NOTICE OF PUBLIC PATH ORDER

TOWN AND COUNTRY PLANNING ACT, 1971—SECTION 210

Cumbria County Council (Footpath Number 104045, Maryport) Public Path Diversion Order, 1974

Notice is hereby given that the above-named Order (hereinafter referred to as "the Order") made on the 20th December 1974 is about to be submitted to the Secretary of State for the Environment for confirmation or to be confirmed by the Cumbria County Council as an unopposed Order.

The effect of the Order, if confirmed without modification, will be to divert a length of the public right of way which runs from the archway under the Carlisle to Workington railway line in a north-westwards direction along the north-eastern boundary of Field No. 1377 and then north-eastwards to Mandle Street, Glasson to a line which runs north-eastwards from the archway under the Carlisle to Workington railway line to Eel Sike, thence along the western boundary of Eel Sike and then running northwards to Ropery Street, Glasson.

A copy of the Order and the map contained in it has been deposited at the Allerdale District Council Offices, Town Hall, Maryport, where it may be inspected free of charge between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. on Mondays to Fridays in each week.

Any representation or objection with respect to the Order may be sent in writing to the Director of Legal and Administrative Services, The Courts, Carlisle, not later than 31st January 1975, and should state the grounds on which it is made.

If no representations or objections are duly made, or if any so made are withdrawn, the Cumbria County Council may, instead of submitting the Order to the Secretary of State for confirmation, themselves confirm the Order as an unopposed Order. If the Order is submitted to the Secretary of State for confirmation any representations and objections which have been duly made and not withdrawn will be sent to the Secretary of State with the Order.

NORTH NORFOLK DISTRICT COUNCIL

TOWN AND COUNTRY AMENITIES ACT, 1974

CONSERVATION AREAS

Notice is hereby given that the North Norfolk District Council in pursuance of their powers under the Town and Country Amenities Act 1974, have designated the areas described in the Schedule as Conservation Areas.

A Conservation Area is an area of special architectural or historical interest, the character or appearance of which it is desirable to conserve or enhance. Planning permission is now required to carry out any demolition work within a Conservation Area.

SCHEDULE

Bacton: Two areas: (1) Includes Abbey Farm and the Priory ruins with cottages to the east of Abbey Street, and to the north of the coast road as far west as the eastern boundary of Bacton Primary School. (2) Includes properties north of the coast road between, and including, "Danecote" and "Keswick Cottages".

Blakeney: Includes properties fronting Westgate Street, the village centre, the church and the Old Rectory. It is bounded to the south by New Road, and to the east by the parish boundary.

Binham: Includes all the village centre, St. Mary's Priory, Westgate and the river valley to its north; and is bounded to the east by the limits of the Manor House rear gardens.

Cley: The area is bounded by the river Glaven, the coast road and Anterton Hall to the north; and includes Cley Hall, properties east of Church Lane, and north of the Holt road as far as Old Woman's Lane, and properties round Cley Green.

Field Dalling: Includes properties each side of the Langham road between the Vicarage to the south and the Manor House to the north; and properties along Saxlingham road as far east as the school.

Glandford: Includes all buildings between St. Martin's Church to the south, and the Mill to the north, with the farm and buildings west of the main road. Mill Dam forms the eastern boundary.

Great Snoring: Covers the centre of the village between Manor Farm to the north, and School Farm and the river Stiffkey to the south. The road between Fakenham Road and Barsham Road forms the western boundary; and dwelling fronting The Street and the southern part of Dill-dash Lane are included within the eastern boundary.

Great Walsingham and Little Walsingham: The northern boundary runs mainly parallel to Westgate, between Tucks Farm and Westgate House. The western boundary runs south from Westgate House to Church Road; along Wells Road to the track south of Windsor House; then along the old railway line, Egmore Road, Station Road, and Sandy Lane, to the parish boundary. The eastern boundary runs from Tucks Farm to the Scarborough Road, enclosing Eastgate Farm; along Scarborough Road to the Holt Road junction; around Tollbar Plantation, and along the Great Snoring road to Boundary Plantation; then along a track to its junction with the parish boundary near the Pumping Station.

Happisburgh: Includes dwellings fronting Whimpwell Street to the west; "Thatchers", St. Mary's Church, and the Manor House, to the north; and "St. Mary's" and "The Forge" to the east and south.

Hempton: Covers the northern part of Hempton Green and St. Mary's Church; including properties around Back Street and Dereham Road to the east; and dwellings around the Shereford Road/Mill Road Crossroads to the west.

Holkham: Includes buildings on either side of the Holkham Hall estate road between the A149 and the Alms-house gates and buildings to the east, south of the A149; and a small strip of land to the north of the A149.

Holt: Covers the centre of the town, extending to the old railway line to the south; and to the old school library to the east.

Hunworth: Includes properties around The Green, and fronting King's Street; Hunworth Hall, the church and the Mill; Hunworth Common, and Castle Hill.

Letheringsett and Little Thornage: The boundary encloses Hall Farm to the north; runs mainly along Garden Lane and Thornage Road to the east; includes Little Thornage; then runs to the west of the road between Little Thornage and The Lodge; and along the Blakeney Road.

Lower Southrepps: Covers a large area around Fox's Beck; including Southrepps Common, the School, Manor Farm, and Wayside Cottages; with land either side of Chapel Road, Warren Road, and Pitt Street, as far north as Hill House.

Ludham: The northern boundary crosses Malt House Lane, and includes the vicarage. The western boundary runs south to cross Lovers Lane, and across to Womack Water. The eastern boundary runs along Horseten Road and includes Beech Farm.

Mundesley: Two areas: (1) South of Northfield Road the area is bounded by Water Lane, and the High Street, and includes Hamilton House. North of this it includes properties on both sides of the High Street, Back Street, Russell Terrace, Victoria Road, and Town End; and Gold Park. (2) The area bounded by Paston Road, Beckmeadow Way, and Mill Pond; and extending north to include "The Ship" Inn.

Northrepps: Includes properties fronting Craft Lane and Church Street as far south as St. Mary's Church; and extends as far north as the row of cottages at the junction of Nut Lane and Bulls Row.
