Frankfort, December 1. N. S.

Esterday Prince Eugene arrived here under a tripple Discharge of the Cannon of this City, and having staid some Hours, he proceeded to Aschassenburg, where he is to have an Interview with the Eiccor of Mayence; from whence his Highness designs to continue his Journey to Vienna. The Regiments of Mecklenburg and Wolfembuttel, which were marching towards their Winter Quarters in their respective Countries, have received Orders from General Gronsfeldt, to return to Weynheim. They write from Ratisbon, that the General Diet hath fent Memorials to the chief Potentates of the Alliance, defiring them to have a particular regard to the Security of the Empire at the next Treaty of Peace, by obliging France to restore the entire Dutchies of Lorrain and Barr, together with the City and partness of Lorrain and Dair, together with the City and Bailinges of Longwic, Clermont, Stenay, and all the Lands which they were obliged to deliver up to France in the Year 1661, as well as those which the Dukes of Lorrain were possessed of before the Regency of Duke Henry the IIId. and which they enjoyed long before the Treaty of Westphalia; the Landgraviate of Upper and Lower Alfonia; the Principality of Monthelliard and ire Lower Alfatia; the Principality of Montbelliard and its Dependencies; the Bailliages. Lordinips and Dominions belonging to the Teutonick Order, and that of St. John; the Sundgow and Brifgow, with all the Fortifications along the Rhine from Balil to Philipsburg; Bedford, Pfalzburg, Hombourg, Bilsch; the Bailliage of Haguenau; the Bishopricks of Mets, Toul and Verdun, with the City of Moyenwic; the Bishoprick, City and Fortressof Strasburg; whatfoever hath been taken from the Bishoprick of Basil; Franche-Comté, and the Fortresses of Thionville and Saar-Louis; and to infift on the demolishing of Huninguen. Landscrown, New Brisac, Fort Lewis and Fort Mortier. It is also proposed in these Memorials, that all the Subjects of the Empire, of what Quality and Condition foever, shall be established in their Ancient Rights, Privileges and Immunities; that a Barrier be appointed for the continual Security of the Empire, and particularly of the four Affociated Circles which are most exposed; and that the Cities, Lordships, and all other Territories in the Low-Countries belonging to the Crown of Spain, which are Feudatories to the Empire, be restored to his Catho-lick Majesty; and that all things be regulated in such a manner, that the French King, or his Successors, may never hereaster form any Claim or Pretension to the same. These Letters add, that on the 24th of the last Month the Deputies of the Protestant Princes hada Conterence together; and that they had also writ to her Britannick Majefly, and the States-General, to recommend to their Confideration the Interest of their Religion at the next Treaty of Peace; and that they will have an especial Regard that they enjoy the same Freedom in the Ex-

ercise of it as formerly.

Cologn, December 4. N. S. The Cardinal Saxe-Zeits and the Count of Konigleck are daily expected in this Place. General Bersau reviewed our Garrison Yesterday. It is said that some Potentaes in the Alliance will suidenly

fend Ministers hither, to Mediate between the King of Prussia and this City, and endeavour wholly to Accommodere the Misunderstandings between them. Several Danish and Saxon Officers continue to recruit their respective Companies in these Parts. Divers Prussian Officers who were Quartered in our Neighbourhood are gone into Branders burg, in order to raise new Levies. The Garrison of Bonn, consisting of four thousand Men, is to be reinforced with a Dutch Regiment. Many French Parties pass frequently through our Neighbourhood; but we have not heard of any considerable Attempt that hath been made, or great Injury done to the Inhabitants of the Country. Some Saxon Companies have lately marched through these Territories in their way to Winter Quarters in their own Dominions.

Hague, December 6. N. S. Letters from Tails advise, that the Marshal d'Hircourt hath been created a Peer of France, in Consideration of his Service on the Rhine last Year. The French King hath sent Commissioners into Franci e-Comte, to make an exact search for all such as were suspected to have held any Correspondence with Count Merci, when he passed the Rhine, in order to penetrate into those Parts; and it is advised that several Persons have already lest their Habitations, for fear of being Prosecuted for favouring that Design. These Letters add, that besides a Buckle set in Diamonds, which the French King sent to the Duke of Bavaria by Mondieur Torcy, his Majesty also presented that Prince with twenty sive Purses, in each of which were two thousand Livres in Gold, which Present was made him to desiral the Expences of his Journey. Letters from the North advise, that it being reported at Elsinor, that the Swedish Fleet was failed from Karlscroon, and had taken a Yache Danish Fleet immediately hosses as the Danish Fleet immediately hosses and stood towards Karlscroon, so that it is expected we shall soon receive Advice of an Engagement between those two Fleets.

Falmeuth, Dec. 1. On the 28th past, at 8 at Night, the Mercury Packet-Boat was driven back by a strong Gale of Southerly Wind. Yesterday arrived the Prince Packet-Boat; Capto Chenhall Commander, in fix Days from Lisbon. We have an account from Mountsbay of a French Banker sent in there by the August Man of War. The Expedition Packet-Boat will sail to Morrow for London, if the Wind proves sair; being unfit for the Service.

Portsmouth, December 4. Sir John Norris continues still at Spithead, on Board her Majesty's Ship the Ranelagh, with the Elizabeth, Nottingham, Sunderland, Rupert, Windsor, Nonsuch, Gosport, Berwick, Graston, Warspight, Oxford, Edgar, Guernsey, Assistance, and Phonix Fire-ship.
