Westminster, November 15.

THE Queen came this Day to the House of Peers; and being, in her Royal Robes, seated on the Throne, with the usual Solemnity, Mr. Aston, D puty Gentleman-Uther of the Black-Rod, was fent with a Message from her Majesty to the House of Commons, requiring their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, her Ma-jefty was pleafed to make the following most gracious Speech to both Houses of Parliament.

My Lords and Gentlemen.

[T is a great Satisfaction to Me, that I am able to give you so good an Account of the Progress of the War since

the last Session of Parliament.

In the beginning of this Year our Enemies made use of all their Artifices to amuse us with false Appearances and de-ceitsul Instructions of their Desire of Peace, in hopes that from thence Means might be found to create some Divisions er Jealousses among the Allies; but they were entirely difappointed in their Expectation, and such Measures were takn upon that Occasion, as made it impossible for them long is disguise their Instructivy. The Operations of the War were mt delay d, and the Campaign, which, notwithstanding the Backwardness of the Season, immediately followed, has been, at least, as glorious for the Allies as any of those which have

God Almighty has been pleased to bless us with a most remarkable Victory, and made such other great and important. Successes, both before and after it, that France is thereby become much more exposed and open to the impression of our Arms, and consequently more in need of a Peace, than it was so the beginning of this Campaign.

However, the War still continuing, I find my self obliged again to desire you. Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

to grant Me such Supplies as you shall judge necessary for the affifting our Allies in all Parts, and the Vigorous Profesuiton of our Advantages, that we may put the last Hand to this great Work of reducing that Exorbitant and Oppresfive Power, which has so long threaten'd the Liberties of Europe.

I assure you, that all you give shall be carefuly applied to the Use of the War, if it continues, or to the lessening of the Debts it has necessarily occasioned, in case of a Peace; which, though the many Wants and Distresses of our Enemies may naturally lead us to expect, yet our own late Experience may fully convince us, is not to be depended upon any other way, than by being in a Condition to compell them to Such Terms as may be safe and honourable for all the Al-

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I think it proper to take Notice to you, that the great Dearth and Scarcity under which our Neighbours Abroad bave suffered this Year, begins to affect us in some Measure at Home, by the Temptation of Prose, in carrying out 100 much of our Corn, while it bears fo high a Price in foreign

This eccasions many Complaints from the Poor, for whose Jake I earnestly recommend to you to take this growing Evil into your Confideration, having not neglected any thing on my Part towards the remedying of it that the Law would I cannot conclude without observing to you, of what great Advantage it will be at this time, to the End we all pro-pose to our selves, that the greatest Dispatch be given to the necessary Preparations for carrying on the War.

St. fames's, November 15. The Baron Rolencrantz, Envoy-Extraordinary from the King of Denmark (being introduced by the Right Honourable Mr. Secretary Boyle, and conducted by Sir Charles Cortrell, Mafter of the Ceremonies) had this Evening his first priva e Audience of her Majesty.

The humble Address of the Sheriss. Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, and others the Freeholders of the County of Gallway; was transmitted from Ireland, and presented to her Majesty by his Excellency the Earl of Wharton, Lord-Lieuterant of that Kingdom.

Which Address her Majesty received very graciousty.

Hague, November 15. N. S. On the 11th Instant the Swiss Company which lay here in Garrison marched from hence, and on the same Day the Horse Guards marched into this Place. On the 12th Monsieur Pettecum, Resident of the Prince of Holstein-Gottorp, went from hence, but his Return is suddenly expected. The 13th was observed as a Day of Thankigiving for the great Successes of the last Campaign, where Prince Eugene and several other General Officers affilted at the Te Deum, which was fung in the Roman Catholick Church of this Town. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland assembled Yesterday. The Prince of Heffe Hombourg and Prince William of Heffe Cassel took the same Day the Oaths of Fidelity before their High Mightinesses, as Lieutenants General of Horse in the Service of this State; Monsteur Els was also Sworn as Major-General of Foot. Letters from Dref-den fay, that the Duke of Courland was arrived there from Bareith on his return to his cominions, which were abandoned by the Swedes. They add, that Gener 1 Czeremetoff was advanced near Riga with a confiderable hody of the Muscovite Army, and that he waited for the Artillery which was falling down the Dwina, to attack the Place in Form.

Leich, November 7. On Saturday last came into our Road a Dutch Man of War of 50 Gans, from Rosterdam, who came out with some Fishing Deggers, that are going to the Winter Fishing. Yesterday came into our Harbour a Swedish Ship laden with Iron, and a Danish Ship with Timber; who has lain her Quarantain in our Road, for

fear they had been infected with the Plague.

Falmouth, November 12. Yesterday arrived the Expedition Packet, Captain Clyss Commander, intwelve Days from Lisbon. Put in at the fame time the Prince George of and for Copenhagen, Stephen Mayer Commander, from the Coast of Cormandel in India, with Peppers &ce Can e in also the Concordia and Krigstoan Privacers, and brought Prizes the two Brothers and the Neptune, both of and for Nantz from Martineco. Also the Queen Anne Priva-teer from Cruing in the Sweights, where she cook feveral Prīzes.

Plimouth, November 13. Yesterday sailed to the Eastward her Majesty's Ships the Essex, Le Firme, Bicda and Sunderland, with the Drake and Smirna Factor, one Bomb-Vessel, and seventy Sail of Transports, Merchantships
