According to the late Advice from France, the Recruit of their Army goes on with great Success; the younger Men being obliged to go into the Service for want of Bread in the present Scarcity: They add, that the King's Officers, bringing a Sum of a Hundred and sixty thousand Livres from Rheims, in order to be paid into the King's Treasury, were obliged to that Money within three Miles of Paris. Letters from Madrid, of the 18th of the last Month, say, that the Duke of Aragon was raising twenty two Battalions of Spaniards, to supply the Want of the French Troops which are lately recalled into France.
