

quitted by the French Troops when they marched out of the Kingdom; and that the Miquelets had made divers Excursions into Arragon, and pillaged most of the Towns which were fill'd with Provisions for the Magazines of the Frontier Towns. The great Scarcity of Corn throughout the Spanish Dominions occasions much Difficulties in providing Necessaries for the Troops. The last Letters from the North say, that the King of Denmark was returned to Copenhagen; but it was believed his Majesty would not continue there during the Winter, but speedily repair to Helsingborg, which Place had been put in a good Posture of Defence; and great Magazines were laying up in it for the Subsistence of the Troops.

Exmouth, December 10. This Day put in the William and Mary of Arragon London, from Virginia, Paul Bickford Master; she was taken on the 6th Instant by a French Privateer of twenty eight Guns; and on the 8th was retaken by the Concordia Privateer of Flushing, which is gone after the French Privateer, and it is believed hath taken her; for they were seen to come to an Engagement. The Mercury Packet-Boat is detained in this Harbour by South-west Winds.

Bristol, December 12. This Day came in the Four Brothers of London, being a Prize, now Commanded by Cezar Jeffers; she was taken by the Pilgrim Privateer of London, who had taken three French Prizes on the Banks of Newfoundland, this Four Brothers being one of them; who was bound for Biddiford, and forced in hither by stormy Weather. There are several Outward bound Merchant-men in King-road.

Tarmonth, December 12. Her Majesty's Ships the Rochester, Ruby, Arundel, Adventure, Swallow's-Prize, Deale-Castle, Falkstone, and Advice's-Prize continue in our Road.

Covent, December 12. Yesterday came into our Road the Pine-tree of and for Topsham, Samuel Hayman Master, from London with Coals. The Weather has been very Stormy on our Coast for several Days, but we hear of no Damage it has done.

Deale, December 13. Her Majesty's Ships the Loo and Stromboio sailed this Morning to Cruise to the Westward; the Queen's Ships and Outward-bound are still here. This Morning came down her Majesty's Ship the Suffolk-Hag-Boat; and the Nathaniel bound for the Canaries, Sarah Bridge for Madera, and the Elizabeth and Martha for Virginia.
