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Turin, April 23. N. S.

HIS Royal Highness returned with the Court last Night to the Venetie, where they design to stay till the 4th of the next Month, at which time they will come to this City, that they may assist at the Annual Procession which is made on that Day in Honour of the Saint Sudario. The Earl of Rochester left this Place last Monday, in order to wait for the Arrival of General Stanhope at Genoa. Lieutenant-General Rocca-vion arrived here last Week from Vienna, with a Design to make this next Campaign in Savoy; but his Regiment which served on this Frontier from the beginning of the War, marched out of Italy at the end of the last Campaign into Hungary. The last Advices from the Frontiers say, that fourteen of the Enemies Battalions were actually marched towards Germany and Flanders; the greater part of those Troops are to reinforce the Marshal d'Harcourt on the Rhine, great Detachments having been lately commanded from thence to join the French Army in the Netherlands. Yesterday an Officer arrived here from Barcelona, with Letters for his Royal Highness, dated the 1st Instant. This Gentleman reports that Marshal Staremberg had been dangerously ill, but was perfectly recovered; that the Armies were assembling on both sides in order to take the Field; and that by Advices from the Enemy's Frontiers, the Duke of Anjou's Troops were in great want of Necessaries, and their Magazines unprovided with Forage.

Warsaw, April 27. N. S. On Friday last the Saxon Cavalry, consisting of twelve Regiments, were received into the Service of this Republick, which Affair was adjusted with the Great Generals of Poland and Lithuania, and the Saxons are to be paid on the Establishment for the Payment of the Foreign Infantry. The Great Marschal of Lithuania, Monsieur Wollowitz, is nominated by the King and Commonwealth, to reside at the Court of his Czarish Majesty, in quality of their Ambassador-Extraordinary. Monsieur de Rebinski, Chamberlain of the Palatine of Culm, is likewise appointed Ambassador-Extraordinary to the Ottoman Port, and he is ordered to repair to Constantinople, or where ever the Grand Signior shall keep his Court. The Czar is gone on the Expedition against Wybourg, and his Army is commanded to form the Siege of that Place, which is of great Importance to the Swedes: This City is the Metropolis of the Principality of Carelia, situated on a Bay of Finland, and hath a very good Haven, and a strong Castle. The Czarowitz, his Czarish Majesty's Son, is expected here this Evening. The King of Poland went yesterday to a pleasant Country Seat called Villa-nova, about two Leagues up the River Vistula. The Earl of Stairs, her Britannick Majesty's Envoy-Extraordinary to King Augustus, having finished his Negotiations at this Court, intends to set out on Wednesday next for Flanders, and return to his Command in the Army.

Vienna, April 30. N. S. Marschal Thau's Departure for Italy is deferred to the latter end of this Week, it having been retarded for several Days, because of the Difficulties this Court hath met with in providing a sufficient Sum for the Subsistence of their Forces, which they are now resolved to raise by the Sale of the Dutchy of Mirandola. There have been large Offers made by the Dukes of Mirandola, Parma and Modena for that Dutchy. The Duke of Modena has ninety thousand Pistoles ready at Milan, to be immediately delivered to the Imperial Com-

missaries; and it is not doubted but the Preference will be given to him, in Consideration of his great Services to the House of Austria, and his steady Adherence to the Interest of the Alliance. The Elector of Hanover has notified to this Court, that he cannot take upon him the Command of the Army upon the Upper Rhine, and it is thought the Supream Direction will be given to Prince Eugene. Prince Emanuel of Soissons, Nephew to Prince Eugene, is arrived here, and will set out in two or three Days to Command his Regiment, which is to serve this Summer upon the Rhine. Letters from Constantinople of the 29th of March say, that all the Motions and Warlike Preparations which the Port had lately made, tended only to amuse the King of Sweden, and to hasten the Conclusion of their Treaty with Muscov, and their Pretences of conducting his Swedish Majesty through Poland with forty thousand Men are vanished; they excusing their not Performance of their Promise, by telling the King that the Multi will not grant his Sentence for it, being contrary to their Law. His Majesty therefore, (who relied on the Declarations of the Turks, and had so long neglected taking other requisite Measures for this Retreat,) finds himself deluded, and is very much at a Loss what Course to take, being sufficiently undeceived of any hopes of Assistance from the Turks. Monsieur Desalleurs, who is appointed to relieve Monsieur Ferioll at Constantinople, was expected at the Port in few days, being arrived at Jassi in Moldavia. That Minister was very desirous to have visited the King of Sweden at Bender, but the Port gave express Orders to the contrary, resolving to prevent the Umbrages which such an Interview might have given. The French continue to transport vast quantities of Corn, which they buy up at any Price upon the Coasts of Turkey.

Berlin, May 6. N. S. On the 27th of the last Month his Prussian Majesty went to Landsberg, where he will continue some Days for the benefit of the Waters of Freyenwald. The Queen arrived at the same Place from Grabo the Day following; and on the first Instant the Prince and Princesses went thither, where they celebrated the Coronation of her Britannick Majesty with great Solemnity on the 4th. Letters from Coningsberg in Prussia say, that City was entirely free from the Plague, and that not one Person had died of any infectious Distemper in some Weeks; so that they hoped the Commerce with that Town would be soon restored, there being now no Apprehensions of any further Contagion.

Brussels, May 14. N. S. This Morning a Courier from Versailles passed through this Place, with Dispatches from the Court of France to their Ministers at Gertruydenberg. The Hessian Troops, consisting of ten thousand Men, are to encamp this Evening at Waveren, within five Leagues of Brussels; and on the 16th they are to move again, and march towards the Army. The Marschal de Villars was expected last Night on the Frontiers, and the Enemy continue to assemble their Forces. In the mean time the Confederates have taken all possible Precautions for covering the Siege of Douay, if the Enemy should attempt its Relief. Camps are already marked out on both sides the Scarpe for drawing up the Army in order of Battel, and a great number of Workmen are employed in improving the Advantages of the Ground. Letters from Madria of the 28th of the last Month, say, that the Duke of Anjou was not yet set out for the Army in Arragen.
