Rome, May 17. The Pope finding that by reason of his great age, it is necessary for him to make use of others for the management of publick affairs, has committed a great share of them to Cardinal Paluzzi, now Altieri, and Cardinal Patron, who has already declared his Brother, Prince of a certain Village, whereof he formerly bore the Title Merquis.

This day was perfo med the Geremony of giving Hars to the eight Cardinals, created by the late Rope, viz. de Bouglion, Porto Cartero, Cerris Pullavicino, Novi, Bowacorsi, Bona, and Acciacoli.

To morrow the Portugal Ambassador intends to make a folemn Entry, and in little time to address himself to the Pope as Ambassador of Obediences

On Monday the Pope intends to hold a Confiffory The Cardinals of the Squadron, who not only in this Conclave, but formerly opposed the exaltation of this Pope. have but little countenance given them at the Court, and many of it em are already ealed of their employments; nor does the Queen of Sweden find that extraordinary favour as in the times of the former Popes.

Warfaw, May 18. His Majesty has lately informed the Elector of Brandenbourg, that he intends about the end of July to receive his Homage for Lawenbourg and Bitam.

The Crowns Army defigns about the end of this month to draw towards Lemberg, to whom his Majesty has difpatched some Deputies to assure them in the name of the King and of the Common-wealth, that care will be juddenly taken for the payment of their arrears, to their facis action His Majesty has not omitted any thing that in prudence could be done for the reconcilement of the diffatisfied part of the Nobility, by representing to them the true state of the affairs of that Common-weal, and the great dangers into which the whole Kingdom must necessarily be involved, should they still persevere in their opposition to his Government, which has had such happy Ess. cts, that the Archbishop of Gnes o has began to show his inclinations to submit himself, and the Great Chancellor of the Crown is thinking alto of reconciling himself to His Majesty, and many others are following these good Examples.
