 NOTICE OF PUBLIC PATH ORDER
 TOWN AND COUNTRY PLANNING ACT 1971
 SECTION 210

*The County of Wiltshire (Footpath No. 34 Cherhill)
 Public Path Diversion Order, 1976*

Notice is hereby given that the above-named Order (hereinafter referred to as "the Order") made on the 20th January 1976, is about to be submitted to the Secretary of State for the Environment for confirmation or to be confirmed by the Wiltshire County Council as an unopposed Order.

The effect of the Order, if confirmed without modification, will be to divert Footpath No. 34 Cherhill, by closing the section of this path which runs in an easterly direction across Cherhill Low to the south of the sand pits near Sands Farm, and substituting a new length of footpath running in a north-easterly direction to the north of the sand pits and joining Bridleway No. 30 at a more northerly point.

A copy of the Order and the map contained in it has been deposited at the County Solicitor and Clerk's Office, (Environment Division) County Hall, Trowbridge, and at the offices of the North Wiltshire District Council, Monkton Park, Chippenham, and may be inspected free of charge during normal office hours.

Any representation or objection with respect to the Order may be sent in writing to the County Solicitor and Clerk (Ref.: AN/HNB/ENV/PC.53(2)) at County Hall, Trowbridge, not later than 23rd February 1976 and should state the grounds on which it is made.

If no representations or objections are duly made, or if any so made are withdrawn, the Wiltshire County Council may, instead of submitting the Order to the Secretary of State for the Environment for confirmation, themselves confirm the Order as an unopposed Order. If the Order is submitted to the Secretary of State for confirmation, any representations or objections which have been duly made and not withdrawn will be sent to the Secretary of State with the Order.

Designation of Conservation Areas at: North Wiltshire District—Little Somerford; Salisbury District—Milton (East Knoyle), and East Knoyle; West Wiltshire District—Brixton Deverill.

Notice is hereby given that the Wiltshire County Council, as Local Planning Authority, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by section 277 of the Town and Country Planning Act, 1971, as amended by the Town and Country Amenities Act 1974, have designated the areas specified in the Schedule hereto within the North Wiltshire, Salisbury and West Wiltshire Districts as Conservation Areas, being areas of special architectural or historic interest, the character or appearance of which it is desirable to preserve or enhance.

Plans showing the boundaries of the Conservation Areas are available for public inspection during normal office hours at the office of the County Solicitor and Clerk, Environment Division, First Floor, Rear Link, County Hall, Trowbridge, and at the offices of the Salisbury District Council, Bourne Hill, Salisbury; the West Wiltshire District Council, Bradley Road, Trowbridge; and the North Wiltshire District Council, Monkton Park, Chippenham.

Attention is drawn to the provisions of the Town and Country Amenities Act, 1974 and, in particular, to the extended powers of local authorities in dealing with Conservation Areas; the preservation of historic buildings; and strengthening of the provisions for the protection of trees.

Please note that it is necessary to obtain the consent of the appropriate local planning authority to demolish any building, or a part of a building, with certain exceptions, which is situated within any of the designated Conservation Areas listed below. Persons intending to demolish a build-

ing, or a part of a building, in any of these areas are strongly advised to consult the appropriate District Council concerned, to ascertain whether or not their proposals are affected by the provisions of the Town and Country Amenities Act, 1974.

It is an offence to demolish a building, or a part of a building, within a designated Conservation Area, without the necessary consent having first been obtained from the appropriate local planning authority.

It should be further noted that any person having it in mind to cut down, top, lop, uproot, wilfully damage or wilfully destroy any tree in a designated Conservation Area, must give the District Council in whose area the tree is growing, 6 weeks' notice of his intention to do so.

Persons intending to do any work to a tree or trees in any of the designated Conservation Areas listed below are strongly advised to consult the appropriate District Council concerned to ascertain the requirements of the Town and Country Amenities Act, 1974, in relation to the protection of trees in designated Conservation Areas.

SCHEDULE

The Conservation Areas

Salisbury District

Milton: It encompasses all of Milton, including "Clouds House" to the south.

East Knoyle: It encompasses nearly all of the village, the western boundary including Holloway. The northern limit extends to the beginnings of Knoyle Hill, incorporating the Grove and Slade's House, and then skirts the properties north of Wise Lane and also those north of the A.350. To the east the boundary follows, to varying depths, the rear of properties on the eastern side of the A.350. South of the Congregationalist Chapel, the line follows the rear of properties on both sides of the A.350 to a point just south of the Seymour Arms. The northern limit of Park Coppice constitutes the southern boundary.

West Wiltshire District

Brixton Deverill: The boundary line encompasses the whole of the village of Brixton Deverill.

North Wiltshire District

Little Somerford: It encompasses the majority of the village, the rear of properties backing on to the railway line constituting the southern boundary. The western limit is formed by the fields around the Rectory and the houses to the west and north of the church. To the north the boundary reaches the ribbon development bordering the B.4042. To the east the eastern side of the C class road branching off the B.4042 forms the limit and the boundary terminates at the beginning of East End Lane to include the grouping of cottages around the fork.

WEST WILTSHIRE DISTRICT COUNCIL

*West Wiltshire District Council (Footpath No. 32
 Melksham Without) Public Path Diversion Order 1976*

Notice is hereby given that the above-named Order (hereinafter referred to as the Order) made on the 14th January 1976, is about to be submitted to the Secretary of State for the Environment for confirmation, or to be confirmed, as an unopposed Order, by the West Wiltshire District Council.

The effect of the Order, if confirmed without modification, will be to divert the public right of way running from point "A" on the plan attached to the Order in a north-easterly direction for a distance of 60 metres to point "D" and thence in an east-north-easterly direction for a distance of 189 metres to point "C", indicated by a bold black line on the said plan, to a line running from point "A" along the proposed pedestrian paths for a distance of approximately 305 metres to point "B" and thence along the western edge of the proposed play area for a distance of 50 metres to point "C", indicated by bold black dashes on the said plan.

A copy of the Order and the map contained in it has been deposited and may be inspected free of charge at the Council Offices, Bradley Road, Trowbridge, between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. on Mondays to Fridays.
