

# The London Gazette.

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Falmouth, May 18.

**T**He 12th instant sayled hence the *Marigold* of London for *Rochel*, to lade Salt for *Newfoundland*. The next day passed before this Harbor, about 12 sayl of Merchant ships from *Plymouth* with two Convoyors bound for *Newfoundland*. The *St Jacob* of this place which entred here for *Holland* may put to sea with the first fair Wind.

*Lyme*, May 20 On Thursday and Friday last some Fleets of about 20 Sayl were seen plying up to the Eastwards many of them great ships.

*Genova*, May 14. The 11th instant his Excellency the Lord *Faulconbridge* arrived at *Savona*, where he was immediately attended and complimented by the Master of the Ceremonies and several Officers of this Republick with the Captain of the Gally which had three days attended in that Port for his transportation; all those went before him, who followed in his Sedan, and conducted him to the Gally, through a guard of the soldiers of the Garison; at his embarking he was welcomed with a salute of four Guns and a volley of all their small shot.

The Governour of *Savona* who could not prevail with his Excellency to reside himself at his house, as he passed through the Town, made him a visit on board the Gally, upon whose return the Gally launching out a little from the Port within view of the Fort of *Savona*; the said Fort saluted him with 26 Guns, which the Gally answered with four, which was all she had, though a large Gally of 57 Banks, 280 Slaves, and 200 soldiers then on board, and was to carry double that number in time of wars.

His Excellency was very honourably treated and entertained aboard this Gally whilst she made way towards this place, at whose approach another of the States Gallies came out, having on board four Gentlemen of the best Quality and principal Nobility, deputed by the Senate to compliment his Excellency; this Gally fell to the Stern of that which carried his Excellency, and gave him a salute of four Guns, and then the four Gentlemen put themselves into their Feluca and came on board, whom his Excellency received without the door of his Cabin.

The Gally entering this Port, saluted the City with four Guns, which the Castle returned with about 40, all the ships in the Port as well Dutch as English, saluting his Excellency with their Guns.

His Excellency landing with his Train, was conducted to the Palace prepared for him, where he was honourably entertained, and received the visits of the Nobility; amongst others, he was attended by two persons who had been formerly Dukes of this place, who came on foot to visit him; and complimented him in the name of the Republick.

Yesterday his Excellency was conducted to his Audience by Signior *Ugo Fiesco*, who had been formerly employed Ambassador to *England*, accompanied by most of the Nobility, who went on foot to the Palace; at the foot of the stairs His Excellency was met by four of the Senators, who conducted him into the room where the Duke and Senate was assembled. The Duke upon his appearance, immediately descended from the Throne and met his Excellency half way in the room; and returning to his Throne, his Excellency was seated on his left hand, where he delivered his Letters of Credence, and had his Audience;

which ended, he returned to his Palace in the same Order as he came, and this day begins his conference with six persons, deputed to treat with him upon the subject of his negotiation, which he hopes to conclude in five days.

*Vienna*, May 16. The Count, *Serini* is of late fallen into so great a melancholly, that he will not admit of any conversation or divertissement.

This day arrived here a Courier some days since dispatched by his Imperial Majesty to *Constantinople*, to sound the intentions of the Ottoman Court, and to find out what concernment they had in the Commissions of *Hungary*; but the Emperor being absent, we cannot satisfy our curiosities in this point.

The principal Nobility of *Hungary* are cited to attend his Imperial Majesty at his return hither, to consult with him about the present state and posture of affairs in that kingdom, and to take Orders for the raising of forces.

Three hundred Masons and other workmen are sent away to be employed for the compleating and perfecting the new Fort at *Leopold*, The Turks draw together their forces, which administers some cause of jealousy to us, that they may have a design to encourage the disaffected party in that Kingdom.

Prince *Ragotski* seems to desire to make his peace with the Emperor, and submit himself to his obedience, but the Imperial forces still march forwards to their Rendezvous near *Tyrnaw*, where *Charles* Prince of *Lorraine* is to enter upon his Charge as General of the Cavalry.

The Count *Strasoldo*, or *Strassond*, Governour of *Zatmar*, having defeated a considerable body of the *Hussars*, and taken many of their horses, has since destroyed all the Mills about the Countrey, and seized on all the Corn and conveyed it into his Garison.

His Imperial Majesty has been lately pleased to admit into his Council the Count *de Princenstein*, Marshal of the *Lower Hungary*, and Count *Sigmund de Dietrichstein*.

The Empress *Eleanor* has lately received Letters from their Majesties of *Poland*, acquainting her with the conspiracy amongst several of the great men of that kingdom for the disturbance of that Government. From *Poland* we are farther informed, that the disaffected party of that Kingdom had sent 3000 men who were marching towards *Hungary* for the assistance of Prince *Ragotsky*, but the King of *Poland* having timely intelligence of their motions, had ordered several Regiments to march after them and to charge them, if they would not otherwise be persuaded to return.

The 13th instant passed over the *Danube* at *Dobing*; several Regiments lately employed under General *Spankaw* in *Croatia*. The Emperor has ordered, that all his Army with his Artillery and Waggon, laden with Ammunition, shall march with all speed towards *Upper Hungary*.

*Vienna*, May 16. The Waters overflowing by reason of our late great Rains, their Imperial Majesties were stopped in their way to our Lady of *Celles*, a place of great Devotion, and were constrained to stay till the 13th instant at *Gedenstein*, from whence they departed the next day, and came that Evening to *Heimfeld*.

General *Spankaw* is returned from the Island *Serini*, General *Spork* is ordered to fall upon the Rebels of *Hungary* wheresoever he shall find them in Arms.

The 13th instant arrived here a Courier with Letters from Prince *Ragotsky* to the Emperor, and others directed to the principal Ministers and Officers of his Court, begging

going once more for a pardon, offering to dismise his for-  
saken to be for the future a faithful subject to the Empe-  
rour. He is now about *Serenzia* with an Army of near  
4000 men but his Companies are observed to de-  
cure his people every day deserting his service.

Yesternay their Imperial Majesties arrived at *Colles* and  
may be expected back at *Luxembourg* on Tuesday next.

The *Bassa* of *Buda* being informed of the march of the  
Imperial forces into *Fungary*, has sent to all the Empe-  
rour's Governors in the Towns lying upon the frontiers of  
his Government, to know the Emperour's design, whether  
he has any intentions to break the peace establish'd be-  
tween the two Empires.

*Venice*, May 17. On Monday last arrived here the Ge-  
neral and Marquis de *St Andre Montbrun*, having since  
the surrender of *Candia* been employed in visiting the  
Islands and Fortifications of *Cefalonia* and *Corfu*, which  
he has altered and repaired and put into an excellen-  
t posture of defence, of which he intends in few days to give an ac-  
count to the Senate: at his arrival he was met and con-  
ducted into this City by many of the Nobility and prin-  
cipal Officers who attended on him to his house, and intend  
to make part of his Train at the time when he is to give his  
publick attendance on the Colledge: with him is returned  
Cavalier *Veracida*, a French man and chief Engineer, who  
gained much reputation during the siege of *Candia*, whose  
services have been publickly acknowledged by the Senate,  
they conferred on him the charge of Superintendent-Ge-  
neral or Master of the Ordinance.

The Turks prepare for war, especially by less, fitting up  
all their men of war and Gallies, but as yet nothing can be  
guessed of their intentions. The Knights of *Malta* have  
some apprehensions of their designs and are making timely  
preparations for their defence, by repairing and strengthen-  
ing their fortifications, and storing their magazines with  
provisions and Ammunition, and all other things which they  
can imagine necessary for their support during a long siege,  
and have assigned the sum of 40 thousand Crowns to be  
immediately issued out for this service.

The last week the whole City made their Bonfires in tes-  
timony of the satisfaction they receive'd by the welcome  
news of the election of Pope *Clement X.* and about the  
same time the Senate made choice of four persons to be em-  
ployed to *Rome* as their Ambassadors of obedience, viz.  
the Procurators *Andrea Contarini*, *Alvise Savedo*, *Gio.  
Battista Nani*, and *Silvestro Valieri*.

On Saturday last, Signior Cavalier *Morosini*, brother  
to General *Morosini*, the Extraordinary Procurator, was  
made choice of to be sent Ambassador in Ordinary to *Rome*.

Cavalier *Grimaldi*, a Sicilian, who has for several  
years been employ'd in the service of this Republick, and  
given frequent proofs of his great valor and excellent con-  
duct, is upon his return entertained as a General, and an  
allowance settled on him of 3000 Ducats yearly during the  
time of peace. Colonel *Rados* also who boldly hazarded  
his life to defend the breaches in *Candia*, where he receiv-  
ed many wounds and lost one of his arms, is confirmed  
in his charge of Commander of all the foreign forces in  
*Dalmatia*, and on Monday last was honoured with the Ti-  
tle of Count, and Knight of *St Mark*.

On Thursday last being *Ascension day*, the Duke and  
Senate went with a great Train of Gondolas according  
to custom, to the mouth of the sea at *Lido*, whither great  
numbers of strangers, whose curiosities brought them to  
this place, accompanied them, and amongst others, the  
Prince *Ernest of Haffia*, and the French and Spanish Am-  
bassadors, the Nuncio, and other Ministers of State, who  
appeared in rich Gondolas, and were no small addition to  
the solemnity of that day.

*Paris*, May 31. On Monday last arrived here from  
*Spain* the Duke de *Villa Hermosa* on his way to *Brussels*,  
where he is to enter upon his Charge of General of the  
Hosts.

The Count de *Vivonne* is in few days to put to sea,  
with 12 of His Majesties Gallies to joyn with the Squa-

dron under the Command of the *Sieur de Martel* now  
before *Tunis* to make war upon that place, these Vessels  
being thought most proper for that Service, and will be  
brought nearer to the Land then the men of War, the  
design being principally upon the Fort of *Guletra*.

In *Languedoc* has been lately an insurrection of about  
three or four thousand of the Inhabitants, who took armes  
to oppose the leaving of a new Custom layd upon their  
Wines, to detract part of the Charge of the new Chan-  
nel for the conjunction of the two Seas. These people  
killed some of the Officers employed in the Collection  
of their Monies, but fearing they should be brought to  
a severe account for this action, are since fled to the  
Mountains.

The Miquilliers or Mountaineers near *Rouffillon* not  
daring to keep the Field against the forces, under the  
Command of the Count de *Chamilly*, have quitted *Ar-  
les*, into which the Count has put a strong Garrison, and  
are retired to their fastnesses, from whence they fell  
suddenly upon a party of the Counts forces which were  
separated from his G.O's, and intercepting the pass by  
which they were to return made them all Prisoners.

His Majesty has Ordered 40 Troops of Horse to  
march towards the Frontiers of *Lorraine*, to perswade  
the Duke of *Lorain* to take off the Customes there esta-  
blish'd upon all goods passing to and fro between that Coun-  
treay and *France*, which is extremely prejudicial to the  
three Bishopricks of *Thoul*, *Metz* and *Verdun*.

The 20th instant their Majesties with the whole Court  
arrived at *Oudenard*, the 21 at *Courtray*, and the 22 at  
*Lille*, in all which places they were received with all  
imaginable pomp and ceremony, and entertained with  
Fireworks, the King in all places taking a view of the  
fortifications and Garrisons. The 23 instant his Majesty  
gave Audience at *Lille* to the English Ambassador, to  
the Spanish Commissioners, and to the Heer *Opdam*, En-  
voye from the States of the *United Provinces*. The next  
day, Madam, accompanied by the Marechal du *Plessis  
Praslin*, &c. and attended by several Officers of her  
Houhold, went thence for *Dunkirk*, where she intended  
to embark for *England*.

*Musa Ferraca*, Envoye Extraordinary from the Grand  
Signior, having some days since taken his leave of Mon-  
sieur de *Lionne*, Secretary of State, and received from  
him dispatches for the Emperor his Master and the Cay-  
nacham, departed the 29th instant on his way for *Thou-  
lon*, whither he is to be speedily followed by the *Sieur  
de Nozinet*, who is to be employed as Envoye Extra-  
ordinary to *Constantinople*, and to embark with the said  
*Musa Ferraca*.

*London*, May 25. This Morning early His Royal  
Highness returned again to *Dover* where the Court still  
continues, and may do for some days longer till the re-  
turn of Her Royal Highness the Dutchess of *Orleans*,  
whose affairs will not permit her to enter so far into the  
Kingdom as to visit this City.

His most Christian Majesty with his Court went the  
22 instant still. Yet from *Dunkirk* to *Callis*, and the  
23 went thence to *Bologne*.
