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Turin, June 11. N. S.

THE greater part of the General Officers of the Imperial Regiments are arrived here, and all the Troops, both Horse and Foot, are on their March this way. Yesterday General Martini's Regiment of Horse passed through this Place on their way to Orbassan, where all the Imperial Cavalry are to be encamped, before they advance towards the Mountains; their whole Infantry will also be speedily at their respective Rendezvous at Moncalier, Montenard and St. Balein. We have Advice, that the Prussian Troops refused to March out of their Winter Quarters in the Manuan, upon some Differences between them and the Imperial Commissaries, of which, as soon as the British and Dutch Ministers here were informed, they wrote both to the General who Commands those Troops, and to Marshal Daun, to endeavour to end the Dispute; so that the opening the Campaign may not be retarded for want of that Body of Troops. All his Royal Highness's Horse are to be encamped within few Days at Pancallie, his Foot being long since upon the Frontiers towards Suza, Coni and the Valley of Aost. His Royal Highness hath dispatched General Schulenburg, who is to Command the Troops in the Valley of Aost, from hence, upon Advice that the Enemies on that Frontier had made some Motion; but that Movement is looked upon as made only to take Possession of some Posts which they March into at the entrance of every Campaign. Marshal Daun is expected here within few Days from Milan. We have had so great Rains of late in these Parts, that his Royal Highness, with the Court, are returned hither from the Venerie sooner than they were expected.

Turin, June 18. N. S. Last Sunday Marshal Daun arrived here from Milan. All the German Troops which are to compose our Army, are arrived at their respective Quarters; but the March of the Prussian Troops is countermanded upon some new Difficulties about the Payment of what is due to those Troops. The British and Dutch Envoys have interposed in this Affair, and have prevailed with the Marshal to leave the decision of the Dispute to them; and an Express is dispatched to inform the Commanding Officer of this Resolution; so that it is hoped these Troops will immediately March. Last Week a Courier from Paris passed through this Place for Rome, to obtain the Pope's Permission for the Duke of Berry to Marry the Duke of Orleans's Daughter.

Genoa, June 15. N. S. The Regiment of General Brown, and that of General Ecks, arrived at Vado on the 10th Instant, which were embarked immediately on Board the Transports hired for that purpose; as were also the German and Italian Recruits the Day following, besides three hundred and fifty Horse for remounting of the Earl of Rochford's Dragoons. All these Troops being on Board, the Fleet set Sail on Thursday the 12th Instant, with a brisk and favourable Gale of Wind, the Body of the Fleet, with the Imperial Regiments and Italian Recruits, bearing towards Sardinia; and the Earl of Rochford's Regiment of Horse, with the Imperial Recruits, towards Barcelona, under the Convoy of two Men of War. This Division was made upon the Advice the Admirals received of the Enemy's being gone to make a Descent in Sardinia, with eight Gallies under the Command of the Duke de Turris, and a Body of two thousand Men under the Command of Lieutenant-General Joseph Armenduras, and two Brigadiers. The last Letters from Corsica bring us Advice, that those Gallies lay at an Anchor in Porto-

Vecchio in that Island, from whence they had sent a Felucca, with some of the Natives of Sardinia, to get Intelligence, who were taken and carried into Cagliari; upon which the Viceroy immediately ordered a Body of eight hundred Horse to Patrole all along the Coast, and another of about one thousand Foot to repair to the Places most suspected, laying a strict Command upon them to Fire upon every armed Person, and to disperse all Assemblies that were met together in order to take up Arms. Two of the Pope's Gallies arrived here on the 11th, being come to fetch a considerable Sum of Money which this Republick has lent them at Interest, whereof the Principal is to be repaid in 4 Years. Yesterday two of this Republick's Gallies returned hither from Corsica, with Monsieur Paillippo Catanco, late Governor of that Island, he being succeeded by the Marquis de Reverole.

Vienna, June 18. N. S. On the 9th Instant the Emperor reviewed at Schonborn the Regiment of Rocca-vion, on its March from Hungary to the Upper Rhine; it consisted of one thousand Horse compleat, well mounted, and in very good order. On the 11th his Imperial Majesty removed with the Court to the New Favourite. Yesterday they went to Laxemburg for the Diversion of Hawking, where the great Faulkner prepared a curious Artificial Firework for their Entertainment; and this Day the whole Court returned to the Favourite. Monsieur Urbich, the Envoy of the Czar of Muscovy, returned lately from Poland to this City. He passed through Hungary in his way hither, and had a Conference with Prince Ragotski, to whom he complained of the Reception of his Czarish Majesty's Enemies into his Service: That Minister had also Instructions to mediate a Peace between the Emperor and the Hungarians, and was ordered to make some Proposals of Accommodation. Prince Ragotski and Prince Berezeni acquainted him with the Terms upon which they would enter into a Treaty, which consisted in the same Points as their former Demands; that his Imperial Majesty should grant a general Pardon; that the Fundamental Laws of the Kingdom should be established, the quiet Possession of their Estates secured, and such as have been already confiscated be restored to their Posterity. Monsieur Urbich, at his Departure, took with him a Quarier Master General, as a Deputy from the Malecontents for the further Explanation of these Articles; but at Presburg this Deputy was seized and imprisoned by the Command of Marechal Palfi, under pretext that he had no Passport. Monsieur Urbich highly resents the Behaviour of General Palfi on this occasion, for arresting a Gentleman that had put himself under his Protection, and hath delivered a Memorial to the Emperor upon this Subject, in which he also insists on a Demand, that the Emperor should give the Czar the Title of Majesty. The Court hath given an Answer in Writing to that Memorial, containing in Substance, That the Emperor is very much surprized, that the Minister of the Czar of Muscovy should make any Overtures of Accommodation, or receive any Proposals from the Malecontents, without the Participation of this Court; and that this Officer, who came as Deputy from the Hungarians, not being a Domestic of that Minister, they think he hath no manner of right to protect him. We do not hear that there is any Answer returned to that part of the Memorial relating to his Master's Demand of the Title of Majesty. Prince Eugene having desired that two Regiments of Horse and four Battalions of Foot be forthwith sent from the Upper Rhine to the Low Countries, this Court hath consented that the Regiments of Prince Emanuel
