The southern boundary runs eastwards from that point and includes the footpath from the centre of the village and encompasses "Overhill House" and "The White Horse" public house, before turning north to include the whole of the centre of the village, the Council houses and "Gravel Pit Hall". From there, the boundary follows a south-westerly direction to include the boundary follows a south-westerly direction to include the road to Helham Green, turning north again at the foot of the hill and running to the east of the Nimney Bourne to rejoin the northern boundary at the Church.
