**T**HE following Address of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal in Parliament assembled, hath been presented to his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant.

To his Excellency Thomas Earl of Wharton, Lord-Lieutenant-General, and General Governor of her Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland.

The humble Address of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal in Parliament assembled.

May it please your Excellency,

**A**S we return our hearty Thanks for your Excellency's Speech to both Houses of Parliament, so we esteem it a great Instance of her Majesty's unparall'd Goodness towards us, that we are now again called together under your Excellency's Administration, to consider of such Things as may be for our further Happiness and Security.

We take this Opportunity of acknowledging your Excellency's Care and Vigilance, in promoting those good Laws; we have obtained for the Suppression of Popery, and Security of the Protestant Interest among us; and for the Assurance you are pleased to give us of her Majesty's Royal Intention, to consent to any good Laws which may conduce to make us Easie and Happy. And we return our hearty Thanks for the Representation you were pleased to make to her Majesty, of the Dispatch that was given to the Publick Business in the last Session of Parliament; the Care that was taken of the true Interest of the Kingdom, and that hearty Zeal and Dutiful Affection that we expressed for her Majesty's Person and Government. We are now met in the same Temper and Disposition, ready to give the utmost Demonstration we are capable of all these in this Session likewise. And there is nothing we shall have more at Heart, than the approving our selves in all Things to our gracious Sovereign; particularly in promoting that Union among our selves so affectionately recommended to us in her Name: In all Obedience and Loyalty to her Sacred Majesty, in a most unfeigned Affection to her Person and Government, and with all dutiful Behaviour to your Excellency, whom she hath placed over us.

We are fully persuaded, that the Established Church will continue to be most safe and flourishing under the Influence of her Majesty; and as her Majesty is the brightest Ornament of the Holy Religion she professes, so is she (under God) the great Stay and Support of it, as she is likewise of the Civil Rights and Liberties of her People. And there is nothing we wish for more, than that all her Subjects may have the same Fidelity of her Royal Prerogative: Since nothing is more apparent, than that the Peace and Prosperity of these Kingdoms depends entirely upon the Continuance of the two, in a just Balance and Equality.

'Tis with all Thankfulness to God, and Gratitude to her Majesty, the Glorious Instrument, that we do, in the sincerity of our Hearts, own and acknowledge the manifold Blessings of her Auspicious Reign: And do pray, that as no Monarch ever had a better Right and Title to the Throne of these Kingdoms, so that God would Establish her in defeating the Subtility and Conjurings of all her Secret and Profest Enemies, in granting her a long and prosperous Reign over us; and that he would preserve to these Nations the Protestant Succession as by Law Established; this being the only visible Means of perpetuating our happy Constitution both in Church and State.

To which his Excellency was pleased to make the following Answer:

**I** Am Glad to see that what I have said to you gives you any Satisfaction, and I shall be always ready to do the best service I can for this Kingdom.

On the 2d Instant the House of Commons ordered that leave be given to bring in the Heads of a Bill for amending and making perpetual an Act, Entituled, An Act to prohibit Butchers from being Graefiers, and to redress fe-

veral Abuses in buying and selling of Cattle, and in the Slaughtering and Packing of Beef, Tallow and Hides. Mr. Warburton presented the Heads of a Bill for the Encouragement of Tillage, which were yesterday taken into Consideration; at which time they made some Progress therein, and are to take it into further Consideration to morrow. The House also ordered a Bill to be brought in for encouraging the Tilling of the Land with Bullocks; and adjourned to Monday the 5th Instant; and on Tuesday the 6th they have resolved to proceed on the Supply to be granted to her Majesty.

Dublin, June 6. Yesterday Mr. Secretary Addison informed the House, that he was commanded by his Excellency the Lord-Lieutenant to acquaint the House, that her Majesty had been pleased to return a most gracious Answer to the Address of that House, which he read in his Place, and after delivered in at the Table; and the same was again read by Mr. Speaker, and is as followeth:

**H**ER Majesty thanks the House of Commons for their Loyal and Dutiful Address, so full of Expressions of Zeal for Her Person and Government, the Established Church, and the Protestant Succession as settled by Law; and assures them of her constant Concern for the Welfare of this Kingdom.

Which Answer was ordered to be entred in the Journal of the House, and a Committee was appointed to prepare an Address of Thanks to her Majesty for the same. Then the House went through the Bill for the Encouragement of Tillage; and a Bill for the better securing the Liberty of the Subject, and for preventing Imprisonment beyond the Seas, was agreed to with some Amendments.

Falmouth, June 8. On the 7th Instant put in here her Majesty's Ships: the Mountague and August, having brought in as Prize a Pink belonging to St. Maloe, bound for Newfoundland, carrying 120 Tuns, laden with Salt. The Men of War are this day failed again to cruize.

Plymouth, June 9. On the 7th Instant came in her Majesty's Ship the York, with a French Privateer of 24 Guns, formerly called the Orford's Prize. And this day the York failed again to cruize.

Deal, June 11. On the 9th Instant came in hither her Majesty's Ships the Salisbury, Salisbury's-Prize, and Otter, with three French Prizes.

There being several Clauses in two Acts of Parliament passed the last Session for preventing the Running of prohibited and uncustomed Goods, and the re-landing of Goods exported by Certificate; it is thought fit, as well to promote her Majesty's Service, as to prevent Surprize to the Persons that may be concerned therein, to Publish the following Clauses in this Place.

**A**ND for preventing the Frauds which may be practised in unshipping, to be landed, any Pepper, Raisins, Mace, Cinnamon, Cloves, Nutmegs, Snuff, or any other sort of Goods whatsoever, subject to the Payment of Duties, without paying the same; as also to hinder the Importation of any sort of prohibited Goods into Great Britain; be it further Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That if any Pepper, Raisins, Mace, Cinnamon, Cloves, Nutmegs, Snuff, or any other sort of Goods whatsoever, liable to the Payment of Duties, shall be unshipped with Intention to be laid on Land (Customs, and other Duties, not being first paid or secured) or if any prohibited Goods whatsoever shall be Imported into any part of Great Britain, then not only the said uncustomed and prohibited Goods shall be forfeited and lost, but also the Persons who shall be assisting, or otherwise concerned in unshipping the said prohibited and uncustomed Goods, or to whose Hands the same shall knowingly come after

after the unshipping thereof, shall forfeit treble the value thereof, together with the Vessels and Boats, and all the Horses and other Cattle and Carriages whatsoever, made use of in the Landing, Removing, Carriage or Conveyance of any of the aforesaid Goods, one Moiety of all which Forfeitures and Penalties shall be to the use of her Majesty, and the other Moiety to him or them that will seize or sue for the same, to be recovered by Bill, Plaint or Information, wherein no Essoign, Protection, or Wager of Law shall be allowed.

And whereas by the Laws of this Realm, every Person importing Tobacco, and other Foreign Goods, from any part of Great Britain, is Entitled to a Drawback of part of the Duties paid or secured at the Importation thereof; And it hath been found

by Experience that great quantities of such Tobacco, and other Foreign Goods, after they have been shipped for Exportation, have been privately re-landed in this Realm; and the Remedies already provided by Law have not been sufficient to obviate a Practice so very prejudicial to her Majesty's Revenue, and to all fair and honest Traders in such Goods: For the better prevention whereof for the future, be it further Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That from and after the 27th of March 1710, in case any Tobacco, or other Foreign Goods, contained or specified in any Certificate, whereupon any such Drawback is to be made, or whereupon any D.venture is to be made for any such Drawback shall not be really and bona fide shipped and exported (the Danger of the Seas and Enemies excepted) or shall belanded again in any part of Great Britain, unless in case of Distress, to save the Goods from Perishing, which shall be presently made known to the Person or Persons which are, or shall be appointed by her Majesty to manage her Customs, or principal Officers of the Port, then not only all such Tobacco and other Certificate Goods shall be forfeited and lost, but also the Person or Persons (being the Exporters, or any others) who shall bring back, or cause, or procure to be re-landed such Tobacco and other Certificate Goods, or any of them, in any part of Great Britain, or be assisting, or otherwise concerned in the unshipping the same, or to whose Hands the same shall knowingly come after the unshipping thereof, or by whose Privy, Knowledge or Direction, the said Tobacco, and other Goods, or any part thereof, shall be so re-landed, shall forfeit double the amount of the said Drawback for such Goods, together with the Vessels and Boats, and all the Horses or other Cattle and Carriages whatsoever made use of in the Landing, Removing, Carriage, or Conveyance of the same, one Moiety of all which Penalties or Forfeitures shall be to the use of her Majesty, and the other Moiety to him or them that shall inform, seize or sue for the same, to be recovered by Bill, Plaint or Information in any of her Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Exchequer in Scotland, at any time or times within five Years after the Offence shall be committed, wherein no Essoign, Protection, or Wager of Law shall be allowed.

And it is hereby Enacted, That if any Officer of the Customs shall connive or assist in any Fraud relating to such Certificate Goods as aforesaid, such Officer (over and above any other Penalties, to which he is, or may be liable by this, or any other Act) shall forfeit his Office, and be rendered incapable of serving her Majesty for the future, and suffer six Months Imprisonment without Bail or Mainprize; and if any Master, Commander, or other Person belonging to any Ship or Vessel, shall assist in, or connive at the fraudulent Landing any such Certificate Goods as aforesaid, he, she, or they (over and above all other Penalties provided by this, or any other Act or Acts now in force) shall for every such Offence suffer Imprisonment by the space of six Months, without Bail or Mainprize.

And for preventing the running of Tobacco into this Kingdom, under pretence of exporting the same to Ireland; Be it Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That no Debenture shall be paid or allowed for any Tobacco exported from any part of Great Britain to the Kingdom of Ireland, until a Certificate shall be produced under the Hands and Seals of the Collector, Comptroller and Surveyor of the Customs of any Port in Ireland, or any two of them, where such Goods shall be landed, testifying the Landing thereof. (the Danger of the Seas or Enemies excepted) any Law to the contrary notwithstanding; which Certificate the Collector, Comptroller and Searcher of the Customs, or any two of them, of each Port in Ireland, are empowered and required to deliver forthwith upon the Discharge of such Tobacco, and not to take above one Shilling Fee for making out, and delivery of such Certificate.

And as a further Security of her Majesty's Revenues, both in Great Britain and Ireland, be it enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That the Master of every Ship carrying such Certificate Goods to Ireland, shall demand and take from the Collector of every respective Port of Great Britain, a Duplicate of his Content in Writing, certified under the Hand and Seal of the Collector and Comptroller of such Port (which said Duplicate the Collector and Comptroller of each Port in Great Britain, are hereby required to deliver to every Master without Fee or Reward) And such Master shall be obliged to deliver such Duplicate to the Officers of the Customs in Ireland, on his arrival, before he be permitted to land such Goods there.

And whereas an illegal Trade is usually carried on in small Vessels or Boats; be it enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That no Debenture shall be made forth, nor any Drawback be paid or allowed for any Tobacco exported to any place in any Ship or Vessel under the burthen of 20 Tuns, any Law, Statute or Usage to the contrary notwithstanding.
