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Kingston, June 8.

THE following Advertisements of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal of Ireland in Parliament assembled, hath been transmitted by Thomas Earl of Wharton, Lord-Lieutenant of that Kingdom, and presented to Her Majesty by the Right Honourable the Earl of Sunderland, Principal Secretary of State.

To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty.

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal in Parliament assembled, truly sensible of the great and inestimable Blessings we enjoy under your Auspicious Reign, do with grateful Hearts return our humble Thanks to your Majesty for the many good Laws obtained the last Session, and the Opportunity now given us of Meeting again, to consult of what else may be necessary for the Security and Happiness of this Kingdom.

We cannot but reflect with Pleasure on our own Condition, that while most of the Neighbouring Nations are struggling under the Pressures of War, or groaning under the heavier Yoke of Tyranny, and imploring your Majesty's Protection; we who happily feel the nearer Influences, are encouraged by your Princely Care and Goodness to study and contrive Laws for our Safety and our Ease, are called together chiefly for our own good, and to promote the noblest Ends, the Peace and Plenty of our Country.

We beg leave also to take this Occasion of Congratulating your Majesty on the glorious Successes of the last Campaign, under your Great General the Duke of Marlborough, and the happy Beginnings of this, which give all your Majesty's good Subjects the delightful Prospect either of a victorious War, or a speedy and honourable Peace.

And to promote (as far as in us lies) the great Ends which your Majesty seems to have so much in view, we do faithfully promise to improve and cultivate Union among our selves, and to contribute all our best Endeavours to strengthen the Protestant Interest, and maintain the Protestant Succession.

And as the Security of our Established Church, and the Protection of our Civil Rights and Liberties, are the most valuable Blessings we possess, so from the Experience we have of your Majesty's exemplary Piety, Justice and constant Care of both, we promise our selves that they shall continue safe and flourishing under your most gracious Government and Administration.

Turin, May 28. N. S. On Thursday last we received Advice by Express from Genoa, that Sir John Norris was arrived at Vado with the Fleet under his Command. His Royal Highness being advised from the Emperor's Ambassador at Rome, that the Pope was inclined to adjust the Differences with this Court, has ordered the President Governour to repair thither with all Expedition, as his Plenipotentiary, in order to settle all Matters now under Debate in his Behalf; the Ambassador will accordingly leave this Place within few Days, having already received the last Instructions from his Royal Highness. The Regiment of Foot commanded by the Count de la Trinita, which has been in Garrison here all last Winter, marched from hence on the 23d Instant towards Jaillon near Suza, to reinforce the Troops on that Frontier. Upon Advice, that the Enemies were in Motion towards the Valley de Barcelonette, and had ordered the Roads to be mended, as if they had some design in view, his Royal Highness has ordered two Regiments of Foot to March from Coni to reinforce that Garrison. He hath also commanded some heavy Cannon to be sent thither for the Security of the Place.

Marienburg, June 3. N. S. Yesterday King Augustus, attended by several of his chief Ministers, arrived here from Warsaw; from whence he set out on the 28th of the last Month. The City of Dantzick having in the late Revolution in Poland, more particularly adhered to the Interests of King Stanislaus, it was recommended to the Consideration of the last General Diet in Poland, in what method to proceed against that City, for their Declaration against his Majesty and the Republick. The Regency of Dantzick sent a Deputation to Warsaw to accommodate those Differences, and offered to advance a considerable Sum of Money, and also to raise and maintain a certain number of Men, to atone for their former Behaviour; but the King and States of Poland insisting on much greater Demands, their Proposal was neglected; and it was resolved that an Army should be sent against the Town, to reduce them to a Compliance. For this end the Polish, Saxon, and Muscovite Troops are on their March towards this Place, in order to advance before Dantzick, if such Severities are not prevented by a speedy Accommodation. It is said his Majesty hath given Orders for casting up Lines on the Frontiers of Poland, to prevent any Irruption from Pomerania; while his Army shall be employed in this Expedition. The City of Dantzick hath been diligent in making Preparations for their Defence; and at the same time they continue their Application to reconcile themselves to his Majesty, without engaging in a War.

Lisbon, June 6. N. S. Letters from the Camp at Cancan say, that the Confederates had laid a Bridge over the Guadiana near Gernumena, as well to cover Olivenza, as to make an Irruption into Estramadura; and that these Dispositions had obliged the Enemy to command the Forces that had passed the Guadiana, to decamp from Campo-Mayor, and pass that River at Badajoz, for the Security of their Frontiers. It is expected that the excessive Heats will soon oblige both Armies to March into summer Quarters. The Earl of Gaway is not yet recovered of the Gout, but the Anguish of his Distemper is much abated.

Dublin, June 2. On the 27th of the last Month Mr. Bayne, Clerk of the Ordnance, delivered in at the Bar of the House of Commons an account of all the serviceable Artillery in Ireland; and also an account of all the Powder, small Ball and small Arms remaining in the Garrisons of this Kingdom, which were referred to the Committee appointed to inspect the Publick Accounts of the Nation. Mr. Stafford reported from the Committee of the whole House, that they had gone through with, and agreed to the Heads of a Bill for the better Securing to her Majesty the Payment of such Duties as shall be granted to her Majesty this Session of Parliament; which being again read, and agreed to by the House, Mr. Stafford was ordered to attend his Excellency the Lord-Lieutenant with the same, and desire that it may be transmitted into Great Britain in due Form. Mr. Upton presented the Heads of a Bill for the better Securing of the Liberty of the Subject, and for preventing Imprisonment beyond the Seas, which were read, and committed to a Committee of the whole House on Thursday next. After which it was ordered, that the Committee appointed to inspect the State of the Linnen Manufacture should be enlarged, and the House adjourned till Wednesday the 31st. On the 31st it was ordered, that leave be given to bring in a bill to prevent Dear Sealing, and to encourage the imparking of Land; and also a Bill for the Relief of Insolvent Debtors now in Confinement. Then the House took into Consideration a Bill for the further Amendment of the Law, and the better Advancement of Justice in certain Cases, and having made some Progress therein, it was resolved that the same should be taken into further

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
