Whitehall, June 21. Colonel Panton, Aid-de-Camp to the Duke of Marlborough, who came Express to Her Majesty with the News of the Surrender of Douay and Fort d'Escarpe, brings the following Particulars.

That the Enemy beat the Chamade on the 25th at Noon, and sent out three Officers at each Attack as Hostages, two of them being Majors-General: But they having no Orders to Capitulate for Fort d'Escarpe, were sent back that Evening with a Message to Monsieur Albergotti, that no Capitulation would be received unless the said Fort was included. The Cessation of Arms continued 'till ten a-Clock the next Morning, when the Enemy sent out the same Hostages again, and that Evening the Articles were agreed on, and sent back to Monsieur Albergotti to sign; and on the 27th the Gates were delivered up to the Allies. The material Articles are, That a Gate of the Town, and the Outworks of Fort d'Escarpe, should be delivered up on the 27th at 11 in the Morning. That the Garrison should march out within two Days, with the usual Marks of Honour, taking with them six Pieces of Cannon, two Mortars and six covered Waggons for the Town, and two Pieces of Cannon for Fort d'Escarpe, and were to be conducted to Cambay. Such of the Garrison as were willing to take Service in the Confederate Army were not to be hindered, and Deserters were to be restored. Hostages were to be left for Payment of the Debts due to the Town and Country, as well from the French King, as from any private Officer. Passports were to be given to two Officers, who were to acquaint the French King and Marshal Villars of the Capitulation. The Garrison in the Town were faithfully to discover their Mines and Magazines. The Families of the Officers are to have three Months time, and Passports granted them for withdrawing their Effects. Such Burghers as shall desire to depart, may do it within that time; but those that stay, if they have any Effects in the French King's Dominions, are to be permitted to withdraw them.
