The following notice is in substitution for that which appeared on page 4550 of the London Gazette dated 26th March 1976.

At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 4th day of March 1976.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council

Whereas a Representation duly made to Her Majesty in Council by the Secretary of State for the Environment that burials should be discontinued as hereinafter directed in Holy Trinity Churchyard, Wistanstow, in the County of Salop, has in pursuance of an Order in Council made the 12th day of November 1975, and duly published, been taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers conferred on Her by section 1 of the Burial Act 1853 (1853, c. 134), and of all other powers Her enabling, is

pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

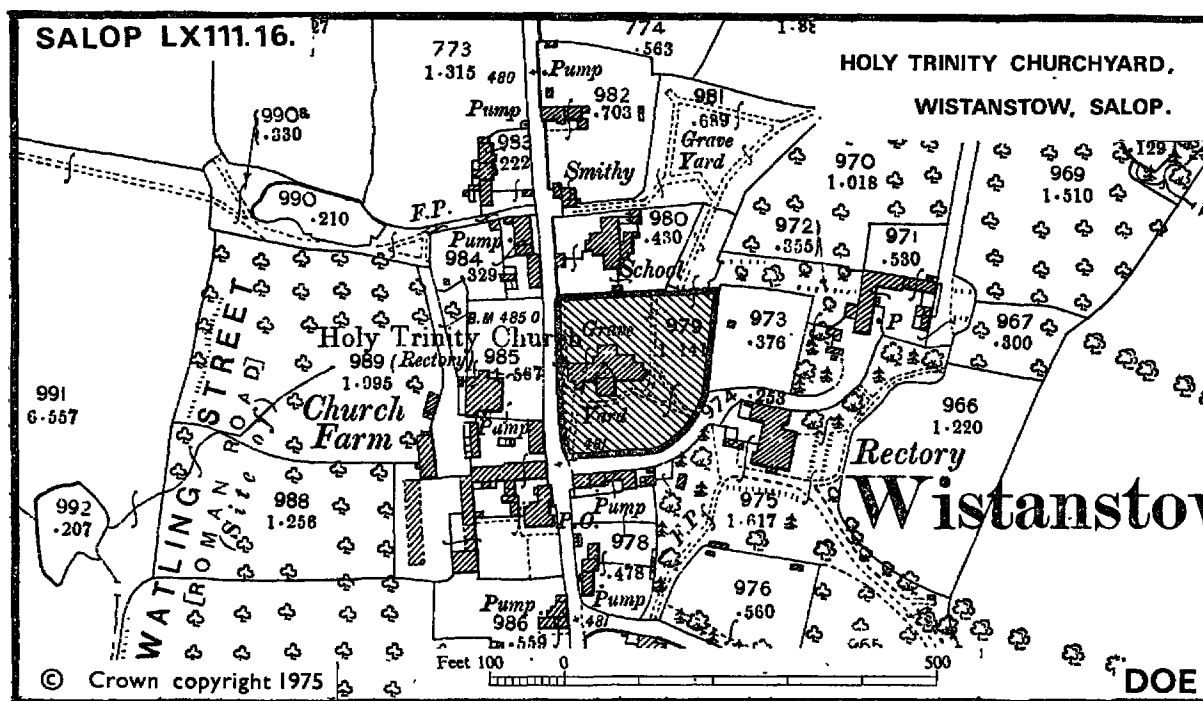
1. Burials shall be discontinued forthwith and entirely in Holy Trinity Churchyard, Wistanstow, in the County of Salop, shown hatched and outlined in black on the plan annexed hereto.

Provided that the burial be allowed in the family grave of the widow, son and daughter of the late Reverend Prebendary Winnington-Ingram at their decease, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth of less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

2. This Order may be cited as the Burial Grounds (Holy Trinity Churchyard, Wistanstow, Salop) Order 1976.
