St. James's, January 1. The humble Address of the Lord-Lieutenant, Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Clergy, Gentlemen, and Freeholders of the County of Rutland; was presented to her Majesty by the Right Honourable the Lord *Sherard*, Lord-Lieutenant of the said County.

Which Address Her Majesty received very graciously.

Hague, January 10. N. S. Monsieur van Stocken hath given in his Credentials to the States-General, and is to reside here as his Danish Majesty's Secretary, until another Minister be sent hither from Copenhagen. Count Lecheraine set out from hence on the 28th of the last Month, in order to return to Dusseldorp; and Monsieur Stadian, the Chief Minister of the Elector of Mayence, arrived here on the 30th. Monsieur Duyvencoorden hath been elected by the States-General to succeed the late Earl of Portland in the Government of the City and Barony of Breda. The Earl of Stairs arrived here on the second Instant from Great Britain; and yesterday proceeded on his Journey to the Court of King Augustus. Next Week the States of Holland and Westfriesland are to reassemble, in order to concert such Measures as are further necessary for a vigorous and early Campaign. Yesterday Count Zinzendorf and Baron Heems, the Imperial Ministers, the Lord Townshend, her Britannick Majesty's Plenipotentiary, Count Maffei, the Marquis de la Bourgue, and the Marquis de Mellared, Ministers from the Duke of Savoy, had a long Conference with the Deputies of the States-General; and we hear that they have renewed the Treaty with Baron Bothmar, the Minister of the Elector of Hanover, concerning the Troops belonging to his Electoral Highness that are in the Service of the Queen of Great Britain and the States-General. Monsieur Marurof, the Russian Ambassador, and Baron Gersdorf, Envoy from King Augustus to this Republick, have delivered Memorials to the States-General concerning the present posture of the Affairs of their respective Matters. We are advised from Flanders, that the Enemy are continually employed in casting up Entrenchments, and adding new Fortifications to their Frontier Towns, that the Pioneers who were at work on the new Lines near Mau-

beuge, are sent to Marpain, Bouffiere, Thuin, and other Towns situated along the Sambre, where they are to build Redoubts for the Defence of that Frontier; and that several Regiments of the Troops quartered in France were in motion towards the Low-Countries, in order to make room for those that are expected from Spain. These Advices add, that the French Court had sent an Ordinance to all the Intendants of the Frontiers, to put in Execution the Confiscation of all the Goods and Revenues that any of the Allies have in France; and of all those who reside in any Places under the Jurisdiction of the French King; which Ordinance is to be Printed, and dispersed to every Town and Village in their respective Governments, with particular Instructions to all the Magistrates and Officers of the Civil List, to take an exact Account of all such Goods and Revenues, and to return the same to the Intendants within 15 Days, under the Penalty of paying 500 Florins, in case of Disobedience. We are also advised, that the Inhabitants of Doway had taken up Arms against the Magistrates, because they would have obliged them to raise 400 Florins for each Battalion in the Garrison of that Place. Advices from Namur say, that Preparations were making in that City for the reception of the Duke of Bavaria, whose arrival was expected from Valenciennes on the 15th or 16th Instant; that a great many Miners, and others belonging to the Artillery in the Service of the Duke of Anjou, had Orders to March into Spain, where they are to serve the ensuing Campaign, with a Promise that all their Arrears shall be forthwith paid them, the Expences of their March discharged, and that several Months pay shall be advanced to them as a further Gratuity; and that the Marquis de Leede and the Baron de Capres, both Lieutenants-General, had also been commanded by the Duke of Anjou to repair immediately into Spain. Letters from Brussels say, that Orders had been sent to several Magistrates of the Neighbouring Towns and Villages, to give in an exact Account of all the Horses that are to be found within the Jurisdiction of that City. These Letters add, that the Allies were filling the Magazines of the Frontier Towns with stores of Provision and Ammunition, that their Troops might be enabled to take the Field very early this ensuing Spring. Advices from France import, that the French King returned on the 21st of the last Month from Marl to Versailles; the next Day, his Majesty visited the Marshal Villars, and continued in Conference with him two hours. On the 27th a general Council of War was held in the King's Privy Chamber, at which all the Princes of the Blood, all the Marshals and Generals assisted. These Advices add, that Marshal Boufflers had orders to set out for Valenciennes about the middle of January, from whence he is to proceed to visit all the Posts on the Frontiers, and transmit an account of their condition to the King. We are further advised, that the Duke of Bavaria is appointed to Command in chief the ensuing Campaign in Flanders, and that the Duke of Vendome and Marshal Boufflers are to serve under him; that the Duke of Berwick and Marshal D'Escarrou are to Command on the Upper Rhine; and that the King had given Orders to all the Officers to have their Troops compleat before the 30th of the next Month. Letters from Spain advise, that the Duke of Anjou finding it impossible to settle the necessary Funds for the regular Payment of his Troops, had published an Order, that for the present Subsistence of those in Arragon, they were to receive part of their Pay in Provisions from the Neighbouring Towns; and all parts of Arragon are to be affected with this Order in proportion to their Riches, and

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
