A PROCLAMATION.

W Hereas by our Royal Proclamation of the Ninth Day of June last, we did think fit, for the saving further Charge to the Publick, and for the Ease of our loving Subjects, at that time to put a stop to; and suspend the Imprissing any more Soldiers and Marines into our Service, in pursuance of an Act lately passed in our Parliament, begun, and holden at Westminster on the first day of November last, For the Speedy and Effectual Recruiting our Land-Forces and Marines, for the Service of the Year One thousand seven hundred and nine: And whereas there is now a further Occasion to raise Men for Recruiting our said Forces and Marines, we have thought fit, by and with the Advice of our Privy-Council, to issue forth this our Royal Proclamation, hereby declaring our Will and Pleasure, That the late Suspension and Stop put to the Execution of the said Act be now taken off, And we do hereby strictly Charge and Command all Commissioners, and other our Loving Subjects, who are Authorized to put the said Act in Execution, That they again use their utmost Diligence, to Answer the Ends and Designs of the said Act, pursuant to the Directions of the said Act.

Given at our Court at St. James's this Sixth Day of November, 1709. In the Eighth Year of Our Reign.

St. James's, November 8. This Day her Majesty was pleased to Constitute and Appoint the Right Honourable Edward Earl of Orford, Sir John Leake, Sir George Byng, George Dodington, Esq; and Paul Methuen, Esq; Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High-Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland.

Venice, November 1. N. S. Letters from Naples say, that General Caraffa had given Orders for Fortifications to be built which may Command the Entrance of the Road into the Port of Reggio; and that General Thaun was declared Prince of Tiano in that Kingdom, which Principality was formerly enjoyed by the Prince of Medina Senonia. Advices from Rome say, that those who are in the Interests of the French King, and the Duke of Anjou, seemed to acquiesce in the Pope's Declaration of Charles III. as King of Spain; and that the Cardinals Dadda and Ferrari had set up the Arms of his Catholick Majesty over the Gates of their Palaces; as have all others who have any Possessions in his Majesty's Dominions, except the Prince Burglege, whose Son is arrived here with his Family, and designs to stay for some time in this City.

Copenhagen, November 9. N. S. On the 4th Instant the Troops which are designed for the Expedition on Schonen began to embark in this Port, and yesterday the whole was embarked, consisting of fifteen hundred Horse, fifteen hundred Dragoons, and between eight and nine thousand Foot, besides some Forces of the Militia, which are to continue on Board the Fleet, to make a Desert as occasion shall require. A large Train of Ar-

tillery is also embarked for this Enterprize, and a second Transportation will be made some Weeks hence. His Danish Majesty designs to go in Person. All the Officers were commanded to take Shipping last Night; and it is expected that the King himself, and General Revenlau, who Commands in Chief, will embark this Day. It is not yet known whether his Majesty will be present at the first Landing, or stay at Elsinore. The Muscovite Ambassador, and the Envoy of King Augustus, are to go on Board a Frigate which is appointed to attend their Excellencies.

Berlin, November 9. N. S. Letters from Marienwerder of the 2d Instant say, that the Czar and the King of Prussia continued in that Place, where the Courts were entertained with Banquets, Balls, and other publick Diversions. His Czarish Majesty designed to set out on the 5th Instant for Riga, and his Prussian Majesty the Day following, in order to return to this Place. The Margrave Philip, to whom the Regency of this Kingdom hath been committed during the King's absence, is to receive his Majesty at Swed, which is the Place of his Residence, from whence the King is expected here the latter end of this Week. This Evening the Prince and Princess Royal are expected to return to this Place from the Court of Hanover. It being advised that the Pestilence still rages in some Parts of his Majesty's Dominions, all necessary Precautions have been taken to prevent that Disemper from reaching this City; no Persons are permitted to enter without sufficient Passports, and an Hospital hath been erected without the Town to receive those that may happen to be infected.

Hague, November 15. N. S. The Convoy that waits on the Duke of Marlborough is by his Grace's order fallen down to Helvoet-fluys, in order to Sail with the first fair Wind for England. Prince Eugene continues here, and hath deferred his Journey to Vienna for some Days, because the Duke of Marlborough hath been detained by contrary Winds longer than was expected. Yesterday the States of Holland were assembled, and the State of the War for the Year 1710 hath been already communicated to them; it is not doubted but they will give their Assent to it before they separate. This Regulation hath also been sent to the other Provinces, to receive their Approbation. Count Lecherain is arrived here from Dusseldorp, and will sail for Great Britain within ten Days. The 13th Instant was observed throughout the United Provinces as a Day of Publick Rejoicings and Thanksgiving for the Successes of the last Campaign, and the Standards and Colours taken from the Enemy at the late Battel of Tanniers were exposed to publick View on this occasion. The Frontiers are now in perfect Tranquillity. Advices from the North say, that the King of Denmark's Declaration of War against Sweden had been published; that the Danes had already seized on some of the Swedish Merchantmen; that his Majesty was embarked on the Fleet at Copenhagen, consisting of four hundred Sail, which weighed Anchor on the 9th Instant, and stood towards Schonen. These Advices add, that the King of Denmark had given Orders to his Troops to observe strict Discipline in Schonen, and pay for such Provisions as they should receive from the Inhabitants. We are also advised, that the Swedes have drawn together eighteen thousand Regular Troops in that Province, to oppose this Expedition of the Danes.
