And it being set forth by the said Presentment, That a Man of War belonging to the City of *Hamborough*, now in the *Hope*, had sent some of his Men to a Fly-Boat which came lately from the East-Country, and that the Men were returned to the said Man of War, Her Majesty is thereupon further pleased to Order, that the said Man of War belonging to the City of *Hamborough* be under the Rules of the Quarantain for so long a time as she shall stay in the *Hope*, and that he be not permitted to Land any Men, or suffer any to come on Board during that time; and also whatever Ships hereafter shall receive any Men or Goods from on Board Ships or Vessels under a Quarantain, shall be compelled to do the like Quarantain; and the Right Honourable the Lord High-Treasurer, and the Right Honourable the Lord High-Admiral, are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

their Goods, according to the Directions of former Orders from this Board; and the Right Honourable the Lord High-Treasurer is to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons and Citizens of the City of *Dublin*.

May it please your Majesty,

Since each Year brings new Glories to your Arms, and Providence continues to adorn your Reign with repeated Conquests, we think it our Duty, most Gracious Sovereign, to renew our Address, and with the highest Respect to congratulate your Majesty on the glorious Successes of this Campaign.

The taking the two important Fortresses of *Tournay* and *Mons*, and the Signal Defeat of the French Troops, notwithstanding the utmost Advantage of Ground and Intrenchments, under the Conduct of the two greatest Commanders of this, or former Ages, his Grace the Duke of *Marlborough*, and the Prince of *Savoy*, must convince your Enemies, that no Power can withstand the Arms of your Majesty and Allies, united for the Defence of the Liberties of Europe, and that nothing can prevent their own Ruin, but a speedy and lasting Peace.

We beg Leave to take this Opportunity of acknowledging the many Blessings we have enjoyed through the whole Course of your Majesty's most auspicious Reign, and especially the Regard you have been pleased to shew for this Kingdom, in committing our Safety and Interest to the Government of his Excellency the Earl of *Wharton*, a Person whose Eminent Capacities and Zeal for the Protestant Interest, render him a fit Representative of the greatest and best of Queens.
