The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council

Whereas the Secretary of State for the Environment, after giving to the Incumbent and Churchwardens of the Parish of Clifton with Glapton, Nottingham, ten day's previous notice of his intention in that behalf, has, under the provisions of the Burial Act 1853 as amended by subsequent enactments, made a Representation to Her Majesty in Council that, for the protection of the Public Health, burials should be discontinued forwith and entirely in St. Mary's Churchyard, Clifton, in the said Parish, shown hatched on the plan annexed herto.

Provided that-

- (a) In any vault or walled grave now existing in the said Churchyard, burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stone-work or brickwork properly cemented.
- (b) In any earthern grave now existing in the said Churchyard, the burial may be allowed of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons

heretofore buried in such grave, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.


(c) In the said Churchyard, in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place, the burial may be allowed of the body of any person for whom or of any member of a family for which such grave space has been reserved and appropriated as a burial place, with the exclusive right of burial therein, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give Notice of such Representation and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 10th day of April next.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the Churches or Chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the Parish effected by such Representation one month before the said 10th day of April.

Whereas by the Burial Act 1855 (1855 c. 128) it was, amongst other things, enacted that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, should or should not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, might seem fit: And whereas an Order in Council was made on the 23rd day of April 1969, (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Order") directing the discontinuance of burials, with exceptions, in St. Nicholas' Churchyard, Gosforth, in the County of Northumberland:

And whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the principal Order should be varied:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:----

1. The principal Order shall have effect subject to the following exception or qualification, viz.:---

That notwithstanding anything in the said Order the burial may be allowed in the said Churchyard of (a) the bodies of Mrs. Ada Elizabeth Redford and Mrs. Edith
