Turin, March 19. N. S.
AST Friday the Duke and Durchels of Savoy, with the young Princes their Children, arrived here from the Venerie, to affift at an established Devotion, in Celebration of the Santo Sudario, a Relick much esteemed here, and kept with the highest Veneration in the Cathedral Church of Sr. John; the next Day the Court returned to the Venerie, where they delign to continue fill Friday next. The best part of the Recruits for the Troops of his Royal Highness, as well as for the three new Barralions which have been raifed this Winter, having joined elieir respective Regiments, General Rhebinder hath received his Royal Highnes's Orders to make the Diffi-bution of those who are to take the Field, as also to form the Garrisons here, and in the other Places and Fortresses of Piedmont; so that these Troops will soon begin their March to the Quarters appointed for them, in order to a general Rendezvous before the opening of the Campaign. His Royal Highness has directed that fix Battalions of Regular Troops, and the same Number of the Militia of the Country, shall remain in Garrison. The Marquis de Tana, Knight of the Annunciade and Captain of a Troop of the the Duke's Horse Guards, was lately declared Master of the Houshold to the Dutchels Dowager; his Station in the Guilds is not yet disposed of Letters from Rome say, that the Lord Charles Somerses, a young British Nobleman of great Merit and Expectation. lately died there of the Small Pox. The two young Princesses of Carignan, who have been very Ill of a violent Fever, are now in a fair way of Recovery. Florence, March 19. N. S. The Grand Duke not being able to obtain any Abatement of the forcy thousand Crowns which are demanded of him, as his Contribution towards de raying the Expence of the War, his Higheness hath ordered the Payment of that Sum to General Zumjungin, the Imperial Commissary for the Troops in Iraly. Advices from Rome, of the 12th Inflant, fay, that Letters of Exchange were dispatched on the 8th Instant to Monsignior Albani at Vienna, who is appointed to return to the Court of the King of Poland, and from thence proceed to that of the Czar of Mulcovy-On the 10th they received Advice by a Vessel arrived at Civita Vecchia within the space of twenty four Hours from Sicily, that a Fleet was preparing to fail from that Kingdom on fome Expedition, which was faid to be defigned against Sardinia. On the 11th Monsieur Molinez dispatched a Courier to the Court of Madrid, with Letters from the Pope to the Duke of Anjou. On the 12th his Holiness having given several long Audiences to his Ministers, seund himself very much indisposed; and his Distemper in his Breast and Legs violently returned upon him in the Evening. These Letters add, that the Mini-flers of the House of Audiria sppeared difficiented at the hte Proceedings of the Court of Rome, with relation to Monsieur Molinez and the Court of Madrid; that Minifter being re-estactisticed by the Pope in all his former Dig-nities, permitted to enjoy the usual Advantages of his Offices, and having also obtained a Breviat for the Nomination of a Cardinal by the Duke of Anjou. Letters from Naples of the 11th Infant fay, that the Naffau and Chatham Men of War arrived there on the Sth Instant with a French I'rize laden with Corn; on the 9th Infant the Diligence Galley, an English Privateer of twenty two Guns, put into that Port. They write from Geford, failed from that Port for Barcelona on the 14th InConvoy, and forty thousand Pound Sterling on Board for

Vienna, March 22. N. S. A Council of War has been held here for several Days upon the Regiment of Newbourg. and the rest of the Imperial Foot, who were part of the Detachment commanded by Count Merci last Year, for not having done their Duty in that Expedition; but it not being thought fit to come to any Resolution upon that Matter here, they have referred the surther Examination of it to the Assembly of the General Officers of the Empire upon the Rhine. Count Velo, who is appointed to succeed. Mondieur Vryburg as Envoy-Extraordinary from the King of Denmark, has been here for fome time; but this Courc makes a Difficulty to receive him in that Character, and he is likewite opposed by the Protestant States of the Empire. Marefel al Heister is still here, and Count Schlick is returned from Hungary, where he has lately made a new Regulation of the Quarters; the States of the Country being diffatisfied with the Conduct of the Imperial Commissaries in that Particular. Monsieur Hohendorst, Adjutant General to Prince Engene, sets out from hence to morrow for Berlin, and the Prince himself in-tends to begin his Journey thither next Week in his way to Holland.

Hague, April 4. N. S. The last Courier the French Ministers sent to Paris, returned on the 2d Instant in the Evening to Gertruydenberg, from whence the Sieur Pet-comb arrived here this Morning. The Penfionaries Buys and Vander-Duffen will fet out to Morrow, or the Day afters to confer with the Ministers of France. The States of Holland are separated, and are not to re-essemble till the next Month, unless some extraordinary occasion obliges them to meet fooner. They have at length agreed to raife the four Millions that were wanting, by a Loan at four per Genr. and by Annuities at nine; all their other Projects proving, upon Examination, impracticable. The Troops will be in Motion on all fides, in order to advance towards the Frontiers the next Week; but 'disfaid the Duke of Marlborough will flay in this Place 'till the Arrival of Prince Eugene. The Convoy from England of Horfes, Recruits, and Cloa hing for the British Troops is arrived fale in the Meuse; and General Stanbope came hicker the 4th in the Evening. They write from France, that the Duke of Anjou is refolved to be at the Head of his Army the next Campaign; and from the Frontiers, that the Enemy begin already to can on their Troops, and to lay in all the Forage they can, in order to obviate the Defigns of

Whitehaven, March 24. On the 19th Instant the Whitehaven Galley, laden with Sugar and Indigo, Captain Lutwidge Commander, arrived at Ramsey Bay in the Isle of Man: She failed from Jamaica on the 6 h of February last without any Company, and left three of her Majesty's Men of War, viz. the Kingston, Portland and Coventry, and four Guinea Ships, at Port-Royal. They report, that the Inhabitants of the Island were under no Apprehensions of any Attempt from the Enemy, but enjoyed a perfect Tranquility. They add, that there had been a great Mortality among the Negroes this last Winter.

Falmouth, March 25. Yesterday failed hence to Cruize her Majesty's Ship the Mountague. The same Day arrived

the Severn-Inn Galle, in twen y five Days from Boston. SamuelCary Mafter, bound for London, who filled thence under Convoy of her Majesty's Ship the Referve, with three Mail Ships, and eleven Merchantmen, and was feparated the 12th Instant by bad Weather.

Plimouth, March 26. On the 23d a Guernsey Privateer was chased into this Harbour. On the 24th came in a Dutch Privatcer from Falmouth; and yesterday the dans, daving four Ships laden with Corn under their I Shoram's Frize from seilly. This Day failed her Maje-
