St. James's, November 25.

THE humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, Common-Council, Burgesses, and others of the ancient Corporation of the Town and County of *Haverford-west*, was presented to her Majesty by *John Langhorne, Esq;* their Representative in Parliament, introduced by the Right Honourable Mr. Secretary *Boyle*.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Members of Parliament, Deputy-Recorder, Aldermen, Town-Clerk, Common-Council, Clergy, Gentry, and other Inhabitants of the Borough of *Byson* in the County of *Lincoln*; was presented to her Majesty by the Right Honourable *Peregrine Bertis, Esq;* and *Richard Wynne, Esq;* their Representatives in Parliament.

Which Addresses her Majesty received very graciously.

Copenhagen, November 16. N. S. On the 11th Instant the Fleet sailed out of this Road, and before Noon came to an Anchor on the Coast of *Schonen*, between *Landskron* and *Elfsinburg*, before a small Bay called *Raa*. That Afternoon they sent out some Boats to observe if the Place were proper for a Descent; and in the Evening his Majesty sailed from hence in his Yarch, and joined the Fleet next Morning. On the 12th about Noon the Forces began to Land, General *Reventlau* went in the first Boat, and was followed by two Battalions of Grenadiers, and two of Guards, who landed without Opposition; and that Evening posted themselves in a Neighbouring Village. All the Troops were disembark'd on the 15th. The Inhabitants of *Elfsinburg* have made their Submission to his Majesty; and it is believed the Troops will halt near that Town, until the Artillery and Ammunition which is to be employed in the Siege of *Landskron* is landed. Another Transportation of twelve hundred Dragoons, four hundred Horse, and six hundred Foot, is to be made from *Elfsinore* to *Elfsinburg*; and the heavy Baggage of the Army will be sent by the same Convoy. Yesterday the Queen-Mother arrived here; and this Morning the Queen went to *Cronenburgh*, where it is expected the King will land when he returns from his Expedition on *Schonen*.

Berlin, November 23. N. S. His Majesty is returned hither from *Maienwender* in perfect Health. The whole Court, who attended him, have received Instances of his Czarish Majesty's Favour, and the Principal Officers Medals and Pictures of considerable value. His Majesty himself received from the Czar a Present of a Sword, and made very magnificent Returns to the Russian Court, for the Civilities done by the Czar to that of Prussia. Prince *Menzikoff*, besides many other Marks of Distinction, had the Honour to have the Order of the Black Eagle conferred upon him; at the same time his Prussian Majesty presented him with a Sword set with Diamonds. Their Majesties took their Leave of each other with repeated Assurances of a perpetual Friendship; but it is not said that they have formally entered into any new Alliance. The Prince Royal is returned hither from the Low Countries, accompanied by the Princess his Consort, who met his Highness at *Hanover*. On the 17th Instant the Prince of *Courland* arrived here Incognito from the Court of *Berlin*, on his return to his own Territories, which have long been in the Possession of the Swedes, and have lately been abandoned by them. His Czarish Majesty having concurred with the King of Prussia in the Design of re-establishing that Prince in his Dominions, hath engaged to lend him seventy thousand Crowns. *Baron Rantzau* is come to this Court, where he is to reside in Quality of Envoy-Extraordinary from the King of Den-

mark, and *Monfieur Vanhagen*, who before acted here in behalf of his Danish Majesty, is to set out to-morrow for *Denmark*. Advices from *Warfaw* of the first Instant confirm an Account we formerly had in this Place, that the Swedish Troops who attempted to retreat through *Wallachia*, were defeated by the Muscovites. King *Augustus* hath bestowed upon the Son of the late General *Oginski* all his Father's Possessions, at the Instance of the Czar of *Muscovy*. The Office of Grand General of *Lithuania* is conferred on the Grand Treasurer of the Empire, and that of Lieutenant-General to Count *Denhoff*. The Prince *Bebrueski Sapieha* and Prince *Wiesnowski* had hitherto been possessed of those Commands; but his Czarish Majesty, in regard that they always appeared zealous for the Interest of Sweden, opposed their being received into Grace on any other Terms, than that of being divested of all manner of Power and Command. Last Sunday a Muscovite Prince, whose Name is *Kuraki*, passed through this City for the Court of *Hanover*, from whence he is to continue his Journey to *London*, with the Character of Ambassador from his Czarish Majesty. King *Augustus* hath appointed Colonel *la Brosse* to be his Minister at the Court of Great Britain. The Prince of *Anhalt-Deffau* arrived here Yesterday. Letters from *Warfaw* of the 9th Instant say, that the *Palatine of Kiow*, after the Action between him and General *Goltz*, marched to *Cracow*; and having raised a Contribution of twelve thousand Crowns in that City, he passed the *Vistula*, and took the Rout towards *Wallachia* and *Moldavia*, where he expects to join the King of Sweden.

Brussels, November 25. N. S. The Duke of *Arenberg* is appointed Grand Bailiff of *Hainault*, and invested with all the Powers and Privileges of that important Office. Lieutenant-General *Cadogan* arrived here on the 21st Instant from the *Hague*. The last Advices from *Valenciennes* say, that as soon as Count *Bergeyck* returns to *Namur*, several Spanish Regiments will be reformed. The Duke of *Bavaria* is daily expected at that Place, and it is said the late Elector of *Cologne* designs to set out in a few Days from *Valenciennes* to the Court of France, before he goes to *Dinant*. Colonel *Parpaille* is detached towards *St. Amand*, with a Design to observe some Posts on the *Scarpe*; and the Enemy have designed to form a Line between *Valenciennes* and *Conde*; they are at present employed in throwing up new Works before their Lines near *Maubeuge*, which Place they are endeavouring to furnish with all things necessary for a Siege; they use all possible Diligence to lay in great Stores of Corn at *Valenciennes* for the Subsistence of the Troops; but all manner of Grain is at an excessive Price; besides which great Inconvenience, the Soldiers appear in a miserable Condition for want of Cloaths. We have Letters from *Madrid* of the 4th Instant, which say, that *Marshal Staremberg*, accompanied by several General Officers, set out from *Balaguar* on the 22d of the last Month for *Barcelona*.

Hague, November 29. N. S. The States of *Holland* were re-assembled on the 19th Instant, and concluded that Session on the 23d. They are to meet again on the 11th of the ensuing December, to regulate the State of the War for the next Year, there being some Articles to which they have not as yet consented. *Monfieur Boismaifary*, and *Monfieur Levington*, being suspected of entertaining a Correspondence with the Court of France, to the prejudice of the High Allies, their Persons and Papers were seized by order of the States: After having been kept under close Confinement in their own Houses for some days, last Wednesday they were brought to Examination; it is not known whether they have been convicted of the Crimes laid to their Charge, but their Retraint is continued. Last Saturday Prince *Eugene* set out

out for Düsseldorf, where he designs to continue some few Days, before he proceeds on his Journey to Vienna. Their High-nesses, the States-General, labour with great Application on the necessary Preparations for the next Campaign, that they may be in a condition to take the Field before the Enemy can march out of their Garrisons; and to this end they have laid in great Magazines on the Frontiers, for the subsistence of the Cavalry in the beginning of the Campaign. All Advices from the Frontiers agree, that the Enemies Troops are in a miserable condition for want of Bread and Cloaths, so that they take all occasions to Desert to the Allies. Most of their Battalions do not consist of more than two or three hundred Men, and those of Spain do scarce make up one hundred and fifty. The Earl of Albemarle hath presented a Memorial to the States-General, desiring their consent to the Exchange of Monsieur de Surville, who was lately taken Prisoner in the Citadel of Tournay, for the Count de St. Juan, the Portuguese General, who was taken in the Battle near Badajos. The Duke of Marlborough, and Prince Eugene, have already approved of this Change, and we hear that the States of Holland hath likewise consented to it. Monsieur Pentecomb is expected here from the Court of France this Evening, or to Morrow Morning. Monsieur Eschenbender, and Monsieur Solemacher, have delivered in their Credentials to this State, as Envoys Extraordinary from the Electorate and Chapter of Cologo. Letters from Paris say, that the Duke of Bavaria left that City on the 20th Instant, in order to return to Compeigne, from whence he is expected at Namur the beginning of the next Month. On the Day of his Departure the French King presented him, by Monsieur Torcy, with a Buckle set in Diamonds, valued at twenty thousand Crowns. That Prince hath left the Count de Berg, yck to sollicite the necessary Remittances of Money from that Court. The Elector of Cologne hath desired the States General to grant him Passports for his Journey to Dinan, where he designed to reside, in order to buy up Corn for the Subsistence of Liege and his own Electorate; but the States being apprehensive that his Neighbourhood must be prejudicial to them, would probably refuse to grant his Request; and it is believed he will meet with great Difficulties in leaving Valenciennes, if he can't procure Money to satisfy the Demands of his Creditors in that City. These Letters add, that all the French Troops which were in Spain, are already arrived on the Frontiers, and are designed for the Service in Flanders next Campaign. The Duke of Anjou hath written to the King, his Grandfather, earnestly pressing the Reinforcements of the Spanish and Walloon Troops in the Netherlands, in the room of the French Troops which are recalled; for that Prince being advised, that Count Sternberg, when he set out for Barcelona, left Orders with the General Officers that the Army should be in a readiness to take the Field the 25th of this Instant November, is very apprehensive the Allies will take Advantage of the Weakness of his Troops, before he shall be able to strengthen them by new Levies in Spain. It is given out at the Court of France, that by the Addition of those Troops which are on their March from Spain, and the Recruits which are to be raised this Winter, they shall be able to open the Campaign next Spring with a more numerous Army than that of the Allies. It is certain that the King or France hath been obliged to abate four Millions of the usual Taxes, because of the extreme Want and Misery of his Subjects. Letters from Spain advise, that Count Sternberg had formed a Design to penetrate into Arragon, but finding it impracticable, he hath commanded his Troops into Winter Quarters, and is set out for Barcelona. We hear from Brabant, that the Enemy have detached four hundred Men towards St. Amund, who are working on a Redoubt about half a League behind that Place, for the Security of some small Posts which they had possessed themselves of on the Scarp, in each of which were placed a hundred and fifty Men. There are no other Motions on the Frontiers. Advices from Denmark say, that his Danish Majesty had not been able to proceed in the Reduction of Schonera for want of the Artillery and Ammunition which are to be employed in the Siege of Landiscron. We have lately received no Letters from Norway, the Swedes having intercepted all their Correspondence with other Nations.
