**T**HE King and Court continue in this City. Last Thursday Evening the Margrave Albert's Lady was delivered of a Prince. The Prince Royal has been these three Days indisposed; but this Day he waited on the King, and thanked his Majesty for a Present which his Majesty sent him. Yesterday being his Birth-day, in which he enters on the twenty third Year of his Age, his Indisposition hindered him from receiving the Compliments of any, except those of his own Court. The Prince-Royal was this Day delivered of a young Prince, to the great Joy of the King and the whole Court. The Prince-Royal sent his Majesty the first News of it by the Baron Leben, and immediately his Majesty went to the Prince's-Royal's Apartment, and being returned from thence to his own, has already received the Compliments from all the Foreign Ministers, and the Cannon are now firing round the Ramparts, the Bells are ringing, with all other Demonstrations of Joy. 'Tis already resolv'd this Prince shall be only styled Prince of Prussia, and not Prince of Orange. The News from the Frontiers of Pomerania in Prussia continue to bring us Accounts of the ravage the Plague makes in those Parts. In the mean time the strictest Care is taken here to prevent its approach to this City, no one being permitted to come into the Town, even in his way to Holland or Hamburg, without a sufficient Passport or Attestation, that there is no danger of the Infection. This Morning the Grand Chambellan was carried in a Chair to the King's Apartment, to wait upon his Majesty, being the first time he has been Abroad since his late dangerous Sickness. Monsieur Raatzau hath not yet had his Publick Audience, the King being inclin'd to admit him to it in the Country. The Elector of Hanover hath order'd his Ministers to acquaint this Court, that he is very ready to enter into Measures with his Prussian Majesty, and the rest of the Allies, for the Security and Neutrality of the Empire, as far as it regards the War of the North. Letters from Warsaw of the 6th Instant say, that ten Muscovite Regiments which were assembled near that City, in order to March towards the Frontiers of Pomerania, were countermanded, and are to remain near Bhoia, upon the Advice from Constantinople, that the Grand Visier was deposed, which makes it feared that a Rupture with the Muscovites may ensue; especially since the Sultan hath forbid the Envoys of Muscovy and Poland to hold any Conferences, or to write to their Masters. Advices from Riga of the same Date say, that the Muscovites had abandoned the Fortrefs of Bichow to the Saporas. They write from Lublin of the 4th, that the Diet of that Province had accepted of the Decrees of the Diet of Warsaw; but had deputed some of their Members to wait on the King, and to insist upon the Muscovites Evacuation of the Kingdom.

*From the Camp at Viller-Brulin, August 18. N. S.* According to the Accounts we have from the Siege, our Approaches are somewhat retarded by the continuance of the Rains. The Disposition was made for passing the last Ditch on General Schuylenburg's side on Saturday Night, and for attacking the Counterscarp the next Morning. By Break of Day one Bridge was finished, but it was then found impracticable to carry the other four above half way over the Ditch, which in some Places is fifty, and in others forty Paces broad, so that they were oblig'd to

defer the Execution of the Disposition till this Night. At General Fagel's Attack we have twelve Saps, all advanced within few Paces of the Palisades, and some of them so near, that we were beginning to turn them along the Cover'd-way, which being flanked by a detached Ravelin on the Left of the Attack, we began yesterday to batter the same with sixteen pieces of Cannon; and this Night we shall make an Attack, in order to possess our selves of it, as being very necessary, both to annoy the Enemy in the Cover'd-way, while they remain there, and to facilitate the making our Lodgments afterwards. Our Army, and that of the Enemy, continue in their former Camps. The Duke of Marlborough, and the Prince of Savoy, design to go to Morrow to the Siege.

*From the Camp at Viller-Brulin, August 21. N. S.* We have an Account from the Siege, that the Disposition for the Attack on General Schuylenburg's side, was yesterday Morning executed in the manner following: Three hundred Grenadiers, with as many Fusiliers, and four hundred Workmen, marched first, sustained by four hundred Fusiliers, who had the like number of Workmen with them. We had five Bridges over the first Ditch, two of which did not succeed so well as was expected; but our Men got over the others, and marched on to the Counterscarp, out of which they soon drove the Enemy, and made two good Lodgments on the Saliant Angles of the Counterscarp, with Communications to the Bridges, which Lodgments we suppose were joined last Night. At General Fagel's Attack our Mines have met with the Enemy's principal Gallery that leads to their Mines before the Saliant Angle of the Ravelin, which covers the Gate of Arras, and beat the Enemy out of it. They have likewise opened a Sap, which makes a Lodgment on the saliant Angle of the said Ravelin, which they are enlarging and running along the Palisades. The Marschal de Villars having sent a considerable Detachment of Troops to St. Omer, Lieutenant General Ross was order'd to March yesterday Morning with twenty one Squadrons and nine Battalions, and encamped at Hedigneul, between our Army and that of the Siege, where he will be in readiness to observe the Enemy's Movions, and join with the Troops of the Siege, in order to prevent or oppose any Attempt that may be made to give us Disturbance.

*Brussels, August 23. N. S.* On the 19th Instant the Partisan du Moulin with a strong Party of Dragoons presented themselves before Louvian: They attempted to force one of the Gates, but without Success, the Burghers immediately taking Arms, marched out of the Town, and drove them into the Woods: Of the Enemy's Dragoons several were killed and wounded; but they carried off all the Horses they found in the Neighbourhood of the Town. Upon this second Insult, the Detachment of two hundred and fifty Men, who were lately sent thither from Louvain, were immediately returned to their former Garrison; and two hundred Dragoons are on their March from the Army to reinforce this Garrison, and to disperse the Enemy's Parties which infest this Neighbourhood. The Victory obtained on the 27th of the last Month by his Catholick Majesty in Catalonia, is confirm'd from all Parts. Letters from Spain of the 4th Instant say, that the Duke of Anjou was encamp'd on the second under the Cannon of Lerida. The Enemy diminish their Loss to six hundred killed on the Spot, besides the wounded; but private Letters make the Slaughter much greater. A Courier is daily expected here with the

Particulars by the way of Genoa. Letters from Bethune say that on the 20th, at Break of Day, the Besiegers carried the Counterscarp at General Schuylenburg's Attack by Assault, and lodged themselves on the two Salient Angles and in the place of Arms on the Cover'd way. The Besieged only remaining Masters of some Traverses in the Cover'd way. Lieutenant-General Merodi arrived here on the 17th Instant from Spaw, having received great Benefit by the Waters, and on the 19th he proceeded to the Army. Mr. Cardonell is so well recovered, that he is arrived at Ghent, where he will continue till his Health be perfectly restored.

**Hague, August 22. N. S.** Since the arrival of the last Courier who was sent to this Place by the Marquis de Visconti, Great Chancellor of Milan, we have not received any fresher Advices from Catalonia of the Victory obtained by his Catholick Majesty on the 17th of the last Month over the Enemy's Horse near Alincera. In the mean time the Letters from Paris and Madrid, which arrived this Morning, do not only confess, that the Advantage was on our side; but grant that their Loss was very considerable, though they will not allow it to be so great as it hath been published here. The same Letters confirm, that the Duke of Anjou hath been obliged to retire with his Army under the Cannon of Lerida; and that his Catholick Majesty was advanced within five Miles of that City, extending his Forces with their Right at Tamarit, and their Left towards the Noguera; and that he was making Dispositions to march upon the Enemy, and to attack them a second time. The States of Holland and Westfriesland having disposed of several Places that were vacant in the Military List, and regulated their Domestick Affairs, will conclude this Session to Morrow, and it is probable that they will not be re-assembled before the 15th of the next Month. The Lord Townshend, the Baron de Bothmar, the Count de Weithem, and the Baron de Gerford, have had several Conferences concerning the Neutrality between the Northern Crowns, which is to be observed in the Empire. The Envoy of the Canton of Bern, who hath resided here since the beginning of the Negotiations with France, having received Orders to return, since that Treaty proved ineffectual, had his Audience of Leave of the States-General on the 18th Instant, and began his Journey for Berne on the 20th. The pretended Prophets that were banished from Rotterdam, being come hither to exercise their Delusions, they have been laid under an Arrest; and it is probable they will meet with no better Reception here than in other Places. The Regiments that are in Garrisons along the Meuse have received Orders to be ready to march upon the first Notice. Our Advices from the Low Countries say, that the Partisan du Moulin had made a second attempt to surprize Louvain, that he might avenge himself on the Burghers for the disappointment of his last Enterprize; but this succeeded no better than his first Design: The Magistrates being advised of his coming, did not only shut the Barriers, and fire up on him from the Ramparts as he approached, but made a Sally with more than six hundred Men, and pushed him to the Wood of St. Mortel, where they discharged several Volleyes on both sides. The Burghers lost only one Man in this Action, besides five who were wounded; but killed and wounded several of the Enemy. This Morning a Courier from the Army before Bethune brought us Advice, that on the 20th in the Morning we attacked the Counterscarp at General Schuylenburg's Attack, and carried it Sword in Hand, after an obstinate Resistance, and we speedily expect the News of the Surrender of the Town.

**King'sale, August 8.** On the 5th Instant sailed the Adventure Janipour, Thomas Sparrow Master, and the Expedient Transport, Cyprian Hughes Master, with 500 French Prisoners for St. Nialo. Yesterday came into this Port from cruising her Majesty's Ship the Hastings, Capt. Paul Commander, and brought in with her two Prizes, viz. The

Happy Entrance of Nanzi, burthen three hundred Tons, and the Happy Return of Rochell, carrying eighty Tons, both laden with S.I. Here are her Majesty's Ships the Hampshire, Hastings, Seaford and Wolf Sloop.

**Lisbon, August 13.** Yesterday sailed to the Eastward a Dutch Man of War with three Prizes, and five tall more for Holland, and four Hoys for Poole, &c.

**Lisbon, August 14.** Yesterday came into our Road a Fleet of Merchant Ships from the East Country, but lost from Humber, under Convoy of two of her Majesty's Ships, bound for London, and are now here waiting a fair Wind. This Day passed through our Road divers light Colliers from the Southward for Newcastle.
