IS Royal Highness re urned with the Court last Night to the Venerie, where they defign to fray till the 4th of the next Month, at which time they will come to this City, that they may affift at the Annual Procedien which is made on that Day in He-The Earl of Rechford left nour of the Saint Sudario. this Place last Monday, in order to wait for the Arrival of General Stanhope a Genoa. Lieutenant General Rocca-vion arrived here last Week from Vienna, with a Design to make this next Campaign in Savoy; but his Regiment which served on this Frontier from the beginning of the War, marched out of Italy at the end of the last Campaign into Hungary. The last Advices from the Frontiers lay, that fourteen of the Enemies Battalions were actually marched towards Germany and Flanders; the greater part of those Troops are to reinforce the Marshal d'Harcourt on the Rkine, great Detachments having been lately commanded from thence to join the French Army in the Netherlands. Yesterday an Officer arrived here from Bar-celona, with Letters for his Royal Highness, dated the off Instant. This Gentleman reports that Marshal Sta-remberg had been dangerously ill. but was perfectly recovered; that the Armies were affembling on both fides in order to take the Field; and that by Advices from the Eacmy's Frontiers, the Duke of Anjeu's Troops were in great want of Necessaries, and their Magazines unprovided with Forage.

Warsaw, April 27. N. S. On Friday last the Saxon Cavalry, confishing of twelve Regiments, were received into the Service of this Republick, which Affair was adjusted with the Great Generals of Poland and Lithuania, and the Saxons are to be paid on the Establishment for the Payment of the Foreign Infantry. The Great Marefelal of Lithuania, Monfieur Wollowitz, is nominated by the King and Commonwealth, to refide at the Court of his Carriff Majesty, in quality of their Ambassador-Extraordinary. Montieur de Rebinski, Chamberlain of the Pa-latinate of Culm, is likewise appointed Ambassador-Ex-traordinary to the Octoman Port, and he is ordered to repair to Constantinople, or where ever the Grand Sig-mor shall keep his Court. The Czar is gone on the Expedition against Wybourg, and his Army is commanded to form the Siege of that Place, which is of great Importance to the Swedes: This Gity is the Metropolis of the Principality of Carelia, fituated on a Bay of Finland, and both a very good Haven, and a ftrong Caclie. The Czarowitz, his Czarith Majeffy's Son, is expected here tuis Evening. The King of Poland went yesterday to a pleasant Country Seat called Villa-nova, about two Leagues up, the River Visual. The Earl of Stairs, her Britannick Mijesty's Envoy-Extraordinary to King Augustus. having finished his Negotiations at this Court, intends to set out on Wednesday next for Flanders, and return to his

Command in the Army. Vienna, April 30. N. S. Marefchal Thaun's Departure for Italy is deferred to the latter end of this Week, it having been retarded for several Days, because of the Difficulties this Court hath met with in providing a fufficient Sum for the Subfishance of their Forces, which they are now resolved to raise by the Sale of the Dutchy of Mirandola. There have been large Offers made by the Dukes of Mirandola, Parma and Modena for that Dutchy. The Duke of Modena has ninety thousand Pistoles ready at Milan, to be immediately delivered to the Imperial Com-

missaries; and it is not doubted but the Preference will be given to him, in Confideration of his great Services to the House of Austria, and his steady Adherence to the Interest of the Alliance. The Elector of Hanover has Interest of the Alliance. The Elector of Hanover has notified to this Court, that he cannot take upon him the Command of the Army upon the Upper Rhine, and it is thought the Supream Direction will be given to Prince Eugene. That Minister was very delivous to have visited the King of Sweden at Bender, but the Peri gave express Orders to the contrary, resolving to prevent the Umbrages which such an Interview might have given. Berlin, May 6. N. S. On the 27th of the last Month his Prussian Majesty went to Landsberg, where he will continue some Days for the benefit of the Waters of Freyenwald. The Queen arrived at the same Place from Grabo the Day following; and on the first Instant the Prince and Princess went thither, where they celebrated the Coronation of her Britannick Majesty with great Signature. lemnity on the 4th. Bruffels, May 14. N. S. This Morning a Courier from Versailles passed through this Place, with Dispueches from the Court of France to their Ministers at Gertruydenberg. The Hessian Troops, consisting of ten thousand Men, are to encamp this Evening at Waveren, within five Leagues of Brufflis; and on the 16th they are to move again, and march towards the Army. The Marefebal de Villars was expected last Night on the Frontiers, and the Enemy contitue to affemble their Forces. In the mean time the Confederates have taken all possible Precautions for covering the Siege of Dousy, if the Enemy fhould attempt its Re-lief. Camps are already marked out on both fides the Scarpe for drawing up the Army in order of Battel, and a great number of Workmen are employed in improving the Advantages of the Ground. Letters from Madria of the 28th of the laft Month, f.y, that the Duke of Aniou was not yet fet out for the Army in Arragon.

From the Camp before Douay, May 15. N. S. Some Detachments of the Enemy's Troops that are encamped

near Camiray having appeared two days together near Arlax, where we have taken Post with five hundred Men. a Reinforcement of two hundred Men is tent to join them; and a Bidy of Horse and Foct is ordered to be always in readmets to march to their Relies, upon a Signal appointed to be made, if the Enemy should ac-tempt any thing upon that Post. Yesterday Morning at Break of Day our Batteries began to fire at both A tacks, and have ever fince plied the Enemy's Works fo warmly that their Fire is almost ceased; and we are nowmaking Overtures by the way of Sappe, into the first F. se, in order to fill it up. His Grace the Duke of Mailborough is gone this Morning with the Prince of Savoy to view the Post of Arleux, as likewise to survey the Ground between that Place and the Scarpe, and give Directions for the marking a field of Battel on the Hains towards Valenciennes, in case the Enemy shall attempt to succour Dougy on that side; our Works on the other side between Montigny and Virry being finished. Monficur Dopff, with the Troops from the Maes, that were ordered to encamp near Tournay, for the Security of our Artillery's coming from thence for the Siege, have this Day taken their Post in the Line; and the Hessian Troops have Orders to haften their March, so as to join us the beginning of next Week.

Hague, May 16. N. S. The French Elenipotentiaties have for several days given out, that they were on their Departure for the court of France; their Baggage was made ready, in order to be embarked; and they gave our that it would be fent on Board a Yacht, which they had hired for that Service, on Mon'ay or Tuescay last; but Yesterday in the Evening they received Dispatches by a Courier of the French King's Cabinet, which they have fignified to the Council of State by an Express shis Morning, and it is probable that their Journey will be deferred. The Hessian Troops encamped Yesterday in the Neighbourhood of Brussels; and part of the Palatines will arrive on the 18th Inftant at Macfricht; all which Forces will join the Grand Army before the Enemy can affemble their Troops, which cannot be done before the end of this Month. They write from Lifle, that forty or fitty Deferters come daily over to that City from the Enemy's Frontiers, who unanimously report that the French Treops undergo fuch Misery, that a great part of their Army were disposed to follow their Example.
