The humble Address of the Bailiffs, Burgesse and Commonality of the Town of Ipswich in the County of Suffolk.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE presume in Duty to your Majesty to offer our humble Acknowledgments for your Royal Care, the happy Cause of the late remarkable Successes of your Forces, under the Command of his Grace John Duke of Marlborough.

The Influence of your Majesty's Favour to that Great General (whose Bravery and Conduct you have so often experienced) inspires him with Resolutions to encounter all Hazards, and overcome the nimost Difficulties, to accomplish the just Designs of a Princess, who means the Prosperity of her own Nation, and the Peace and Tranquility of those unfortunate Neighbours who want her Assistance.

And from these Intentions of your sacred Breast, and the Wisdom and Valour of that Heroe, we have Reason to hope for the desired End of all your Victories, which will crown his Glory in the faithful Execution of your Commands, and give your Majesty the highest Delight, as it will be the Satisfaction of your People.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesse of the ancient Corporation of Portsmouth, was presented to her Majesty by Sir John Gibson, Deputy-Governor, being Introduced by Admiral Churchill, one of their Representatives in Parliament.

Which Addresses her Majesty received very graciously.

Libon, October 14. N. S. On the 8th Instant Admiral Baker being arrived off this Coast, sent in a Man of War with Letters to his Excellency the Earl of Gallway; Major-General Wills writ also to his Excellency by my Lord Rochford, who came on Shoar with Colonel Mundy, and several other Officers to wait on him. The next Day his Excellency received Letters dated at Gibraltar from General Stanhope, who failed from thence on the 27th of the last Month, back to Barcelona. My Lord Rochford was immediately dispatched back to acquaint the Admiral with it, who has continued his Voyage up the Streights, with the Forces under his Convoy. General Stanhope has sent hither the Horses belonging to Nabot's Regiment, and the Mules he had brought from Barcelona, which are to be employed towards levying the Regiments that are now raising.

Brussels, November 2. N. S. Yesterday the Duke of Marlborough set out for the Hague, and Prince Eugene, Count Zinzendorf, and the Dutch Deputies, who continue here, design to follow him within two or three days. By Letters from the Frontiers, of the 30th of the last Month, we are advised that the Enemy had a Body of Troops near Maubeuge, and that the Duke of Berwick was in that Place; they add, That the Troops were preparing to separate and follow the rest of the Army into their respective Winter Quarters. Marshal Boufflers is at Valenciennes, where, we hear, he is to continue for some time. The Duke of Bavaria is shortly expected at Namur; though it is believed he will not come thither till

after he has had an Interview with the French King at Versailles. A Deputation from the Province of Hainaul, and the Town of Mons, is now here, in order to receive an Answer to the Propositions they offer by way of Capitulation, which have been referred to the Council of State, appointed for the Government of these Places. A Chamber of Judges is erected to examine into the Circumstances of the Surprise of Ghent and Bruges last Year by the Enemy. Several Persons have been lately imprisoned upon Suspicion of being concerned in that Fact; and it is believed more will be apprehended on the same Account. Portsmouth, October 26. Yesterday in the Afternoon Sir George Byng arrived at St. Hellens on Board her Majesty's Ship the Royal Anne, with the Torbay, Chichester, Colchester and Antelope, and a small Prize taken by the Chichester in her way from Gibraltar. Commodore Smith, on Board her Majesty's Ship the Essex, with the la Firme, are expected here in two or three Days, with the Merchantmen under their Convoy from the Streights. Sir John Norris came down last Night, and hath hoisted his flag on Board the Ranelagh at Spithead.
