Falmouth, February 9. On the 6th instant arrived the Bullringburg Privateer from Cruising, having taken four Vessels which were ransomed for five thousand Pound. On the 7th arrived the Dover Man of War from Lisbon, and with him a Fly boat laden with Salt for Holland. The same Day came in from Plymouth the Recovery of London, to take in Fish for Barcelona. This Day came in the Marlborough Man of War from Plymouth, to Convoy the Tin Men and other outward bound ships to London.
