HE humble Address of the Lord-Lieutenant, Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Gentry and Clergy of the County of Lincoln, Congratulating Her Majesty on the Successes of the victorious Arms the last Campaign, was presented to the Queen by the Right Honourable the Lord Willeughty and Colonel Witchest, Knights of the Shire for the said County.

Which Address Her Majesty received very graciously.

Vienna, February 12. N. S. Count Thaun arrived here on the 8th Infont from Italy, as did the Baron of Nehm the fame Day from Great Waradin; Count Ha-rach and Count Wackerbaert are lately returned to this Place from the Netherlands; and General Erlach is come to follicit the Payment of the Swifs Troops which are in the Service of his Imperial Majesty. Daily Consultations are held on proper Methods to bring the War in Hungany to a speedy and safe Conclusion, and to carry on that against the French with greater Vigour and Success. The Requits that were to be raised in the Emperor's Hereday Dominions are almost compleat, and they will speedivreceive Orders to March towards the Upper Rhine. Advices from Hungary fay, that a great Magazine, contilly blown up in Leittchau, which killed a great number of the Malecontents, it was supposed that Garrison would som be obliged to surrender themselves to the Imperialifts. General Sickengen passed the Gran on the twenty eighth of the last Month, and by his late Successes near Walkeret, had entirely broken the Measures of Prince Ragotski, who had affembled a Body of twelve thou-fand Men, and had formed a Delign to March towards Austria or Moravia, and thereby occasion such a Diverfrom to the Imperial Arms as might prevent their fuc-cesssul Progress in Hungary. These Advices add, that a great Body of Muscovites, under the Command of General Gol z. were arrived on the Frontiers of Upper Hungary, and advancing rowards Mongaz, and had fignified to Prince Ragoiski, that unless he delivered up the Palatine of Kiovia, he would proceed against him as an Enemy to the Russian Crown. It is reported, that Prince Eugene will fet out within fifteen Days for the Hague.

Capenhagen, February 15. N. S. Since the taking of Carlshaven, which was foon after abandoned, the Danes have made no further Progress in the Reduction of Scho-A Detachment of the Garrison at Helfinburg is marched under the Command of Major-General Echsted towards the Province of Halland, to endeavour to obtain the like Advantages on that fide as the Troops under General Raventlau have gained on the fide of Christianflade; but we have not yet received any Advice of the Streets of that Enterprize, and it is thought be hath halted en his March to receive a Reinforcement General Raven lau fent him, upon Intelligence that the Swedes were withdrawing their Troops from the Frontiers of Norway, in order to fend them to these Parts. We are adrifed, that the Swedes are affembling another Body of Troops in the Neighbourhood of Carlshaven and Carlffoon. Some Battalions of Militia which lay at Elfinore are lent to Elfinburg, to relieve those Troops which were detached from the Garrison of that Place, under the Command of General Echsted. A Magazine of Hay which was at Elinore having been fooiled by the neglect of the Commissioners who had the Inspection thereof, the Peafants of this Island have been ordered to bring in a sufficient quantity to supply the want of that Store.

Bruffels, February 24. N. S. Recruits are caily paf-fing through this City for the Garrifons of Liste and Au-denard. They write from the Frontiers, that the Enemy are very backward in their Preparations for taking the Field; and that the Entrenchments they are casting up near Maubeuge are carried on very flowly. Baron Offkerke arrived at Valenciennes from Verfailles on the 19th Instant, and reports that the French Court are very uneasse from the Accounts they daily receive of the unanimous Resolutions of the Allies, to augment their Forces, and unite their Endeavours to profecute the War with the utmost Vigour, or oblige France to submit to such Terms that may establish a safe and honourable Peace. That Court hath therefore dispatched circular Letters to all the French Regiments on the Frontiers, commanding the Captains to get their Companies compleated by the end of the next-Month, on the Penalty of being cashiered; but they have not remitted the Officers Mony sufficient to the companies of the next-Month of the Officers Mony sufficient to the Officers Mon cient to enable them to put these Orders in Execution. These Advices add, that it was reported that Mareschal Villars would command the Army in Flanders the enfuing Campaign. They begin to cloatly the French Troops, and also some Recruits that are raised for the Service, the greater part of whom are either Boys, or weak and fickly Men. We are also advised from the Frontiers, that the Troops which were fent from Doway to reinforce the Garrison of Marchiennes, being relieved by the two Battalions of Rogelly, were returned to their former Quarters, but in so miserable a Condition, that the Battalion of Septville, which confifted of 450 Men when they marched out of Doway, was reduced to eighty, and that one hundred and fifty died out of that of Lulonde, during three Weeks Stay in that City; most of whom were starved to

Hague, February 25. N. S. The States of Holland adjourned themselves last Saturday to the 12th of the next Month; at which time they are to resime the Confideration of proper Methods for raifing the necessary Funds which are not yet established for the Publick Service. General Fagel, and feveral Officers, are already fet out for the Netherlands, and are daily followed by divers others, who are returning to their respective Commands in Flanders, in pursuance to the late Orders of this State, and all other Preparations are continued for an of Spain to her Britannick Majesty, went trom this Place last Saturday, in order to embark in the first Packet boat that shall fail for Great Britain.
