Copenhagen, September 2. N. S. Admiral Guldenleuw's Fleet is Rill on the Coast of this Island; we have some nesh Reports, that the Swadish Flact is at Sea, but the last Letters from Sweden make no mention of it. Vice-Admiral Barfoot is returned hither with three Ships, having left the rest of his Squadron in the Categor. foon to fell again, and join the Fleet of Admiral Guidenleaw, which, it is thought, will fail feen after. Upon the 31st past in the Evening, a Holland Fleet of forty feil of Ma chant-men arrived in the Sound, under the Convoy of tour Mea of War. On the 1st Instant in the Morning a British Convoy of two Men of War came into the Sound with about twenty four Merchant-nien. Anather Convoy of a Man of War put into Gottenburg, with about twenty fail of Merchant-men.

From the Camp before Aire, September 4. N. S. On Tuesday the 2d Instant our two Armies marched, and oncamped with the Right at Etiée Blanche on the Laquettes a small River that falls into the Lys at Aire, and the lete at Divion on the Lave; the Duke of Mariborough having his Quarters at the Castle of Liers. Yesterday a Detachment of two thousand Foot was ordered to March, and possess themselves of the Passages that lead to Aire on this side the Lys; in the doing of which they surprized two or the Enemy's Posts very near the Town, one as the Castle of Isbargues, where they had a Captain and a Lieutenant with leventy Men; and the other of a Captain and thirty Grenadiers, at the Village of Lambre, whom they took and fent Prisoners to the Camp. Another Detachment, of two thousand Horse and fix Battalions of Foot, marched early this Morning, with Orders to make Bridges over the Lys, at the Village of Sr. Quintin, and to block up the Town on the other fide that River; and the two Armies marched again at ten this Morning, and are encamped with the Right at Teremenne, and the Left at Liller; the Troops that were employed in the Siege of Bethune, and thoic commanded by Lieu enant. General
