Service, pursuant to a late Act of Parliament in that behalf, unless the Commanders or Officers of the said Ships and Vessels of Her Majesty's shall be fully satisfied the said Persons have formerly been in the publick service, and that they deserted the same.

The Lord High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, &c. doth hereby strictly charge and require the Foremast-men belonging to her Majesty's Ship the Canterbury, which are now in Town, immediately to repair on Board her Majesty's Ship the Hampton-Court in Longreach, in which Ship they are to serve, and will be paid their Wages for their Service in the said Ship the Canterbury, on Board the aforesaid Ship Hampton-Court.

My Lord High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, &c. is pleased to direct, that all such Men belonging to her Majesty's Ships the Swiftsure at Chatham, the Alborough and Nightingale at Sheerness, and the Scarborough at Deptford, as are in and about Town, do forthwith repair to their respective Duties, otherwise they will be taken up, and punished as Deserters.
