Florence, July 15. N. S.

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Efferday two British Men of War, one of which is called the Conturion, arrived at Leghorn from England. Three Days before their arrival they maded through the French Fleet bound from the Levant or Marseilles, confishing of sixty Sail under Convoy of ight Men of War. The Allies have disposed of their thet in the Mediterranean, in the most proper Method to intercept this Convoy: Nine Men of War have been for some time cruising before the Port of Ma seilles, to wait for their arrival, which have fines been joined by fifteen Seil under the Command of Sir John Norris; fo that it will be very difficult for them to avoid falling in with the Conf derates before they can touch at any Port in France. These British Men of War in their Voyage from England put in at Gibralian, where they had an Account, that the Ambuscade had attacked a large French Ship before the Streights Mouth, valued at one hundred and firty thouland Picces of Eight, which fireck after fome Opposition, but blew up before the Ambulcade builded her; all her Men, (except two who were taken up from floaring on some broken Planks) were drowned. and two other Ships that were in Company with this Vessel that surrendred, bound for St. Maloes from Marseilles, made their Escape because of this Disaster. The Ambufade had fix'y Men killed or wounded in the Action; and being very much damaged in her Sails and Rigging, was obliged to fail for Lasbon to refit. Letters from Rome of the 12.h fay, that the Pope continued indisposed; that he had held a new Congregation to adjust the Equivalent with the Imperial Commissaries for the charge of the new Fortifications of Commachio; and that a Learned Professor of Divinity in the Sapienza had been accused of Janlenilm, and committed to the Castle of St. Angelo by the Office of the Inquifition.

Genos, July 17. N. S. The French Fleet laden with Corn from the Levant was feen some Days ago in the Latitude of this Place, failing towards Provence; and two Tartans were dispatched from hence to give them Intelligence that the Confederate Fleet was cruising on that Coast, in expectation of their Arrival. The Galleys of the Duke of Tursis which are ordered to fail for Corsica, to take on Board the Soldiers that saved themselves on that Island after the Milcarriage of their Expedition on Sardinia, are detained in this Harbour, the Duke having received Intelligence that seven British Men of War were cruising near that Island.

Milan, July 19. N. S. The Duke of Modena hath paid the Imperial Commissary the remainder of the Sum which was demanded for his Contribution. They write from Turin, that the Duke of Savoy, and the Royal Family, were recevered of their Sickness, and would speedly remove to St. George for the benefit of the Air; that General Thaun set out for the Army on the 12th lastant, which was to be assembled at Demont on the 16th; that General Rhebinder had already possessed himself of some Posts near Briançon, and that the Enemy had assembled their Ferces in the Neighbourhood of that Place, at Guillestre, and in the Vallies of Queiras and Barceloaette.

Hague, August 1. N. S. The Plenipotentiaries of the respective Potentates of the Alliance, being fully satisfied that the Enemy have not yet entertained any serious Thoughts of a general Peace, that they would clude the Execution of the thirty seventh Article, and that their Endarous have tended more to distunite the Allies, than to refer the Tranquility of Europe, are returning to their serial Course; some are already gone, and others are

preparing fortheir Departure. Count Zinzendorf return ed on the 30th of the last Month from the Army, and defines to fee out focedily for Vienna. We hear, that the figns to fee out speedily for Vienna-Miniflers of France trade a Vilit to the Mareschalde Villars on their way to Paris. Several Conferences have lately been held here in order to fecure the Empire from any. Oftend, August 3. N. S. Our last Advices from the Camp say, that on Thursday the 31st of July the whole French Army, under the Command of Marshal Villars, marched to Avesne le Comte, with a design, 22 they gave out, to offer us Battel, having lest their heavy Engage at Arras and Bappaume. The Duke of Marsborough having observed their Mosions, immediately commanded the Detachments from several Posts to join the Army, and prepared to receive them, extending his Forces along the Souchet, and encamping with his Lest at Viller au Bois near Mont St. Eloy, and his Right at Viller-Brulin. Bo h Armies continued all that Night in order of Battel; the next Morning the Duke of Marsborough and the other Generals having observed their Encampment, sound that they were only employed in casting up new Trenches, from the Source of the Scarpe to that of the Canche.
