A PROCLAMATION.

ANNE R.

WHereas the Justices assigned for the several Circuits of that Part of our Kingdom of Great Britain called England, have prefixed and published the Days and Places for holding this present Lent Assizes within their respective Circuits: And whereas, for divers Weighty and Important Reasons, we have thought fit to make some Alterations as to the Days of holding the Assizes in some Counties, which we have directed shall be deferred for some time longer; and in Observance thereof our said Justices have agreed upon, and given in Notes of order and further Days for holding the said Assizes in those Counties: We therefore, out of our Princely Care that our Loving Subjects may have timely Notice, and to prevent (as much as in us lies) all Inconveniencies that may happen to them by such Alterations, and that the due Administration of Justice may (as we earnestly desire) proceed effectually, and be equally distributed, have thought fit, with the Advice of our Privy-Council, to publish and declare, and we hereby publish and declare the several Prefixions given in by our said Justices for holding the Assizes in their several Circuits, as they are herein after expressed and set down in the first of this our Royal Proclamation, to the end that our said Subjects, whom the same shall concern, having Knowledge thereof, may conform themselves accordingly.

Westminster, March 13. Her Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers; and being in Her Royal Robes seated on the Throne, with the usual Solemnity, Mr. Aston, Deputy Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from Her Majesty to the House of Commons, requiring their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, Her Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

An Act for granting to Her Majesty new Duties of Excise, and upon several Imported Commodities, and for Establishing a yearly Fund thereby, and by other Ways and Means, to raise Nine hundred thousand Pounds by Sale of Annuities, and (in Default thereof) by another Lottery, for the Service of the Year One thousand seven hundred and ten.

An Act for Clearing, Preserving and Maintaining the Harbour of Catwater, lying near Plymouth in the County of Devon, and for Cleansing and keeping clean the Pool commonly called Sutton's Pool lying in Plymouth aforesaid.

Copenhagen, March 11. N. S. Lieutenant-General Weebe, Vice-Sradtholder of Norway, is lately dead, but no one is yet named to succeed him in that Employment. The Danish Lieutenant-Colonel Bibau, who was taken in a late Action between a Party of Horse under his Command and a Body of the Swedes, has been sent back on his Parole: He highly commends the Humanity of the Swedes, and particularly of Major-General Meyerfeld, for the great Care he has taken, that such of the Danish Prisoners as are wounded, may be supplied with all manner of Necessaries. Feldt-Marshal Wedel is not yet arrived. General Revenlau is somewhat recovered since he was brought hither, but is not yet entirely out of Danger. An Express arrived here last Night, with Advice that the Swedes had Yesterday Morning attacked the Danish Army; that the Action had been very bloody on both sides, and was not quite ended when this Express left the Army, which was about four a Clock in the Afternoon: But that the Danes were then giving Ground, and had lost many Officers. Lieutenant-General Rantzau, who commanded the Danish Army, was wounded on the Breast, and on the Arm, and is brought to Elsinore. We expect other Expresses to bring further Particulars of that Action. The Person that brought this News Yesterday not being an Officer, has not given a very distinct Account of the Engagement. Lieutenant-General Cormaillon, Governor of this Town, is sent to command the Army. The King is gone this Afternoon to Elsinore.

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Brussels, March 17. N. S. This Morning a Domestick Messenger to the Marshal d'Uxelles passed through this Place for Gertruydenberg, with Dispatches from the Court of France for the French Ministers at that Place. The Infantry of the Allies quartered in this City is almost compleated, the Cavalry remained, and the General Review of those Troops will be made on the 25th Instant. Some Regiments of our Garrison are ordered to be in Readiness to march on the first Notice, in order to reinforce the Troops that cover our Workmen on the Fortifications of Warneton and Commines, if the Enemy should attempt to give them any Disturbance. Advices from Maubeuge say, that the Town was filled with Pioneers, who are to be employed in raising new Works for the Defence of the Place. All Advices agree, that the Enemy have made no Magazines of Forage, nor laid in any Stores of Provisions on the Frontiers; that they have yet received no fresh Horses for their Cavalry, and but very few Men for recruiting their Infantry. Letters from Valenciennes, dated the 14th Instant, say, that the Garrison of that Place was reviewed on the 13th, but the number of their Troops is very little augmented since they marched into Winter Quarters, the Recruits being hardly sufficient to supply the Places of those that have died since the last Campaign. The Soldiers have yet received none of their Pay, and are much disheartned for want of Provisions. These Letters add, that it was confidently reported the Peace would be speedily concluded, but that the Officers were preparing their Equipages for the Field. Marshal Villars is expected in Flanders the latter end of this Month, in order to take upon him the Command of the French Army.

Hague, March 18. N. S. The States of Holland are to be re-assembled to Morrow. Messieurs Buys and Vanderdussen are not yet returned to Gertruydenberg, but are ready to set out as soon as they are advised of the Arrival of a Courier, which is expected from Paris. The Abbot de Pellignac and the Marquis d'Uxelles continue at Gertruydenberg. Lieutenant General Cadogan hath been here for some days, but is to return to Morrow for Flanders, in order to hasten the Preparations for opening the Campaign, which are so forward, that our Army may take the Field the beginning of the next Month, and be sufficiently supplied with dry Forage as long as there shall be Occasion. We are advised from the Frontiers, that our Workmen who are employed on the Fortifications of Warneton, Commines, and other Posts on the Lys, proceed without any Molestation from the Enemy. Yesterday we received Advice by an Express, that the Swedes in Schonen had attacked the Danish Army on the 10th Instant, and entirely defeated them. We have not yet the Particulars of that Action; but it is said that the main Body of the Danes were killed, or made Prisoners or War. Yesterday in the Evening Lieutenant-General Lumley and Lieutenant General Wood arrived here from England, and are set out from hence this Evening for Flanders. Advices from Paris of the 14th Instant say, that since the Decease of the Duke of Bourbon, whose Funeral was solemnized with the same Honours and Magnificence as were observed for his Father the Prince of Condé, the French King had regulated the Order of Precedence of the Princes and Princesses of the Blood, and the Duke of Enguien succeeds his Father as Duke of Bourbon, Count Charolois, his second Brother, takes upon him the Title of Duke of Enguien, who is succeeded in that Honour of Charolois by a third Brother. These Letters add, that Monsieur Pomponne was returned from his Embassy to the Republick of Venice, and was favourably received by his Majesty. Advices from Spain say, the Court of Madrid labours under great Difficulties for want of Money, and have ordered several Persons to be imprisoned for refusing to lend the same to the Duke of Anjou, at the Interest of 8 per Cent. that some Companies of Volunteers are to be raised in the several Provinces of Spain, besides the regular Troops, who are to be maintained at their own Charge; and that the Marquis de Mortonegro had made some Incursions into Portugal, and burnt and plundered several Villages.

Dartmouth, March 9. On the 7th Instant put in here her Majesty's Ship the *Montague* from Cruising. Captain Carlton Commander, who, about nine a Clock the same day, took a French Privateer of ten Guns and seventy five Men, and a French King William Packet-Boat, taken on the French four Months back.

Dartmouth, March 10. On the 8th Instant came into Torbay a Plymouth Transport of and for Plymouth from St. Malo, and brought in here four hundred forty seven English Prisoners from Dinant Prison, amongst them Captain Hanaway, who was taken in the Plymouth Prize, and Lieutenant Gully that was taken in St. John's at Newfoundland. This Day came in here the *Eugene*, a Guernsey Privateer, from Cruising; her Consort, commanded by Captain Chubb, carrying six Guns and fifty two Men, foundered at Sea, eight or nine Leagues W. N. W. from the Land's end, and all the Men were drowned; they had tent in four Prizes laden with Clarret into Guernsey, which they took in the River of Bourdeaux.
