Dublin, April, 30.

THis place seems abundantly satisfied with his Excellencies proceedings since his Entry upon the Government of this kingdom, upon which occasion he has been complimented by all persons of greatest Eminency.

On Tuesday the 26th instant, the University of *Dublin* attended his Excellency, introduced by the Lord Primate, where Doctor *Ward* in the name of the rest, made to him an excellent Oration in Latine, to which his Excellency made his return in English, letting them know the kindness he had for Learning and Learned men, concluding with Counsel, that they would apply their minds and studies to the most useful parts of Learnings; such as did most conduce to the benefit of Mankind, to which he promised them all due encouragement.

Madrid, April 19. The 16th instant assembled a Counsel lately established by the Queen Regent, by the advice of the Council of the Monarchy, wherein are to be considered the best ways and method of retrenching all the unnecessary expences of the Crown, and to reform all abuses which have crept into the Exchequer. This Council consists of the President of *Castille* who is the Chair man, the Admiral of *Castille*, and the Marquis de *Castel Rodrigo* as Counsellors of State; the Marquis of *Tregley* and *Monsalva*, as Members of the Council of *Castill*: the President and two Counsellors of the Court of the Exchequer, to whom the Queen has added Father *Elezalde*, a Jesuite; the Council is to meet three times a week.

The Duke de *Villa Hermosa*, on whom the Queen conferred the charge of General of the Cavalry in the *Netherlands*, which was vacant by the removal of the Prince de *Ligne* to the Viceroyalty of *Sicily*, went hence the 13th instant for *St Sebastians*, followed by a numerous Train, and intends to embark there for *Offend*.

The Venetian Ambassador has taken his leave of their Majesties, but departs not from hence till the arrival of Signior *Carlo Contarini*.

The Duke de *Veraques* is returning to *Cadix* to take care of his Charge in the Command of the Fleet.

Malaga, April 22. The *Falcon* and *Speedwel* have been long detained in this Port by contrary winds, with several Merchant ships under their conduct. This day came in here the *Portland* Frigate Captain *Hart* Commander, with five other Merchant ships from *Turky* and *Italy* whom he hath left under the protection of the *Falcon* and *Speedwel*, and is put to sea, intending for the coast of *Barbary* to joyn with Sir *Thomas Allen*. Off *Cape de Gaet* they were viewed by five men of war of *Argiers* against whom the *Portland* fired several Guns, but they had not the courage to attempt him.

The 20th instant, came into *Alicant* 13 sail of English Merchants from *Turky* and several parts of *Italy*, and with them as many *Hollanders* with a States man of war their Convoy.

A small Turkish prize formerly taken by some English Frigats and now commanded by Captain *Tempest*, coming lately upon these coasts, informs, that Sir *Thomas Allen* had shewn himself with his Squadron before *Argiers*, whither he had sent in his boat to sound their intentions,

but finding them still obstinate, he passed thence 10 miles to the Eastwards, where the Moors were building a Fort to receive their ships and to shelter them upon any occasion, upon which, they had planted many Guns, which for some time they fired at him, but he so warmly plyed them for three hours together, with his broad sides that the Moors were forced to quit their posts.

Legora, April 28. A Bark arriving here in 6 days from *Messina* informs us, that Sir *John Harman* was lately arrived there with Captain *Darcy*, and the *Tunisens*, which last forbore to enter or land any Goods at *Tunis*, the French men of war being then before the place blocking up the Port, till satisfaction were given for injuries offered them at sea.

This Bark informs us, that Sir *John Harman*, intended in two days to put to sea from *Messina*, bound for this place, in company with 17 sail of ships, *English*, *Genouese* and others that are under his Convoy.

Two hundred soldiers, the remainder of the forces sent by the Great Duke to assist the Venetians in the defence of *Candia*, are lately returned, and have been testified upon the Great Dukes account; those amongst them that have been maimed in the service, are to have a Pension settled on them of four Crowns a month during life, the others to be taken and entertained in the Garrisons, and in acknowledgement of the valour shown by them in the late wars, are ordered to receive a Crown a piece every month above the ordinary pay.

Genova, April 30. The 26 instant arrived here in 14 dayes from *Cadix* the *Jersy* *Consurion* and the *Fame*, with one empty *Himbounger* in their Company, and intend in two days for *Leghorne* to *Carrine* and *Virtual*.

His Excellency my Lord *Falconbridge* is suddenly expected here from *Turin*, the Senate intending to receive him with Extraordinary honors, every way answerable to the kind Reception he has had at *Turin*, and the respects they bear to his Eminent Character.

Turin, May 3. His Excellency my Lord *Falconbridge* having newly finished his Negotiation in this Court, where he has been received and treated with much honour and respect, intends in little time to take his leave and proceed hence to *Genova*.

The young Prince is pretty well recovered of his distemper, which adds not a little to the satisfaction of this Court.

The Duke of *Savoy* is endeavouring with much earnestness, the improvement of Trade and Commerce within his Dominions, and intends (though at a vast expence) so to repair the ways between *Villa Franca* and the River *Po*, that whereas the Merchants are forced to lade their Goods upon Mules, and with a great expence of time and Moneys to convey them from *Genova* and *Florence*, a free and easie passage will be made over *Lombardy* to *Venice* for Waggon and Carts, so the great improvement of their Trade.

We have here advice from *Italy* of the Election of a new Pope, Cardinal *Altieri* a Roman, of 74 years of age by the name of *Clement* the X, who hath declared Cardinal *Pallucci*, to be the Cardinal Patron, and is to be known by the name of *Altieri*.

Venice, May 3. From *Corfu* we are told that the Visier is fitting up all the ships he can for the Service of his Fleet, and that he had already gotten together from several Ports about 40 sayle, besides several men of War of *Barbary*, which gives some jealousy to the Neighbouring Princes, who

who suppose it to be a greater preparation then is necessary for his transportation into *Morea*.

The Senate have ordered a considerable sum of Moneys to be sent to their Proveditor General in *Dalmatia*, for the service of the several Garrisons within that Province. The General maintains a good correspondency with the Bassa, who commands the Neighbouring Countrey, taking away all occasions of dispute; many Compliments pass between them and presents, each of them contending to outvie one another in Acts of kindness and generosity.

General *Wertmiller* is lately returned home from *Dalmatia*, where he had upon all occasions given great proofs of his Valour and Conduct. On Monday last he attended the Colledge, whether he was followed by a great train of Officers lately returned also from the same Province and from *Candia*.

Even now arrived here an Extraordinary Courier from Rome with the news that Cardinal *Altieri* was promoted to the Pontifical Chair, and taken the name of *Clement the X*.

Hague, May 9. On Munday last, the Ratifications of the Triple Alliance were mutually enterchanged, and the Moneys deposited for the Swedes have been since paid.

The Heer Van *Beuning* is preparing to set forwards on his journey for *England*, and the Heer de *Groot* on his extraordinary Ambassy to *France*.

The Heer *Opdam* is upon departure with an Honourable Train to Compliment his most Christian Majesty at *Lille*, with whom goes also the young Count de *Pons*, with several other persons of quality.

Monsieur de *Pompe* the French Ambassador, has communicated to the States his resolution of attending the King his Master at *Lille*, and intends to set forward the 17th instant.

Amsterdam, May 9. Most of the Fleet from *Cadis* are arrived, but the man of war belonging to this City stayed behind, upon a dispute between those of *Zealand*, *Rotterdam* and this place, which of them should carry the Flag.

One of our Merchant ships designed for this place which came from *Cadis* under the *Korterdam* Convoy is put into the *Meuse*, whither the Captain of the said Convoy would oblige the interested persons to fetch their Goods, according to an agreement made, before he would permit the ship to return under his conduct, of which complaint is made to the States.

Paris, May 10. His Majesty still continues his progress, taking view of his late Conquests.

The 30th past he left *Compiègne* and went to *Noyon*, where the Mayor of the Town complimented him at the Gates, and presented him the keys of the City in a silver Basin, and lodged that night at the Bishops Palace; the Citizens in a body complimenting their Majesties, and making a Present to the Dauphin.

The next day the 1st instant they passed thence to *Magny* and *Ham*, and lodged at *St Quintin* where the Duke d' *Elboeuf*, Governour of that Province, attended by the Sheriffs, presented the Keys to his Majesty; the next day his Majesty received the usual Presents, visited the Fortifications, walking the round upon the Ramparts, taking also a view of the Outworks; and the 3d instant departed thence intending for *Vadancours*, five Leagues distant from *St Quintin*. The fourth instant, his Majesty by reason of the great Rains, found some interruption in his way near *Avesnes*, by reason of the Floods, which constrained him to take up his Quarters that night in a mean Cottage with the Queen, Monsieur, Madam, and the Dauphin, to lodge all night in his Coach, and the next morning without any Ceremony came to *Landrages*.

The 5th instant died in his house in this City, *François Hanibal d' Esrees*, Marquis of *Coeuvres*, a Knight of the Holy Spirit, Duke, and Peer, and first Marshal of *France* in the 102 year of his age.

From *Rouffillon* we have advice, that the Angelets or Mountainers, who were formerly accustomed to give some disturbance to their neighbors, are lately formed into a Military body of about 2000 men, under the command of the Sieur de *Baugerie* of the County of *Rouffillon*, and have taken several small Towns, and have since invested *Villa Franca*; but the Count de *Chamilly* who commands his Majesties forces in those parts, has drawn together a considerable strength, to which he has added four Companies drawn out of *Perpignan*, and has sent for a greater assistance from the adjacent Towns of *Languedoc*, intending to fall upon these Angelets before they are grown too numerous, and to plunder and burn all places which are known to side with them.

Letters of the 19th past from *Narbon* inform us, that upon a quarrel lately arising between the Citizens and the Soldiery, the people of the Town got together, and with stones and such other weapons as came first to hand, forced the Regiment de *Baudeville* to quit the Town, after whose departure, the Townsmen shut their Gates against them, and seized on all their Baggage, and what publick Moneys could be discovered in the Town.

The 7th instant passed by this City a Courier from Rome, to acquaint his Majesty, that the Conclave have at the last made choice of Cardinal *Altieri*, a Creature of *Clement the IXth* to succeed in the Papacy, of which we daily expect the confirmation.

London, May 8. On Friday the 6th instant Monsieur de *Lindenow* Envoye from the King of *Denmark*, had his first Audience from their Majesties, and the next day from their Royal Highnesses, to which he was conducted by Sir *Charles Cotterel* the Master of the Ceremonies.
