Lisbon, May 16. N. S.

THE Armies on the Frontier have not lately made any Movement. The Portuguese have laid a Bridge over the Guadiana, by which the Army is supplied with all manner of Provisions from the Country on the other side, where there is great plenty. The Horse is supported with Forage from the Enemy's Country; and in the mean time we preserve that of our own Frontier. We are advised from Spain, that many other Persons of Condition have been imprisoned since the Duke of Medina Celi was seiz'd. The Marquis de Quelus is arriv'd at the Army, whither he was dispatched with great haste, upon occasion of Jealousies conceiv'd by the Court of Madrid against some General Officers, under the Command of the Marquis de Bay.

Copenhagen, June 3. N. S. I having been thought requisite for the more speedy reinforcing the Army, that the Infantry should be recruited out of the Militia, several Draughts have been made out of those Troops for the Regular Forces; and those new raised Men are already arriv'd in this City. This Week they are to be distributed among the respective Regiments; and Lieutenant-General Scholten is arriv'd here to Command the Infantry, which by this Means will be speedily compleat'd. The Recruits for the Foot of the Militia are levied with great Ease; but not with the same Success for the Cavalry. We have certain Advices, that the Swedish Fleet is at Sea; but are not exactly inform'd of their number. Three Days since they took a large Merchant Ship, and several small Vessels in the East Sea laden with Corn, Wood and other Stores for this Place. It was yesterday reported, that part of the Fleet lay in the Great Belt, had landed some Men, and began to burn and ravage the Country. This occasion'd a general Consternation throughout the Island; but Letters of Yesterday's date, which arriv'd from that Coast, convince us, that this Report was groundless. The Approach of the Enemy's Fleet makes us expect, with the greatest impatience, the return of Admiral Raab from Norway. The Squadron, consisting of eighteen Men of War, all of the Line of Battel, that lies in our Harbour, is ready to put to Sea; and his Majesty seems willing that they should sail immediately: But since it would require all the Seamen that are here to man this Squadron, and Workmen would be wanted for fitting out the rest of the Fleet, it is yet undetermined whether they shall sail forthwith, or wait the Arrival of the Mariners from Norway. Monsieur Lerke, the Master of the Ceremony, hath been long nam'd to be a Commissioner of the Treasury, but he hath not yet enter'd upon that Charge.

Frankfort, June 6. N. S. The Imperial Army is still encamp'd in several Bodies behind the Lines of Elingen; and the Enemy have dispos'd of their Forces in divers Bodies on the other side of the Rhine from Weissenburg to Haguenau, and from thence to Strasburg. A great part of their Infantry is encamp'd behind the Lines of Lauter; but several Squadrons of their Cavalry have pass'd the Rhine at Fort Keil near Strasburg, and plunder the Country, and destroy the Forage as far as Offenbourg. In the mean time the Imperial Army are preparing to pass the Rhine at Philipsburg, with a design to make Excursions, and to ruin the Enemy's Forage on the other side between Lauterburg and Landau, for which end they made a Movement on the 4th towards Rastadt. We are advis'd, that great Detachments are daily marching from the French Army towards Flanders; so that their whole Forces will not amount to thirty thousand Men.

Brussels, June 11. N. S. Letters from the Camp before Douay of yesterday bring an Account, that the Duke of Marlborough changed his Quarters on the 9th, and is

removed to Noyelle, more towards the Right of the Army. The Batteries raising on the Glacis of the Counterscarp of Douay are in good forwardness. During two Days last past, the Fire from the Cannon and small Arms of the Towa is very much decreased, from whence it is suppos'd they begin to want Ammunition. The Army of the Enemy continues in their Camp near Arras, where they endeavour to destroy the Forage in all the Neighbouring Country.

From the Camp before Douay, June 12. N. S. The Enemy having, upon the assembling their Army, strengthn'd it as much as possible by Troops drawn out of the Frontier Towns, and thereby left very weak and inconsiderable Garrisons in those Places, a Project was form'd for surprizing Ypres; a Detachment was for that purpose sent from the Army, under presence of reinforcing the Posts of Warneton and Gommynes, and strengthening the Garrisons of Lille and Menin. The Troops appointed to put the Design in Execution march'd accordingly from those Places on Monday Night, and about two in the Morning the advanced Party, that was to have secur'd the Gate, had it open'd to them as was concert'd; but they found the Enemy within ready to receive them; so that they were oblig'd to retire, and the whole Detachment returned to their former Posts. Our Approaches at the Siege advance with good Success at both Attacks, though the Situation of the Ground is such, that the Rains which have fallen for three Days together, do somewhat incommodate our Men in the Trenches. On the Left Attack, our Batteries have driven the Enemy from all the Traverses except one, which is intended to blow up this Night, and then we shall begin our Batteries against the Ravelins. The Duke of Marlborough has this Morning reviewed the British Horse and Dragoons, which appear'd compleat, and in very good Order.

Hague, June 13. N. S. The Pensionaries Buys and Vander Duffen arriv'd here yesterday in the Evening, and had this Day a Conference with the Great Pensionary, the Lord Townshend and Count Zinzendorf, and are preparing to set out to Morrow Morning for Gertruydenberg, in order to confer with the Ministers of France. Our last Advices from the Army say, that the Batteries on the Counterscarp at the Left Attack would this Day begin to play against the Ravelins. Letters from the Frontiers say, that on the 10th Instant a Party of the Enemy, consisting of three hundred Men, command'd by the Partisan Miquenez, and favour'd by some disaffected Persons among the Burghers of Liege, surpriz'd one of the Gates of that City at four of the Clock in the Morning, and having thereby secur'd their Retreat, plunder'd the Houses of the Count de Vels, the Imperial Envoy, and of the Governor of the Town, after which they retir'd. Advices which are this Day arriv'd from Madrid say, that the Duke of Anjou, after having made the usual Dispositions for the Siege of Balaguer, abandon'd that Enterprize at the approach of the Confederate Army under the Command of Count Staremberg, and was retir'd towards Lerida.

Whitehaven, May 31. This Morning arriv'd a Fleet of Light Colliers, being twenty six Sail, from Dublin, under Convoy of the Sealord: And this Evening the Whitehaven Galley, Captain Lutwidge Commander, return'd hither; in his Passage from hence to the West-Indies, he met with a Sloop call'd the Anne of Liverpool, bound home from Fial with Brandy, Wine, and Sugar; which Sloop had been taken a little before by a Privateer, and mann'd with Frenchmen; he retok her, and brought her in here. The Privateer had put on Board several valuable Parcels of Goods more than her own Cargo, which she design'd for France.

Falmouth, June 1. Yesterday arrived the Union Packet-boat, Captain Peack Commander, in thirty five Days from Lisbon, who took, about one hundred Leaguers Westward of the Rock, a Sloop carrying one hundred and twenty Tuns from Martinico, laden with Sugar and Indigo, and sent her into Lisbon. Arrived also the Maidstone Galley of and for London from Scanderoon, George Martyns Commander, who ten Leaguers to the North of the Maderas, fell in with a Squadron of eight French Men-of-War and two Bomb-Ketches, one of which took a Dutch Galley of twenty four Guns; the same Ship came up with the Maidstone, who fought her for several Hours very sharply, but having received some Damage, made off, without the Loss of a Man. There are now three Packet-boats in this Harbour. The Lisbon Fleet, consisting of almost two hundred Sail, is now discovered from our Hills, steering up the Channel.

Plymouth, June 2. Yesterday sailed her Majesty's Ships the Warpight, Berwick, Breda, Northumberland, Norwich, Restoration and Medway, with about sixteen Merchant ships from Lisbon; and the same Day came in the Lyon from the Eastward, and a Transport with Soldiers for Lisbon. Arrived also the Lenox and Dover from Lisbon, with the Robert and Nathaniel from Barcelona, the Seaford's Adventure and Wheatsheaf from Lisbon, the Peace Gall y from Gibraltar, and Flying Horse from Guiney. This Day came in her Majesty's Ship the York from cruising, and brought in as Prize a French Merchantship of twenty Guns, laden with Corn and Soap from Genoa, and the St. Bernard laden with Wool from Bilbao, bound for Holland. This Day passed by the homeward-bound Lisbon Fleet to the Eastward, under the Command of Admiral Whitaker, and were joined by several Ships from hence. At the same time came in about thirty Vessels from Wales for this Place.

Dartmouth, June 2. On the last of May came in here the Levant Galley, Captain Way Commander; and the Alexander Galley, Captain Rudock Commander, both from Zant with Currans, for London; as also the Mermaid Galley of and for London, Captain Jeffrys Commander, with Wine from Leghorn. The two latter took a French Prize of four Guns, six Patroons, and forty six Men, off of Tingmouth, and sent her in thither.

Bristol, June 3. On the 1st Instant at Night came in the Kings-Weston Galley, John Beven Commander, from Venice; and in her Passage she took a Vessel laden with Corn, and carried her into Barcelona, where she sold the Ship and her Cargo, and came last in three Weeks from Gibraltar.

Portsmouth, June 4. On Thursday last her Majesty's Ships the Foy and Monk's Prize failed to cruise. Admiral Aylmer continues on Board her Majesty's Ship the Royal Sovereign; and also Sir John Jennings on Board the Royal Anne, with the Squadrons under their respective Commands.

Extract of a Letter from Captain William Clarke, Commander of her Majesty's Ship the Hector, who attends at Barbadoes; dated April 25.

On the 19th of March last I took a French Guiney Ship of fourteen Guns, seventy six Men, and one hundred and seventy Negroes; as also a French Sloop laden with Salt; and retook a Sloop bound from New-England to Antegoa.

Extract of a Letter from Captain Williams, Commander of her Majesty's Ship the Dover, dated at Plymouth, June 2.

On the 28th of April last I retook the Leviathan Fly-boat of London, from Virginia, Captain Longbottom Commander, and afterwards took the St. Lewis Privateer of St. Malo of ten Guns, Captain Amelot Commander, who the day before took the said Levian ham. The Privateer had seventy eight Men; which two Ships we carried into the Bay of Wares.

Kensington, June 4. William Oldes, Esq; one of her Majesty's Gentleman-Usher's Daily-Waiters, being introduced by his Grace the Duke of Shrewsbury, Lord-Chamberlain of her Majesty's Household, received the Honour of Knighthood, and was declared Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, in the room of Sir David Mitchell, deceased.

Westminster, June 5. This Day the Parliament met, and was further Prorogued to the 20th Instant.
