Fre are at prefent in this Harbor neer Thirty fail of thips, most of them outwards bound, amongst whom, two Dutch and four French ships.

Venice, April 19. Letters from the Levant inform us, that great preparations are made at Conflantinople for the ferting out a Elect of 60 Gallies. The Beilet Gallies are allo to be in readinels to obey inth Orders as they should receive from the Baffaof the Star the Fleet way to put out to Sea as ulually upon St Georges day, and to fayl to Modon in Morea, but with what farther defigures, not yet known.

The Senate having confidered the neceffity of having fit perfons alwayes in readine is in Turky to ferve their Baily or Publick Minister in the Tu kith Court as Inretpreters, or in any other qualifications wherein, they may fland in need of affiftance, have telowed to make choice of 12 young men out of the City to be influcted in the Turkith language, and in the affairs of thole patts, on whom they intend to conferre priviledges and employments in the Ducal Chancery, fome of which number fluid be always employed to affilt the Baily in his Negotiation in the Ottoman Court.

Several fhips are here lading with the Merchandiles of this place bound for *Confrantinople*: as foon as Cavalier *Molino* has had his Audience of the Grand Segnior, Order will be taken for feeling Confuls in fereral parts of the Turkish Empire, for the re-eftablishment of Trade, effecially in Cloaths, which hash been mutil decayed by the lare wars.

Great preparations are making again! Monday next for the publick entry of the Captain Gentral Morofini; who is then to take posseful of the charge as Proturator of St Mark in Extraordinary.

The French Ambassador, the Marquis dc St Andre having obtained the favour of procuring the liberty of two brethren, Gentlemen of Verana, who had been five years together close priloners, has fidee taken his leave of the Senate for fome days, intending to go to morrow for Bar doua, and from thence in Devotion to Loretto.-

Segnior Carlo Contarini defignent Ambaffador for Spain has been for fome time deteined by the ficknels and death of Segnior Vincenzo his Uncle, but intends the next week to let forwards.

The Prince Erneft of Brunfwick Ofnabrug, though indifpoled by a Feavorifh diffemper, departed on Fuelday laft and returns by post into Germany.

Rome, April 19. On Saturday in the Evening Cardinal Caracciola left the Conclave by reason of a great flux of humors faln into one of his Legt, accompanied with Feavor, which is somewhat abated upon the change of Air.

Cardinal Scipio d' Elci, a Creature of Alexander the VII. having fince he left the Concluse continued fome days violently tormented with a Feavor, joyned with the Stone and other diffempets, on Satorday last departed this life in the 70th year of hisage, and the 12th of his Cardinalfhip, his diffemper encreasing immediately after his exclusion by the French faction, was by fome fuppofed to be partly an effect of his melancholy thence arifing, and has occasioned it to be merrily faid among it divers perfons, that he died of the French different different interval

His body was opened and embalmed, and the next day carried privately to the Cliffich of Jefus, where it was on the Manday following decently expoled to publick views and that hight folemnly enterred in the Church of SS Sabina.
