PON reading this Day at the Board a Presentment from the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs to the Right Honourable the Lord High-Treasurer, dated the 25th of this Instant October; Her Majesty, with the Advice of Her Privy-Council, is thereupon pleased to Order, that no Ships from the Baltick, under Quarantain, shall be Discharged therefrom until the Master, or other Person taking Charge of the Ship, shall make Outh of the Health of the Ship before the Mayor or other Magistrate of the Place, as has been formerly used in like Cases. And it being set forth by the faid Presentment, That a Man of War belonging to the City of Hamborough, now in the Hope, had fent some of his Men to a Fly-Boat which came lately from the East-Country, and that the Men were returned to the sad Man of War, Her Majesty is thereupon further pleased to Order, that the said Man of War belonging to the City of Hamborough be under the Rules of the Quarantain for so long a time as she shall stay in the Hope, and that he be not permitted to Land any Men, or fuffer any to come on Board during that time; and allo whatever Ships hereafter shall receive any Men or Goods from on Board Ships or Vessels under a Quarantain, shall be compelled to do the like Quarantain; and the Right Honourable the Lord High-Treasurer, and the Right Honourable the Lord High-Admiral, are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to Order, That where any Difference shall arise between the Officers of Her Majesty's Customs and the Chief Magistrates in any of the Ont-Ports, touching the Places to be appointed for the performance of the Quarantain by Ships coming from the Baltick, or for airing their Goods, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs appoint proper Places in such Out-Ports for the performance of the Quarantain by the faid Ships coming from the Baltick, and for airing their Goods, according to the Directions of former Orders from this Board; and the Right Honourable the Lord High-Treasurer is to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.
