Vienna, December 11. N. S.

ER Imperial Majesty is so well recovered of her late Indisposition, that it is hoped she will appear in publick in a few Days. The Emperor hath lately declared that he will fend an Envoy to Congratulate King Augustus upon his return into Poland. Monsieur Hansen is set out for Copenhagen, where he is to refide as Imperial Minister at the Court of Denmark. Advices from Hungary say, that General Heister having appeared before Leitschau with a considerable Body of Troops, summoned the Governor to furrender, upon whose refusal he Bombarded the Place, and afterwards took it by Assault, in which he hat is placed a Garrison confisting of two Battalions, and the Regiment of Ulfelt. These Advices add, that General Heister hath had so great Success against the Malecontents, that it is not doubted, if he is supported with fresh Troops at the beginning of the next Campaign, but he will bring that War to a happy Conclusion. Some Letters from Buda say, that the Plague is very much abated, as well there as in the Neighbourhood of Zolnockz. lest Advices from Constantinople inform us, that the Ottoman Fort continues to make great Warlike Preparations; and that the Russian Amballador employed his utmost Diligence in enseavouring to prevent an Alliance between the Grand Signior and the King of Sweden; acfording to these Advices, his Swedish Majesty was still at Bender, where he had received magmilicent Presents from the Cham of Tartary. It is further reported, that the King of Sweden intended to go to Constantinople; but that the Grand Signior had fignified to his Majesty that his Minister at that Court should have the same Authority with him, as if his Majesty were actually present.

Berne, December 12. N. S. This Canton hath not yet declared it self upon the late Letter of the Abbot of St. Gall, wherein he offered to furrender the Castles in the County of Tockenbourg into the Hands of the Roman Catholick Cantons, 'till the Differences between him and the Inhabitants of that County

be fully adjusted: In the mean time the People of Tockenbourg are no way enclined to comply with this Expedient; and appear as apprehensive of Oppression from the Partiality of the Roman Catholicks, as if those Castles continued in the Hands of the Prelate himself. Letters from Turin say, that the Marquis de Graneri, who is Commissioner in behalf of the Duke of Savoy for accommodating the Differences between that Prince and the Emperor, was fuddenly to repair to Milan, to confer with the Bishop of the Five Churches, the Imperial Plenipotentiary, in order to bring that Affair to a final Determination. Those Letters add, that General Rhebinder had lately vifited all the Fortifications on the Frontiers, and had made the necessary Observations for improving the Works at Sufa, Exilles and Fenestrelles. Advices from Lyons say, that the Scarcity of Provisions, and want of Mony in the Neighbouring Provinces, had reduced the People to the most extreme Misery, and rendered them wholly incapable of paying the Taxes to the Government. The new Cruelties which have been exercised in the Cevennes and Languedoc against the Protestants in those Parts, have so highly exasperated the People, that the French Court being afraid of new Commotions, have ordered the Intendants to treat them with less Severity.

Hamburgh, December 20. N. S. The High Commissioners appointed to compose the Differences of this Town, have been obliged to raise a Sum of Mony, by way of Capitation. to defray the extraordinary Expences wherewith this City hath been charged of late Years. Last Tuesday Monsieur Cranenbourg set out for Dresden to congratulate King Augustus on his happy Return to the Kingdom of Poland. Advices from Riga confirm the Account we formerly received of the Bombardment of that Place by the Muscovites, and add, that the Russian Troops had possessed themfelves of Fort Kober near that City, and had fecured it by new Fortifications, from the Cannon of the Besieged. His Czarish Majesty was returned to Moscow, by the way of Dorpad and Peterbourg. We hear that the Plague rages still at Stetin and Koningsberg, and

that it begins to appear again at Wariaw, which had already obliged a great many Senators to leave that City, and it is believed another Place will be appointed for the Meeting of the gcneral Assembly; but we hear that the Contagion still abates at Dantzig; and it appears by the Bills of Mortality of the last Week, that two hundred and seventeen Persons only died of that Distemper, which is fixteen less than in the Week preceding. It hath been observed that from the Year 1602, to the Year 1660, Dantzig was seven times infected with the Plague, in which Interval eighty five thousand and seventy seven died there of that Distemper; and that from the Year 1621 to 1661, it hath been fix times in Koningsberg, whereby it swept a-way twenty nine thousand eight hundred twenty five Persons out of that City.

The same Day came down the Tuscan-Calley bound for Leghorne; besides which here are her Majesty's Ships the Yarmouth, Hampton-Court, Sunderland, Falkland, Scarborough, Medway's-Prize, and Swan; and also the Diligence-Galley bound for Genoz, the Marlborough for Jamaica, and the Marlborough for Oporto.
