Hague, November 8. N. S. Yesterday in the Evening Prince Eugene, accompanied by the Earl of Albemarle; and this Day Lieutenant-General Cadogan, with several other Generals Officers, arrived here. The Duke of Marlborough hath ordered the Yachts to fall down to Helvoetsdijks to Morrow, and designs to embark for England next Monday. The States have lately published three Edicts, one to prohibit all Traders to Dantzick to transport any Merchandize from thence, but Corn, and that under certain Restrictions mentioned in that Proclamation. The second repeats the Prohibition to transport that Commodity into the Enemy's Country, and promises a Reward of two thousand Florins to such as shall discover any who have already, or shall for the future offend in this kind. The third relates to the French Refugees who are settled in this Country, and excludes all their Relations in France from inheriting the Effects which those Refugees either brought from thence, or have acquired here, since they and their Children are disinherited in France after the same manner. Next Week the States of Holland are to assemble, in order to settle the State of the War (which will then be ready to be laid before them,) as also the Funds which are necessary for defraying the Expence of it. We hear that immediately on the Duke of Anjou's Arrival at Madrid, his Council took a Resolution to make a considerable Augmentation of his Infantry and Cavalry; and Orders were forthwith dispatched to the several Regiments to proceed in new Levies accordingly. We hear from Hannover, that the Electoral Princess was delivered of a Daughter on the 2d Instant, which was baptized on the 4th, and called Anne, in Honour to her Majesty of Great Britain.

Edinburgh, October 22. The Price of Corn is very much abated in this City, by reason of the plentiful Harvest we have had throughout North Britain.

Thomas Earl of Pembroke and Montgomery, &c.
