THE Imperial Troops are in full March towards this Place. General Martini's Regiment of Horse is arrived at Orbassan; two Regiments of Infantry are come to Moncallier, and the rest of the Forces are so fir advanced, that the whole Army will be affembled on the 20th Instant. His Royal Highness hath reviewed the Cavalry, which was drawn up on a Plain between this City and the Venerie. We are advised from Genoa, that the Imperial Troops designed for the Service in Catalonia,

would be ready to embark at Vado on the 14th Instant.

Berlin, June 7. N. S. On the 1st Instant the King removed with the Court from Potsdam to Charlottenburg. from whence his Majesty came to this Place on the 4th, dised with the Feld-Marshal, and returned the same Night to Charlottenburg. Yesterday the King came hither again, in order to hold a Council of War, and dined with Monsieur Blaspiel, the Commissary-General. His Majesty had given Orders to lay a Tax upon all Houses throughout his Dominions, in order to build a Wall between every fifth House, to prevent the Damage which might otherwise happen by a Fire; but upon the general Complaint of the Inhabitants, and the Representations of the Magistrates of this City, his Majesty hath been pleased to recede from that Resolution. Monsieur Rantzaw, the Danish Euvey, had fome time since made a Contract with certain Merchants, for four thousand Horfer and two thousand Saddles; but this Agreement being made without the Confent or Knowledge of this Court. it is believed his Prussian Majesty will not permit that so great a number of Horses shall at this Juncture be sent

out of his Dominions.

On the 8th Inftant the House of the whole Commons resolved it self into a Committee of the whole House, to take into further Consideration the Supply granted to her Majesty, and came to a Refolution, that the said Supply be a Sum not exceeding 1229521. 12s. 3 q. On the ninth Instant this Resolution was reported from the Committee, and unanimously agreed unto by the House, together with several other Resoluand Servants of the House for their Attendance and Service this Session of Parliament. On the 10th the House resolved it self into a Committee, to take into Consideration Ways and Means for raising the Supply granted to her Majesty; and resolved that Additional Duties be laid upon Beer, Aie, and other Liquors, upon all Tobacco, and also en Muslins, Silks, or Stuffs made or manufactured in Persia, China, or the East-Indies, which shall be imported into this Kingdom from and after the 24th of June 1710, towards the Supply of 122952l. 125. 39. Resolved, That the the Supply of 1229521. 125. 3q. Resolved, That the Additional Duty of every thirty two Gallons of Beer and Ale above fix Shillings the Barrel, brewed within this Realm for Sale, be one Shilling and fix Pence, to be paid by the Brewer; and that the Additional Duty of every thirty two Gallons of, or under fix Shillings per Barrel, be three Pence. That an Additional Duty of three Pence be laid on every Gallon of Aquavitic, strong Waters, or Spirits, to be paid by the Maker or Distiller thereof. That the Additional Duty on Tobacco, that shall be imported after the 24th of June One thousand seven hundred and ten, be three Pence Half penny per Pound, over and above the Hereditary Duty of two Pence Half-penny per Pound, payable for the fame. That the Additional Duties on all Muslins be fix Pence per Yard; and on all Silks and

Stuffs made or manufactured in Perlia, China, or the East-Indies, which shall be imported into this Realm, one Shilling and fix Pence per Yard: All which Addi ional Duries are to be continued for a Year and an half, commencing the 25th day of June 1710, and ending the 24th of December 1711. To all which Resolutions of the Committee, the House did unanimously agree on the 12th Infant; and ordered Heads of a Bill to be brought in for granting a Supply to her Majesty on the said Resolutions. The same Day also Mr. Speaker reported, that the House, with their Speaker, attended his Excellency the Lord-Lieutenant on Saturday last, with Heads of a Bill for Encouragement of Tillage; and that they had defired his Excellency to recommend the same to her Majesty as a Bill of great Benefit to this Kingdom; that thereupon his Excellency was pleased to give the Answer following:

Will take Care to recommend this Bill to Her Majisty in the mest essectual manner, as I shall every thing that will be grateful to the Commons.

Which Answer was ordered to be entred in the Journals of the House. On the 13th the House resolved it self into a Committee, to take in o Consideration the Heads of a Bill for the better Instructing the Irish Papists in the Principles of the Church of Ireland as by Law Established; and having made some Progress therein, it was ordered to proceed further therein on Friday the 16th. Then the House resolved it selt into a Committee, to take into Confideration the Heads of a Bill for the Relief of Infolvent Debtors now in Confinement; and after some time spent therein, it was resolved to take the same into further Consideration the Day following. Several Master Gunsmiths having petitioned the House in behalf of themfelves, and the reft of the Protestant Guofmiths in this City and Kingdom, in relation to their Undertaking to make within a limited time a quantity of small Arms equally good, and as well finished, as can be made elsewhere, and at the like Prices; a felect Committee was appointed to examine the Allegations of the faid Petition, who resolved, that the Allegations in their retition were to the Satisfaction of the Committee, that they had delivered into the Ordnance, tried and approved Patterns of Firelocks, and had bought Materials fit for the faid Works which Refolutions were unanimously agreed unto by the It was hereupon resolved, that the House should Address her Majesty, that the will be graciously pleased to direct, that the remaining twelve thousand five hundred Arms not already contracted for in Great Britain for the Service of Ireland, be made in this Kingdom; a Committee was appointed to prepare the faid Address accordingly, and it was ordered, that it be an Instruction to the said Committee, to incert a Clause in the Address. to the land Committee, to incert a Claule in the Address, that her Majesty will be graciously pleased to direct, that such other Arms and Warlike Stores not already contracted for in Great Britain for the Service of Ireland, may be made in this Kingdom. The same Day a Bill, Entituled, An Act for the better securing to her Manially the Poyment of Sigh During as shall be greated to jefty the Payment of fuch Duties as shall be granted to her Majesty this Session of Parliament, was read a second time, and committed to a Committee of the whole House on the 14th.
