That 6 d. per Pound for a Sum of 50 l. or under, and 12 d. per Pound for what exceeds that Sum, be paid to Her Majeffy for all Monies which (during five Years after the first of May, 1710) shall be given or agreed for with any Clerk or Apprentice put out to learn any Imployment: Payable by the Master.

All Indentures, &c. made within the weekly Bills of Mortality to be brought and frampt at the Stamp-Office, the Duties being there first paid, within one Month after

All fuch Indentures, &c. made out of those Limits, fall fuch Indentures, &c. made out of those Limits, fall fat the Option of the Parties concerned) be fent within two Months after made, either to the head Stamp-Office, or to some of the Stamp Collectors resident (out or those Limits) in England. Wales, or Berwick, or to some or the Officers to be appointed for these Duties in Scalard.

The Duties to be paid to fuch Collector or Officer, up-on producing of the Indenture to him; or if produced at the chief Office, then to the Receiver General there.

It the Ducy be paid to the Receiver-General the Indenture, &c. to be thereupon forthwith thimps. If to the Collector, then he is to give a Receipt for it (dated the Day of Payment, and expressing the Sum in words at length) indorfed on the Indenture. &c. which he is thereupon to celiver back to the Bringer.

Commissioners and Officers are to observe the Orders of the Lord Treasurer, &c. and to take no Fees.

An Officer for any resulal or neglect of his Duty, is to answer Damages with treble Cost to the Party aggrieved. Where any thing (not being lawful Mon;) shall be in any wise transferred, secured, agreed for, or given with an Apprentice, &c. the Duties shall be paid for the value of such Thing, under the like Penalties and Incapacities, as if it had been Monv. as if it had been Mony.

An Abridgement of an AH for the Encouragement of Learning, by westing the Copies of Printed Books in the Authors or Purchasers of such Copies, during the Times therein mentioned.

Whereas Printers, Bookfellers, and other Personshave of late printed and published several Books without the Consent of the Authors or Proprietors of them; to prevent such Practices for the future, and for the Encouragement of Learned Men, it is Enacted. That from the toth of April, 1710, the Author of any Book already printed who hath one transferred to any other the Court printed, who hath not transferred to any other the Copy thereof, or the Bookfeller, or Printer, or other Person who have purchased the Copy of any Book, in order to print or re print he same, shall have the sole Right of printing such Book for the Term of twenty one Years and there the Author of the Rock already compacted. and that the Author of any Book already compoled, and not printed and published, or that shall hereafter be composed, and his Assigns, shall have the sole Liberty of printed. ing and re printing such Book for the Term of fourteen Years, to commence from the day of the first publishing tears, to commone from the day of the first probling the fame; and that ir any other Bookfeller or Printer from and after the 10th of April 1710, within the Terms granted and limited by this Act, shall print, re-print, or import such Book, without the Consent of the Proprietor thereof first had and obtained in writing, or knowing the same to be so printed or re-printed, without the Consent of the Proprietor; shall sell, publish, or expose to Sals any such Book without such Consent sirst obtained, then any fuch Book without fuch Confent first obtained, then fuch Osfender shall torseit such Book, and every Sheet thereof, to the l'roprietor of the Copy, who shall damask and make waste Paper of them: And further, That every fuch Offender shall fortest one Penny for every Sheet which shall be found in his Custody, the one Moiety thereof to Her Majesty, and the other to any Person that shall fue for the fame.

And whereas many Persons may through Ignorance of-fend against this Act, and in order that the Property in e-very such Book may be ascertained, and known, it is surther Enacted, That nothing herein shall be construed to extend to Subject any Bookseller, Printer, or other Perfon, to the Fortenures or Penalties therein mentioned, unless the Title to the Copy of such Book hereaster published, shall, before the Publication, be entred in the Register-Book of the Company of Stationers, and unlefs fuch Confent of the Proprietor be in the like manner entred, for every of which Entries fix Pence shall be paid; which said Register-Book shall at all times be kept in the Hall of the faid Company, and may at all feafonable times be in-fpected by any Bookteller, Printer, or other Person, with-out any Fee or Reward; and the Clerk of the faid Com-pany shall, when thereunto required, give a Certificate under his Hand or such Entry, and for every such Certifi-cate shall take only six Peace.

Provided nevertheless, that if the faid Clerk shall refuse Provided nevertheless, that it the iaid Clerk inall retuie or neglect to Register such Enrry, or to give such Certificate, being thereunto required by the Author or Proprietor of such Copy, in the Presence of two or more credible Witnesses; That then such Persons so resulted Notice being sirst duly given of such Resulal by an Advertisement in the Gazette, shall have the like Benefit, as it such Entry or Certificate had been duly made and given; and that the said Clerk shall, for any such Offence, torteit to the Proprietor of such Copy the Sum of twenty Pounds, to the Proprietor of fuch Copy the Sum of twenty Pounds, to be recovered in any of her Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminfter, &cc. 1

Te is also Enaced, That if any Bolkseller or Printer fiail, after the 25th day of March, 1710, fet a l'rice upon any Book at fuch Rate as shall be conceived by any Perfon to be high and unreasonable, it shall be lawful for amy Perfon to make Complaint thereof to the Lord Archbilliop of Canterbury, the Lord Chancellor or Lard Kseper a the Green Seal, the Lord lift up of London, Lina Chief Juffice of the Queen's Beach, the Lord Chief Juffice of the common-Pleas, et e Lord Chief Baron of the Court of Exchequer, and the Vice t hanceilers of the two Universities for the time being, in that Part of Great Britain called England; and the Lord President of the Sossi ens, the Lord Justice General, the Lord Chief Earon of the Exchequer, and the Rector of the College of Edinburg, for the time being, in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland; who, or any one of them, have hereby full Power to fummon before him, or them, fuch Book-feller or Printer, and to examine and enquire of the R 2. fon of the Dearness and Infrauncement of the Price of fuch Book; and if upon such Enquiry it shall be found that the Price of fuch Book is inhaunced, or anywife too high and unressonable, then the faid Arch Bishop of Can terbusy, the Lord-Chancellor, &c. have full Power to redress the same, and to limit and settle the Price of any fuch printed Book as to them shall feem just and reasonable; and also, to order such Bookseller or Printer to pay all the Costs or Charges that the Person so complaining shall be put un'o by reason of such C mplaint. All which shall be done by the said Arch bishop of Canterbury, &c. by Writing under their Hands and Seals, and thereof publick Notice shall be given by the said Bookseller or Printer in the Gazette; and if any Bookseller or Printer shall, after such Settlement made of the faid Price. fell any Book at a higher Rate than what shall have been fo limited, then fuch Bookfeller or Prin er shall forfeit the Sum of five Pounds for every fuch Book to fold, one Moiety thereof to Her Majesty, and the other to any Person that shall sue for the same, to be recovered with Costs of Suit, &c.

Provided always that nine Copies of each Book upon the best Paper that from and after the 10th of April, 1710, shall be printed as aforesaid, or re-printed with Additions, shall by the Printer thereof be delivered to the Warehousekeeper of the said Company of Stationers, before such sub-lication made, for the Use of the Royal Library, the Li-Paries of the Univerlities of Oxford and Cambridge, the Librarics of the four Universities in Scotland, the Library of Sion College in London, and the Library belonging to the Faculty of Advocates at Edinburg respectively; which said Warehouse keeper is hereby required, within ten days after Demand by the Keeper of the respective Libraries or any perfor by them authorized, to demand the faid Copy for that Use. And if any Proprietor, Bookseller or Printer, or the said Warehouse keeper shall not observe the Directions of this Act therein, that then he and they shall forseit, besides the value of the said printed Copies, the Sum of five Pounds for every Copy not so delivered, and also the value of the said printed C py not so delive red; the same to be recovered by her Majesty, and by the Chancellors, Master, and Scholars of any of the sid Universities, and by the President and Fellows of Sion College, and the Faculty of Advocates at Edinburg, with their full Cofts respectively.

Provided allo, that if any person incur the Penalties contained in this Act in Scotland, they shall be recoverable by any Action be one the Court of Seffirn there.

Provided that nothing in this Act do extend to prohibit the Important n, vending, or felling of any Books in Greek, Latin, or any Foreign Language printed beyond the Scas.

Provided also, that if any Action be commenced against any one for doing, or cauting anything to be done in purfuance of this Act the Detendant may plead the General lilue, and give the appeal hearter in Evidence; and it a Verdict be given tor the Defendant, or the Plaintiff be nen inited, or dif ontinue his Action, the Detendant shall recover his full Cofts.

Provided that all Actions be commenced within three

Months next after the Offence committed.

Provided also, that neithing in this ACt shall extend ei ther to p ejuace or confirm any Right that the faid Universities, o any o them, or any Person of Persons have. or claim to have, to the p ining or te printing in Book or Copy sireacy printed, or her after to be printed.

Provided always, that a ter the Expiration of the faid Term of fourteen Years, the f le Right of printing or
