Turin, August 4. N. S.

ON the 2d Instant their Royal Highnesses removed to St. George for the Benefit of the Air. And twice from the Camp of Fogliosa of yesterday. On the 31st of the last Month three hundred Grenadiers attacked the Fortrets of Castell, which lies near Serena, under the Mountains of Maurin, and after a short Resistance obliged the Garrison to surrender themselves Prisoners of War. Count Thaurin hath cut off the Communication between Tournos and Vars, and the Marquis d'Andorno hath passed the Mountains of Agazilo, and advanced as far as Seillac into Dauphiné; but the Enemy have so strongly fortified themselves in the Camp at Tournos, that it is thought impregnable, and the Fortrets of Vars will prevent our March to the Camp at Guillestre. General Rhebinder hath passed Mont Genevre with his Forces, in order to act in concert with Count Tournos; and last Night a Council of War was to be held at Fogliosa, where the Marquis d'Andorno and General Rhebinder were expected, to consult about the further Operations of the Campaign.

Venice, August 9. N. S. Last Saturday the Senate ratified the Treaty of Accommodation between the Pope and this Republick, and ordered the Darania to be opened. The Abbot Gasparini hath also delivered in his Credentials, and been received as Intermuncio from the Court of Rome. The Magistrates have sent Commissaries to the Frontiers, to examine all Persons that come from Hungary or Poland, whether they have passed through any Places infected with the Plague, and unless they are fully satisfied that they are free from the Contagion, they are commanded not to permit any Travellers to enter our Territories. The like Precautions are taken in regard to all Packets and Letters that are sent hither from those Kingdoms. A Sloop called the Dolphin is arrived here with Sugar from Lisbon; she came in Company with the Brice Galley, which was taken on the Coast of Malta by the Phoenix Privateer, commanded by Captain l'Aigle, who hath been a long time cruising near that Island: She hath fifty six large Guns and forty two Oars, with five hundred Men, and by reason of her Strength and Swiftness, doth a great prejudice to the Levant Trade. The Knights of Malta give all possible Assistance to the French, as being supplied with Provisions, and all other Necessaries from Sicily. Letters from Rome of the 2d Instant say, that the Pope hath given Orders that Prayers be offered up in all the Churches and Convents, and in their Ordinary Devotions, during three Days, to invoke a Blessing on a great Design his Holiness hath resolved to execute, which is as yet a Secret. These Letters add, that the Pope hath received a Letter from the Cardinal Bouillon, wherein he notifies his Departure from France, the Reasons for his late Conduct, and his Resolution to employ the remainder of his Life in a Religi-

ous Exercise of his Duty. The Cardinal is highly esteemed at Rome, and will be very well received at the Court. Letters from Naples say, that two Men of War, one English, and the other Dutch, had brought into that Port a French Prize valued at twelve thousand Crowns, and waited to Convey some Troops and Horses that were speedily to be transported to Catalonia. Cardinal Grimani hath commanded four Companies of Imperialists to be embarked at Reggio, who are to reinforce the Garrisons of Orbitello and Piombino in Tuscany. We have received Advice of the March of the Regiments of Daun and Vaubonne through the Bolognese.

Cork, August 13. Yesterday came in the Frederick Augustus of Sleswick, but last from Cadiz, laden with Wine and Salt. At the same time arrived the Mary of this Port, laden with Salt, Oil and Fruit.

Cowes, August 16. The Duke and Dutchess of Bolton landed here this Morning. Captain de Vire, Commander of a Dutch Ship lately arrived from Gibraltar, reports that eleven Days ago he left that Place, at which time the Garrison was in Health, and enjoyed a perfect Tranquillity. The Transports are still here. This Evening there were great Rejoicings at the Camp for the good News of the Victory in Spain. The Review of the Troops is deferred till Friday.

Falmouth, August 17. On the 15th Instant her Majesty's Ships the Southampton and Lizard put in here, with eighty Sail for Milford, Swazzy and Ireland.

Plimouth, August 18. The 16th Instant came in the York and Mounague from Torbay, with the Berinice-Galley bound for the Madetas, and the John and Mary from Guernsey with Salt for this Place. Yesterday came in the Dolphin Galley from Falmouth, bound for Ireland.

Dartmouth, August 18. Yesterday sailed from Torbay a Dutch Man of War with some Prizes, taken by the Dutch Privateers, which came up from Plimouth and Falmouth; some Merchant-ships with Pack Goods from Topsham, all bound for Holland, sailed under her Convoy. This Day came in here the Fortune of and from Youghall. Robert Russell Commander, laden with Butter for Olfend. Sailed hence the Mountbom Galley of this Place, Joseph Guard Master, for Topsham.

Yarmouth, August 18. Yesterday sailed her Majesty's Ships the Advice and Nighingale with the East County Fleet under their Convoy to the Southward. At the same time passed through this Road a Fleet of laden Colliers from Newcastle. Divers light Colliers are come in from the Southward, and are waiting a fair Wind.

Portsmouth, August 20. On the 17th Instant in the Afternoon Admiral Aymer, on Board the Royal Sovereign, and Sir John Jennings on Board the Royal Anne, with the Torbay, Russell, Newark and Phoenix Fireship arrived at Spithead, but last from Torbay. On the 18th her Majesty's Ship the Southsea-Castle brought in here a Danish Merchantman, on Suspicion, carrying twenty eight Guns.
