By the QUEEN, A PROCLAMATION.

ANNE R.

E being informed. That the Streets and Paf-Sages leading through our Cities of London fages leading through our Cities of London and Westminster, and Suburbs thereof, have been filled of late with great Numbers of loofe, idle, and disorderly Persons, who resort this there in Crouds, and in a ristous tumilituous manner offer Violence to the Persons and Coaches of divers of our Liege. Subjects, whose lawful Occasions require them to pass and resals the same, which at this time greatly tends to the Obfindion of the Course of Justice in our High Court of Par-liament; and that among these disorderly Rabble there are divers Papifts, Persons disaffected to our Government, who bive never taken any Oaths appointed by Law to be taken, to bear Faith and true Allegiance to us; but in open Defiante of our Regal Authority, as Enemies of our Grown and Dignity, have so far transgressed the known Laws of this Land, as in a rebellious manner to a pear in many Places of our said Cities and Suburds, bearing Weapons in their Huds, and with Force breaking open and entring divers Huges and Edifices belonging to our Subjects, in several Point of our Subjects, in several Pais of our faid Cities and Suburbs: And having received A bumble Address from our Commons of Great Britain in Pallament affembled, expressing their just Detestation and Assortance of these wicked, seditions, and traiterous Practices, and beserving us, That we would be graciously pleased to take effectual Measures to suppress these Tumutts, set up and fomented by Papisti, Nongurors, and other Enemies to our Title and Government, as aforefaid, and to issue forth our Rojal Pretlamation, promising a Reward to such as shall discover and seizes these incendiaries as have been the Occasion of the said late Tumults and Disorders: We taking the Premisses into our Rojal Consideration, by the Alvice of our i rivy Council, and in pursuance of the said later to the said consideration. bumble Address of our faid Commons in this present Parliament affembled, have thought fit to put forth this our Royal Proclamation, to declare. That all futh Rioters, Traitors, and Rebels, and all their Accomplices, Adherents, Abetters, and Advisers shall be forthwith proceeded against actailing to the utmost Severity of Law. And we do hereby firstly charge and require all car good Subjects, to use their umoff Endeavours to feize and apprehend the Persons of all such Rioters, Traitors, and Rebels, and their Accomplices, and to secure the same in safe Custony, until our further Pleasure shall be known. And we do hereby promise and dedate, That phoever shall discover any such Incendiaries as have been the Occasion of the late Tumults and Disorders, or have been ective in exciting, and florring up the fame, for the creative in excising, and firring up the same, for the creating the brought to fusice, shall have and received as a Reward for such Discovery, the Sum of One kladred Pennils. And we do hereby command the Lord Mayor of London, and all o-

ther Justices of the Peace, and other Officers within the faid Cities, and ten Miles from the fame, that the make Search for, and proceed against all such Papists, and other Persons disaffected to our Government, as they shall food; and be in formed are not demeaning themselves according to Law. And or do likewife commandall Justices of the Peace, and other Officers in that behalf authorized, to tender unio such Peron or Persons as they shall find, or be informed are suspected not to be well affected to our Government, the Oaths that are appointed by an Ast made in the first Year of the Reign of their late Majesties King William and Queen Mary, Intituled, [An Act for Abrogating the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy, and Appointing other Oath.] And in case any such Person or Persons shall refuse to take the same, we do hereby direct and require due Prosecution to be made thereupon. And we do hereby frictly charge and require all Deputy Lieutenants, and Justices of the Peace, that they do frequently meet to inquire into, and inform them-felves of the Affairs of their respective Districts, in relation serves of the Assured of their respective inspirits, in recusion to the Premisses; and that they take especial Care to preserve the Peace, and prevent all unlawful Meetings and riotous Assemblies; and that from time to time they do give Informations of their Proceedings and Discoveries, to the Lords of our Privy Council. And we do likewish things and command all Lord Lieutenznis, Deputy Lieutenants, Sheriffs, Justices of the Peare, Mayors, Easiffs, and all orther our Officers Civil and Military, frielly 10 put in Execution all Laws and Statutes what sever now in Force, a gainst Transcons, traiserous Conspirations, Riots, Robits, unlawa ful Affemblies, and other Breaches of the Peace, and agains such Persons as have refused, or shall resuse to take the Oxids required by Law.

Berlin, March t. N. S. On Monday left the Duke of Cou land began his Journey to M-mel. When that Prince took leave of the Court, his Majetty prefented him with a Purse of one thousand new coined Ducats. We are as-fured from Vienna, that Prince Eugene will come hither in his way to Holland, and we do not question but his in Italy another Year. Montieur Wyberg, who hath refiled fome time at the Imperial Court as Envoy from the King of Denmark, arrived here last Tuesday in his way to Copenhagen. His Danish Majesty had appointed Count Velo, an Italian, to succeed him at Vienna; but his Imperial Majefty hath fignified to the King of D. nmark, that he was unwilling to receive the Count as his Minister. and defired him to nomina:e another. His Pruffian Majefty hath accommoda ed the Differences between Count Erbach and Monfieur Bolefwin, concerning their Pret nfions to the Revenue of a Command ry a ter the Decease of Monsieur Fleming, the present Possessor. His Majesty hath determined that they shall divide the Income between them, as long as both shall live, and the Survivor shall enjoy the whole. Both are well sa issied with his Majesty's Determination, and Count Erbach designs netian Ambaffador at the Higue is specially expected here to Compliment his Majesty on this Occasion. The Minister of Hanover hath received the King's Letter, requiring leave for the Passage of the Prussian Recruirs into the Netherlands through the Dominions of his Elector: I Highnels.

The two Ministers were attended only by five or fix Domesticks.

A strong Detachment from our Garrisons in Fland rs being fent to cover the Workmen who are employed in fortifying Warneton and Commines, for the Security of the Navigation between Menin and Lifle; it bath given fuch an Alarm to the Enemy, that Marshal Boufflers is come to Ipres on that Occasion. They write from Dousy of the 3d Instant, that on the 27th and 28th of the last Morth the Garrison had plundered the Shops of the Bakers, and the Corn-Market of that City, which obliged the Governor to post immediately a Centinel at the Corner of each Street, to place a Guard of twenty five Dragoons at every Market-place, and to distribute some Mony among the Soldiers. These Letters add, that they had begun to repair the Outworks of that Town, and were electing new Fortifications at Lens. Advices from the Frontiers fay, that the Marquis de Lede arrived at Valenciennes on the 4th Instant from Condé; that the Inundation of St. Amand and Vicegne obliged the Inhabitants to continue in their Upper Rooms, and to use Boats for their Passage through the Streets; that the Garrison suffered very much by the Waters, and three Companies of Hussars had received Orders to retire to Valenciennes. Letters from Paris fay, that the Assembly of the Clergy was to be opened on the 10th Instant; and that the Cardinal de Noailles, Arch-Bishop of Paris, was to preside over their Debates. The Duke of Anjou ha h made the Bishop of Siguença viceroy of Arragon, and the Bishop of Murcia Viceroy of Valentia.

Helvoetsluys, March 7. N. S. S at Night. The Duke of Mariborough landed here this Evening, after a Voyage of three Days; he lay from seven in the Morning till two in the Atternoon rowling on the Sea, about three Leagues to the Southward of this Place.
