N the 16th Instant Monsieur Lionstadt, the Swedish Envoy, delivered the King four Letters from the King of Sweden, which were brought by the last Courier that passed through this Town from Bander; but his Dispatches not being opened 'till he came to Wismar in the Lower Saxony, these Letters were sent back from thence after the Messenger's Arrival. The first was a Letter of Congratulation on the Birth of his Pruf-fun Majefty's Grand Daughter. The fecond complained of the Violation of the Treaty of Alt-Ranstadt, of which Treaty the King of Prusha was a Guarantee. The third related to the War which the King of Denmark had enred into against Sweden, and reminded his Prussian Majefly of his being also a Guarantee of the Treaty of Altons. By the last, the King of Sweden fignified, that he had been pleafed to honour his Envoy at this Court, and Monsieur Friezendorf at the Court of Hanover, with the Titles of Privy Counfellors; and thereupon the Envoy delivered his Letters of Revocation, and is preparing to lave this Court. The fame Courier brought also the King of Sweden's Orders for the Promotion of several General Officers. Since the Danish Envoy hath received his Master's Ratification of a Contract made with a Merdant of this City for two thousand Horses he hath been furtheir Exportation, and hath obtained a Passport for ight hundred Horses, but with this Restriction, that it k fufficiently attested the Horses were not bought in his Prefine Majesty's Dominions. affembling an Army, repairing and building Fortifications on the Frontiers; but by o her Intelligence, we are affured that they will religiously observe their late Treaty with the Muscovites.

Cepenhagen, July 1. N. S. On the 15th of the last Month Vice Admiral Raab came into the Sound with his Squadron, from cruifing off of Gottenburg and Mael-fleand, and having laid in a fufficient quantity of Provifions, he failed on the 21st in Company with a Squadron under the Command of Vice-Admiral Barfuse, to join Admiral Guldenlew. The same Day the Admiral, who had lain some time on the Coast of this Island, in the Mouth of the East-Sea, sailed towards the Island of Rugen, with a Design to engage the Swedish Fleet, which was then cruising off of that Island. The Dusish Fleet being joined by the Squadrons of the Vice-Admirals Raab and Barfuse, confisted of twenty seven Men of War of the Line of Ba tel, befides a great number of Frigats. That of Sweden was faid to exceed ours in number; but we are advifed, that at the Approach of our Fleet they retired to Carlfcroon. We have this Day received Intelligence by the Mafter of a Swedish Vessel that was brought in from Stockholm, that the Swedes continued in their Harbour, and that the Danes were then cruifing on the Coast of Bornholm, between that Island and Rugen. Since the Departure of Vice Admiral Raab from before Gottenburg. we are advised, that the Enemy are refitting a Squadron of fourteen Frigats to cruize at the Mouth of the Baltick. Upon this Intelligence the Merchant Fleet bound for Ireland, which is ready to Sail, is detained in this Port, because the Merchants do not think the Convoy of three Frigats which are appointed to attend them fufficient for their Security. An Embargo is laid on feveral Vessels in our Harbour, which we hear are to be employed in transporting the Reinforcements from Livonia, wherewith the Czar hath promised to affife his Danish Majesty. These Troops will amount to fix thousand Foot and two thousand Horse, and the Czar is to maintain them at his own Expense. The Officers have received Orders to buy Baggage-Horfes for their Regiments at their own Charge, and to be in a readiness to take the Field the Middle of this Month. The King hath promised to repay them for the Horses, and to allow for their Porage during that time, there not being sufficient Magazines for that Service. It is said two new Regimen's are to be raised in Norway; and it appears by the List of our Forces, that the Army will amount to twen your thousand fix hundred twenty four Foot, fix thousand fix hundred Horse, and five thousand Dragoons. On the 28th of the last Month the Swedish Hostages for Carelshaven were sent over to Schonen from Elliuore; but those for Christianfladt are detained at Caffeur, and the Danes refuse to enlarge them before the Contributions of twelve thousand Crowns, which were demanded of that Town, are fully paid. The Regulation made by this Court for the Privateers, having very much injured the Trade of the British Nation and the United Provinces in the Baltick this Summer, his Danish Majesty bath suspended it at the In-stances of the Queen of Great Britain and the States General, untill fuch time as they come to an Agreement with the King of Denmark, concerning the feveral Ar i-cles of that Regulation.
