Lisbon, July 25. N. S.

**S**INCE the Armies retired into Quarters of Refreshment, the Enemy have made frequent Incurfions into the Frontier Provinces. A Detachment of five hundred Horse and Dragoons and four hundred Grenadiers have taken the City of Miranda de Duero by Escalade, which being above fixty Leagues distant from the Camp, was surprized, and the Garrison made Prisoners of War without any Opposition. Since this Succes they have ravaged the adjoining part of the Province of Traloes Montes. A less Party hath also made an Incurfion into Lower Aleyra, and carried off seven hundred head of Cattle. This manner of Hostility hath been introduced by the Marquis de Bay, who hath been formerly a great Partisan in Flanders. Although these Incurfions are seldom attended with any other Consequences than alarming the People, yet for the Tranquility as well as Safety of the Frontiers, Orders are sent to assemble the Troops, and a Detachment from Alenteis is already marched into Aleyra.

**Berlin, July 26. N. S.** On Sunday last the King went to Charlottenburg, and the next Day removed to Oranienburg, at which Place he was met by the Queen on Wednesday, where the Court still continues. On Wednesday the 23d Instant the Grand Chambellan was seized with a violent Fever. His Majesty and the Prince-Royal have visited him in his Sickness, and the whole Court seems to have a very tender Concern for his Welfare. His Physicians, notwithstanding the violence of his Distemper, have hopes of his Recovery. Monsieur Cline, who was formerly Envoy from the Duke of Mecklenburg to this Court, at the time of his Majesty's Marriage, and was since made a Privy-Councillor to the Queen, returned yesterday from Mecklenburg, with Directions for the Payment of great Sums of Money belonging to her Majesty. The Baron Knyphausen designs this Day to set out for Copenhagen. The Merchant that contracted to furnish the King of Denmark with two thousand Horses, not being permitted to export so great a number out of his Prussian Majesty's Dominions, is gone to Hamburg, where he designs to supply himself with a sufficient number to fulfil his Agreement. Letters from Mittau of the 15th Instant say, that the Town and Cittadel of Riga were surrendered to the Muscovites on the 13th; that before the Place was invested the Garrison consisted of eight thousand Men, but that eight hundred only remained, who, according to the Capitulation, were to be transported to Stockholm. It is also stipulated in the Articles, that the Town shall be restored to the Crown of Poland, and re-established in its Ancient Privileges. The new Garrison is composed of Saxons and Muscovites. The Fort of Dunamunder being lately reinforced with fresh Troops from Sweden, hath not yet offered to surrender; but it is said there is a great Mortality in the Place, and that it is straitened for want of Provisions. Pernaui was invested fifteen Days before the Dispatch of these Advices by eight thousand Muscovites under the Command of General Bauer.

**Copenhagen, July 29. N. S.** The King hath signed the Ratification of a Treaty for a Defensive Alliance lately concluded between his Majesty and the Elector of Hannover. On Sunday the 27th Instant Publick Thanksgiving were in all the Churches of this City, for the Surrender of Wyburg to the Muscovites; and the Cannon on the Ramparts were thrice fired on this Occasion. Yesterday a Dutch Fleet, consisting of sixty Sail, arrived at Elfsaore from Holland, under Convoy of four Men of War: Another Fleet of forty Sail parted from them at the Mouth of the Sound, being bound for Norway. At Categate they fell in with ten Swedish Men of War, who strictly examined if there were no Danish Vessels in their Company.

**Francfort, July 30. N. S.** Advices from the Upper Rhine say, that on the 27th Instant the Imperial Army marched from Germerheim, and encamped at Rhein-Zabern; that General Gronsfeldt had commanded the Bridge of Boats that lay on the Rhine to be brought up to Schreck, for the Security of the Communication between the Imperial Camp and the Lines of Erlingen, and had posted a considerable Detachment of Horse and Foot at the Head of it; that the General hath commanded the Troops that were thrown into Landau, when the Enemy approached that City, to rejoin the Army, and was making Dispositions to attack the Enemy's Lines, to which they have lately added new Fortifications. Letters from Bern of the 27th Instant say, that some of the Burghers of that Town being dissatisfied that they were omitted in the last Election of a Sovereign Council, had entered into a Conspiracy against the Regency; but the Plot being opportunely discovered, five of the principal Offenders had been seized and banished, and a diligent search was made to apprehend their Accomplices.

**Hague, August 5. N. S.** The Marquis de Ruéini is arrived here from Florence, with the Character of Envoy-Extraordinary from the Great Duke of Tuscany. Count Rechteren is set out for Germany, and the Count de Stanian is preparing for his Departure. Advices from Paris of the 2d Instant say, that on the 30th of the last Month the Marschal d'Uxelles and the Abbot de Polignac gave the King a full Account of their Negotiations; that his Majesty approved of their Proceedings, and received them with all possible instances of perfect Satisfaction in the discharge of their Commission; and as a further Mark of his favour, had bestowed on the Abbot de Polignac the Abby of Mouzon. Letters from Madrid of the 22d of July say, that both Armies on the Frontiers of Catalonia were encamped in their former situations; and that the Reinforcements which Admiral Norris had transported from Italy had joined the Confederate Army.

**Brussels, August 6. N. S.** Yesterday at three in the Morning the Tartan du Moulin, with one hundred Dragoons and three hundred Foot, entered the Town of Louvain. They ranged themselves on the Market-Place, and after having seized several of the Guards, summoned the Magistrate to deliver up the Keys of the Gates, but the Burghers having ordered the Alarm to be sounded, the Burghers assembled under Arms, in order to Attack the Enemy,

Enemy, which they perceiving, retired with great Precipitation; they had several Men killed and wounded in the retreat, by the small Arms and Cannon of the Castle, where the Garrison, composed of Regular Troops, are in a condition of making a good Defence. The same Partisan having roided some Days in this Neighbourhood with a strong Party, and presented themselves every Night at one or other of the Gates, all possible Precautions are taken to prevent a Surprize, and this Garrison has been reinforced by one hundred and fifty Men from Antwerp, and two hundred and fifty from Louvain.

Ostend, August 8. N. S. The last Advices from the Frontiers say, that the Armies are encamped in their former Posts; that the Batteries of Cannon and Mortars which began to play against Bethune on the 3d Instant, have made a continual Fire ever since; that our Bombs have done great Execution, and that the Approaches are advanced with Success.

Hull, July 29. On Thursday the 27th Instant arrived here the Advice and the N. G. h. gale from the Sound, but last from Gottemburg, having under their Convoy our Trade from thence; and also twelve Ships bound for London from other Parts. They have brought in a Dutch Dogger, which they retook from the Enemy, with ten French Men on Board.

Falmouth, July 27. Yesterday arrived the King William Packet boat in ten Days from Lisbon, Capt. Hooper Commander.

Plimouth, July 28. On the 26th sailed the St. Antonio for S. Sebastians. Yesterday arrived the Sea-horse from Torbay, with two Vessels bound for Wales. The same Day sailed the Southampton and Lizard for Falmouth, to Convoy the Tin Ships bound to London. This Day came in the Shorcham's Prize from Milford.

Dartmouth, July 28. This Day her Majesty's Ship the Jersey came in from the Eastward, and under her Convoy several Ships of and for Topsham from London: And at the same time arrived the Netty-Castle, of and from Southampton, with Timber and Planks for Plimouth, and two Coasters with Male from Chichester. Several Gallies are past by for the Westward, some bound for Ireland, and others for Falmouth.

Deal, July 30. Here are her Majesty's Ships the Lancaster and Deicia Hospital; and also the Joseph bound for Guinea; the Almeraldo Sloop for Madera; the James of Dublin, and Mary of Cork for Ostend; and the Alexander Gally for New-England.

General Post-Office, July 25. At the last Assizes held at Kingston for the County of Surrey, Elizabeth Locker was Tried on an Information exhibited against her in Her Majesty's Court of Exchequer, for ringing a Hand-Bell in the Parish of St. George's Southwark, and collecting Letters four several times for Hire, to be carried to the General Post Office, with Authority from Her Majesty's Postmaster-General, and a Verdict was given against her for twenty Pounds for such her four Offences.
