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An Abstract of an Act for granting to Her Majesty New Duties of Excise, and upon several imported Commodities, and for establishing a yearly Fund thereby, and by other Ways and Means, to raise Nine hundred thousand Pounds by Sale of Annuities, and (in Default thereof) by another Lottery, for the Service of the Year 1710.

THE Commons of Great Britain in Parliament Assembled, being desirous by the most easie and effectual Ways to raise the necessary Supplies for prosecuting the present War, and for enabling her Majesty at the end thereof to establish a good and lasting Peace, have, for that Purpose, granted to her Majesty the several Duties, Impositions, and Sums of Money herein after mentioned: And it is Enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons in this present Parliament Assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That from the 25th of March 1710, the following new Duties of Excise shall be raised and paid to her Majesty, for the Term of thirty two Years: That is to say,

For every Barrel of Beer or Ale (above 6s. the Barrel exclusive of the Duties of Excise) brewed for Sale, and so proportionably for a greater or lesser Quantity, to be paid by the Brewer 3d. and for every Barrel of Beer or Ale of or under that Value 1d.

For every Hogshead of Cyder and Perry made and sold by Retail, to be paid by the Retailer 5d.

For every Hoghead of Verjuice, to be paid by the Maker 1d.

For every Gallon of Metheglin, or Mead, made for Sale, to be paid by the Maker for every Gallon 1d.

For every Barrel of Vinegar made for Sale, to be paid by the Maker 9d.

For every Gallon of Strong Waters, or Aqua Vitæ made for Sale, to be paid by the Maker 1d.

For every Gallon of Spirits made in Great Britain, of any kind of Wines or Cyder imported, 2d.

Which Duties are to be raised, collected, and paid in the same manner as any other Duties of Excise formerly granted.

And it is further Enacted, That every Barrel of Two-penny Ale shall be only charged by this Act with such a proportional Part of 3d. as 2s. bears to 4s. 9d. All Makers of Vinegar for Pickles are liable to the Duties of this Act, but Vinegar used in making white Lead is exempted.

It is also Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That the following Additional Duties be laid on all manner of Pepper, Raisins, Nutmegs, Cinnamon, Cloves and Mace, and such Snuff as is herein after mentioned, imported, or to be imported, for thirty two Years from the 6th of February 1709, that is to say, for every Pound of Pepper 1s. 6d. for every hundred Weight of Raisins 5s. and for all Nutmegs, Cinnamon, Cloves and Mace, as much as the same Spices already pay, it being intended that the present Duties shall be doubled; and for every Pound of Snuff imported, not being the Product of her Majesty's Plantations, 3s.

And for the better securing, and more easie Payment of the said Duties upon Pepper, it is Enacted, That all Pepper imported after the 17th of February 1709, shall, upon Entry, be forthwith put into Warehouses provided for that Purpose, at the Charge of the Importers; and half the Subsidy payable for Pepper imported shall then be paid down by the Importer; and if the same be consumed in Great Britain, the whole Duty shall be paid by

the Purchaser before it be delivered out of the said Warehouse; but if the said Pepper be for Exportation to foreign Parts, Security shall be given to her Majesty's Commissioners of the Customs, that it shall be all exported, and not re-landed in Great Britain, and all other Duties, but the half Subsidy, shall be discharged when it is delivered out of the said Warehouse to be thus exported.

And for preventing all Clandestine Importing of Pepper, it is Enacted, That if any Pepper be brought in at any Port in Great Britain, besides that of London, or into that Port, and the Entries be not made of its Importation, and the Pepper be not carried into the aforesaid Warehouses, such Pepper shall be adjudged unlawfully imported, and the Persons offending shall not only lose the same, but also one hundred Pounds; one half whereof is to be paid to her Majesty, and the other half to the Seizers, or Informers.

And for preventing any Clandestine carrying out of Pepper, it is Enacted, That the Keepers of the Warehouses shall enter an exact Account of all Pepper brought in, or carried out of the said Warehouses, and when and for what Uses it was delivered; and shall, at the end of every six Months, transmit in Writing an exact Account thereof upon Oath to the Commissioners of the Customs, together with an exact Account of how much shall be then remaining in their Warehouses; and if, upon Examination, it shall appear that any of the said Pepper was brought in, or carried out, otherwise than on the Terms and Method aforesaid, the Warehouse keeper shall forfeit the value of the Pepper, be disaffected from any publick Employment for the future, and forfeit one hundred Pound for every Offence.

Provided always, That the Importers of Raisins, Nutmegs, Cinnamon, Cloves, Mace, or Snuff, giving Security at the Custom-House, shall have twelve Months time for the Payment of the Duties, or 10 l. per Cent. Abatement in case of prompt Payment.

It is also Enacted, That in case any such Raisins, Nutmegs, Cinnamon, Cloves, Mace, and Snuff, be landed before due Entry be made, the Duties charged thereupon be paid or secured, or without a Warrant from proper Officers of the Customs, the same shall be forfeited, one half to her Majesty, and the other to such Persons as shall seize, inform, or sue for the same.

Provided always, That in case any of the said Commodities be again Exported within eighteen Months by British Merchants, or nine Months by Aliens, from the Day of their Entry, the Duties shall be forthwith repaid, or the Securities given be vacated.

And it is further Enacted, That those new Duties be levied by such Rules and Methods as other Duties now charged on the same Commodities.

And for preventing the landing of any Goods subject to the Payment of Duties without paying the same, or the Importation of any prohibited Goods, it is further Enacted, That all Persons concerned in landing such Uncustomed prohibited Goods, or they to whose Hands the same shall afterwards knowingly come, shall forfeit treble the Value, and all the Cattle and Carriages employed therein.

It is also Enacted, That all Merchants and Dealers in Pepper shall pay 1 s. 6 d. for every Pound of Pepper in their Custody on the 8th of February 1709, and make a just Entry of their present Stocks at the next Custom-house, before the 8th of April 1710, and permit proper Officers to take Account of the same before the 15th of May 1710, on Penalty, in case of neglect or refusal, of forfeiting their said Stocks.

Provided that in case of prompt Payment of the said Duties an Abatement, after the Rate of 10 l. per Cent. be

be allowed for six Months, and that the Duties be repaid in case of Exportation within eighteen Months.

And it is Enacted, That all the said several Duties on excisable Liquors be under the Management of the Commissioners of Excise, and the Duties on imported Commodities under the Management of the Commissioners of the Customs, and the Sums of Money arising from thence shall be distinctly paid into the Exchequer every Wednesday.

It is also further Enacted, That the Duties arising from the said Commodities shall be charged with the yearly Fund of Eighty one thousand Pounds for thirty two Years, from the 29th of September 1710; and in case the Monies arising from the said Duties shall not amount to that Sum, or to so much as shall be sufficient to discharge the Annuities appointed by this Act, then the Deficiency shall be supplied out of the Surplus of Duties granted by an Act of this Session of Parliament on Coals and Windows; and in default of such Surplus, by the first Aid to be granted in Parliament.

And it is Enacted, That it may be lawful for all Persons, Natives or Foreigners, to pay into the Exchequer any Sums of Money not exceeding Nine hundred thousand Pounds, for the absolute Purchase of certain Annuities for the Term of Thirty two Years, from the 29th of September 1710, at the rate of 91 per Cent, which Purchase Money is to be paid on or before the 1st of May, the 1st of July, the 1st of September, and the 1st of November, in the Year 1710, by quarterly Payments, and the Annuities shall be payable at the four most usual Feasts or Days of Payment in the Year; the first Payment to be due at the Feast of the Birth of Christ, 1710.

And it is hereby Enacted, That the Contributors Names, and the Sums by them paid, shall be entered in a Book in the Exchequer, to which they may have resort without Fee.

And it is further Enacted, That the said Annuities shall be paid out of the Monies arising by the said Duties, and other Provisions made by this Act, free from all Charges whatsoever.

It is also Enacted, That the Contributors shall receive Tallies, importing the Receipt of so much Purchase Money as shall be paid; and upon Payment of all the Purchase Money for any Annuity, they shall receive an Order, signed by the Treasurer and Under-Treasurer of the Exchequer, for paying the said Annuities for the Term of Thirty two Years: And Interest, after the rate of 91 per Cent, shall be allowed for the prompt Payment of any purchase Money before the 29th of September 1710.

And it is further Enacted, That any Purchaser may Assign such Annuities, or any part thereof, by Will or Writing, whereof Assignment is not revocable, if Entry be made in the Books to be kept in the Office of the Auditor of the Receipt within three Months after such Assignment.

Provided always, That no Person may purchase any Annuity, unless one fourth Part of the Money at least be paid on or before the 1st of May 1710; and that the Purchasers, not paying their full Consideration Money at the aforesaid appointed Day, shall forfeit what they may have advanced.

And it is hereby further Enacted, That within 21 Days after the 1st of May 1710, the Lord Treasurer shall take an Account of all the Sums of Money which shall be paid into the Exchequer for Annuities before the 1st of May, will amount to, and how much of the said yearly Fund of Eighty one thousand Pounds will remain undisposed of, Publication whereof shall be made in the London Gazette, and by affixing the same upon the Royal Exchange in London; and if it appears that there is any Remainder, it shall be disposed of by way of Lottery.
