Venice, July 11. N. S.

Yesterday a Frenchman called Arrus, a Domestick of the Grand Prior Vendosme, murdered a young Woman of the same Nation, and that lived in the same Family, by giving her seven Stabs with a Penknife. This Fact was committed at Noon Day in a Publick-House in the middle of the City, and in the presence of many Spectators, yet the Murderer made his Escape before the Officers of Justice came to Apprehend him. The Senate hath lately published an Edict for the Establishment of a new Capitation, as well in this City as on the Terra-firma. We hear from Naples, that Don Antonio Galluzzo, Secretary of War to the Marquis de los Balbasos, Viceroy of Sicily, was fled from Messina with a great Sum of Money belonging to the Military Cash, which he gave out he would carry to Barcelona, and take the Advantage of four Neapolitan Men of War that lay ready in the Bay of Naples to sail for Spain, for the Transportation of it. They write from Rome, that the Pope had in some measure recovered his Strength, but was not able to assist at the publick Functions of the Festival of St. Peter. It is said, that the Court of Rome will not name a Nuntio to this State, nor our Senate an Ambassador to that See, until the Marquis de Prie shall have appeared in the Pope's Chapel in his publick Character, and have decided the Dispute with the Constable Colonna, concerning the Ceremonial.

Vienna, July 12. N. S. The Envoy of Muscovy residing here is gone to Carlsbad, to wait upon the Prince of Muscovy, and to attend other Affairs which require his Presence in that City. This Court hath been some time alarmed at the Preparations which the Swedish Troops in Pomerania have made for a March, but places a Confidence in the good Measures that have been taken at the Hague, to preserve the Tranquillity of the Empire from being molested by the Northern War. We have received Advice from Naples, that the two Regiments of Vaubonne and Thaur, are on their March towards Milan, and will be in Lombardy the latter end of this Month. The Differences between the Regency of Mantua and the Prussian Troops being adjusted, those Troops marched on the 19th of the last Month out of their Quarters, in order to join the Army in Piedmont. The Bishop of the five Churches is returned hither from Milan, to negotiate his private Affairs in these Parts. Letters from Bologna advise, that several armed Saxons and other Germans are come into that Kingdom, in small Companies, with Passports from Dresden, who have dispersed themselves in the Northern Parts of Bohemia: and endeavour to exasperate the People against the Government, by representing their Exactions as very heavy, especially that of the Excise, which is lately Established in that Kingdom; which, together with the Severity of the Landlords, has made the common People very uneasy. The Cause of their coming into that Kingdom not being known, they are considered, till some Judgment can be made of their Intentions from further Intelligence. Our last Advices from Hungary say, that General Heister was decamped from the Neighbourhood of Raab, and marched with his Army towards Upper Hungary; it was expected that he would be joined by a Body of five thousand Men from Transilvania; and then that he would endeavour to engage the Malecontents to a Battle.

Berlin, July 19. N. S. Last Monday, after the Ceremony of the Installation of Count de Hanau was ended, the King went to Keprnick. His Majesty dined the next Day with the Prince-Royal at Wusterhausen, where he lodged that Night, and on Wednesday returned to one of his Palaces, called Rudow, from whence he came to

Town yesterday Morning. To Morrow he designs to return again into the Country; so that Monsieur Ranzau will not now find an Opportunity of having his Audience in Town, as he expected. During his Majesty's absence, the Count de Hanau visited the Palaces of Oranienburg and Potsdam, but having received Intelligence yesterday by an Express, that the French were resolved to pass the Rhine, he took his leave of this Court in order to return to Hanau with the utmost Expedition, that he may take all possible Precautions for the Security of his Country. Last Wednesday his Majesty received a Letter from the Czar, to acquaint him with the Surrender of Wyburg. The Courier that brought this Letter proceeded on his Journey towards Copenhagen, with Dispatches for the King of Denmark. The Saddles and other Accoutrements that the Danish Envoy bought in this Kingdom for the Cavalry of that Nation, are preparing to be sent to Copenhagen. Letters from Warsaw of the 11th Instant say, that several Detachments of Muscovites passed daily through that City, on their March to reinforce the Army of his Polish Majesty in Prussia. The Army of the Crown was encamped at Niskow, and that of Lithuania near Julodoua. The last Advices from Bender say, that the Cham of Grim Tartary had assembled a Body of ten thousand Men within half a League of that Place, to serve the King of Sweden as a Guard in his Passage to his Dominions; but that his Majesty resolved to wait the Return of Monsieur Poniatowski, whom he had sent to the Ottoman Port, before he would leave Bender. They add, that the Palatine of Kiow was also with the Cham of Tartary. The Minister of the Elector of Hanover residing here has received his Master's Instructions, to inform this Court, that the Election of Great Treasurer of the Empire is determined in his Favour, and to thank his Prussian Majesty for his Vote and good Offices in that Affair. Our last Advices from the Camp before Riga import, that the Muscovites having prevented the Swedish Vessels from approaching the Town on the Dwina, that the Garrison being distressed for want of Provisions, weakened by Sickness, and despairing of Relief, it was believed the Governor would capitulate within few Days; that Felt-Marshal Czeremetoff had acquainted him with the Surrender of Wyburg, representing the Danger of his longer Obstinacy, when he had no prospect of Relief; and had assured him, that if he desired to deliver up the Town upon honourable Terms, he must not wait the last Extremity; but the Governor had not returned any Answer to this Summons at the time of the Dispatch of these Advices.

Whitehaven, July 16. Yesterday the Speedwell's Prize-Captain Parker Commander, came into our Road with the Anne Galley, and the Humility, from Chester; but a Storm arising suddenly at West, the two last were forced from their Anchors, and put on Shore in this Bay, and being laden with Coals, were both sunk; the Anne is since got into the Harbour, some of her Cargo of Merchants Goods being damaged, but the other lies still on the Sand in danger of being quite destroyed. Our Coal Fleet waits only a fair Wind to set sail with Capt. Parker for Dublin.

Dartmouth, July 18. Yesterday was sent into this Road, by Her Majesty's Ship the Colchester, on Suspicion, the Maria of Biboa, from Cadix, laden with Wooll, Soap, and other Merchandize for Amsterdam.

Bristol, July 18. This Day came in Her Majesty's Ship the Bridgewater, and under her Convoy five Vessels from Cork. At the same time came in the St. Cusse of and from Bilbao, and the Nuestra Señora del Rosario of and from Vigo, with Iron and Wine.
