Vienna, February 5. N. S. Monsieur Albani, who lately returned to this City from Dresden, is preparing to set out for Rome, unless he receives Advice of the Pope's Recovery before the Day which is appointed for his Departure. The Evacuation of Commachio, and other Affairs which he had Instructions to negotiate at this Court, will be committed to the Direction of Monsignor Piazza, the Pope's Nuncio. His Imperial Majesty hath signified to the several Potentates of the Alliance his Resolution of reinforcing the Army on the Rhine with ten thousand Men, together with the necessary Artillery and Ammunition; and it is hoped the Princes of the Empire will be animated by his Example, and unite their Efforts to oppose the Common Enemy. We have received from Hungary a Confirmation of the late Action of General Sickingen, which informs us that the Imperialists had, with a very inconsiderable Loss, entirely defeated a Body of the Enemy, in number much Superior to them, that they had killed or made Prisoners of War near three thousand of their Men, and taken twenty seven Colours and Standards, besides several other Trophies of Victory. These Advices add, that General de Croix, with fifteen hundred Men, had routed eight thousand of the Hungarians, who were marching to surprize our Garrisons that are quartered in the Towns situated on the Mountains; but Prince Eugene's Regiment of Dragoons suffered very much in this Action; two of their Officers being taken Prisoners, were beheaded by the Malecontents, with six others, in Revenge of the Death of those that were lately executed in the same manner by the Imperialists at Raab. These Successes of the Imperial Arms induce several of the Hungarians to submit themselves to the Emperor, and implore his Majesty's Pardon and Protection. Our Advices concerning the King of Sweden are still very uncertain; some Accounts say, that his Majesty was advancing with an Army towards Poland, and others, that he continued at Bender; but we are advised from Constantinople, that the Ottoman Port is not inclined to favour his Interests, or do any thing that may create a Misunderstanding between the Grand Signior and the Czar of Muscovy.

Hague, February 21. N. S. The States of Holland continue their Session, and have this Day disposed of several Places that were vacant in the Military List. Major General Bernard is this Day set out for the Brill in order to embark in the first Packet boat that sails for England, with a Commission from his Master the Duke of Holstein to her Britannick Majesty. Count Tilly left this Place on the 19th Instant, on his Return to his Command in Flanders, and several other General Officers are preparing to follow him. Monsieur Levington and Monsieur Bois-Massary, who were formerly apprehended for holding a Correspondence with France, and have since that time been kept in Custody in this Town, were yesterday removed to the Prison belonging to the Court of Justice. They write from France, that the Dutchess of Burgundy was delivered of a Prince, to whom they have given the Title of Duke of Anjou. We hear that the Muscovites, taking Advantage of the Ice, had stormed the Town of Elbing, and made the Garrison, [which

which consisted of seven hundred Swedes, Prisoners of War.

Kingsale, February 3. The East India Fleet in this Port were getting ready to Sail this Day for England under a very strong Convoy, but the Wind changing to the Southward, they moored again.

Salmon, February 9. On the 6th Instant arrived the Bullingburg Privateer from Cruising, having taken four Yachts, which were ransomed for five thousand Pound. On the 7th arrived the Dover Man of War from Lisbon, and with him a Fly-boat laden with Salt for Holland. The same Day, came in from Plymouth the Recovery of London, to take in Fish for Barcelona. This Day came in the Marlborough Man of War from Plymouth, to Convoy the Tin Men and other outward bound ships to London.
