It is an offence to demolish a building, or a part of a building, within a designated Conservation Area, without the necessary consent having first been obtained from the

appropriate local planning authority.

It should be further noted that any person having it in mind to cut down, top, lop, uproot, wilfully damage or wilfully destroy any tree in a designated Conservation Area must give the district or borough council in whose area the tree is growing six weeks notice of his intention so to do.

The Conservation Areas

Kennet District :

Littleton Panell and West Lavington: Little Panell—
It encompasses the whole of the village. West Lavington—
It encompasses the majority of the village. The northern boundary line follows the B.3098 road from Dauntsey's School in the west to a point just past its intersection with the A.360. It then continues southwards, excluding more recent new development along its eastern fringes, to include an area around West Lavington Manor and several outling. an area around West Lavington Manor and several outlying buildings in the south. The southern boundary runs westwards (past the small stream running through the village), and it then bends northwards to form the western boundary, which includes several outlying buildings such as those in Strawberry Hill.

Market Lavington: It encompasses the majority of the village. To the east the line bounds the rear of property village. To the east the line bounds the rear of property fronting on to the eastern side of the High Street up to the recent development on the site of Fiddington House and to the east of the High Street. The southern boundary encompasses property on either side of White Street, Nap House and the rear of property fronting on to the southern side of Church Street. The boundary then incorporates Grove Farm, and to the north bounds the rear of properties along Church Street. From approximately half way along along Church Street. From approximately half way along Parsonage Lane, the boundary runs west-east towards the Vicarage. The line then returns to the High Street, bounding the rear of property on the northern side and terminating short of the new development on the site of Fiddington

Mildenhall: The boundary line encloses the main nucleus of the village, along the main street. Also included is the group of buildings around the church in the south and the water meadows to the east of the village.

Ogbourne St. Andrew: It encompasses the majority of the village, merely excluding the more recent development bordering the main A.345 road running past the village, and also such development along its northern edge.

Wilsford: It encompasses the whole of the village, extending eastwards to include the old Corn Mill and also southwards to include an area of open land to the rear of Wilsford House.

Wootton Rivers: The boundary line encompasses the majority of the village, excluding several of the more recent buildings along its north-west and south-east fringes. southern limit is formed by the northern edge of the railway line.

Worton: From a point immediately west of Christ Church, the boundary extends northwards to form the western limit terminating near, and including Hope Cottage. The boundary next turns eastwards to include the rear of those properties bordering the northern section of the road through the village and extends just north of Park Farm, where it turns southwards to include Park Farm, forming the eastern limit. From a position immediately south of Park Farm the line turns westwards to form the southern bound-ary and extends beyond Christ Church to include the stream and footpath leading to Worton Mill, along with a small area of open land lying to the south of the stream, whilst omitting land to the north.

Ansty: The boundary line encompasses the majority of the main settlement of Ansty. From a point north to Lower Farm, adjacent to the timber yard, the line extends southwards as far as and to include St. James' Church. From here the line runs westwards for a short distance forming the southern boundary line, then bends northwards, being approximately mid-way between the hamlet of Ansty Coombe and Ansty itself, and terminates at a point west of the timber yard. From here the line bends eastwards before terminating at the original point north of wards before terminating at the original point north of Lower Farm.
