## Barnstaple May 29.

Efferday arrived here the Orange-tree of this Port with Wooll from Dublin. The Sea-Flower of this Portladen with Pays, Lead and Shot may fail with the fift wind, as may in few days a new vessel of this Harbor on her first voyage for Beston in New-England.

Naples, May 13. The Vicetoy lately ordered 150 men who escaped to land about three months fince from a Gally which was caft away about Cape St Mary neer Otranto to be sent aboard the Gallies belonging to this kingdom, supposing the said Gally to have belonged to the Turks, but the men finding their danger of being condemned to the Gallies, made their application to the Venetian Refident, affirming that the Gally which perifit, belonged to the Heirs of the late Chevalier Vitali, and that they were all of them Christians and Subjects to the Republick of Venice; upon the Refidents information, the Viceroy was pleased to give a countermand to his former Order, and fet them all at liberty.

A Turkish Bregantine which was employed to take a view of our coasts, and to find out the most convenient places to land and plunder the Countrey, was cast away neer, Palinuro, but Twenty four of the men got to land, who are fince put on board our Gallies for the lervice of the publick.

lick. Three of the Turkith Corfairs have lately taken a thip on her paflage from Bari, bound for Brindes

Here is lately arrived an Envoye from a, people, inhabing a part of Morea, confifting of about 60 thouland fouls, who have not yet lubmitted themfelves to the obedience of the Turks, but make it their petition that fome place may be allowed them within this kingdom, to which they may transport themfelves, which the Viceroy has com<sub>11</sub> mitted to the confideration of the Regent Galietta.

The Viceroy of Sardinia, endeavors what he is able to reduce thole people, who being diffatisfy d with his Government, have inclured themselves in the Mountains where they hope to make themselves confiderable by entertaining the Banditi, and whatloever Malefactors or discontented perfors shall fly to them. He has for his greater conveniency removed from Cagliari to Saffari, to be peeter to them, the better to observe their motion, and has feised on the Matquis of Mortoleone, and Albs, with the Counts of Sedilo, Villamar, and Montalvo, who are fulpeeted to hold a correspondecy with them.

From Sicily we are told, that the Marquis Ifembaldi is lately dead at Palermo by the fail of a Balcone upon which he was flanding.

Copenbagen, May 17. His Excellency, the Earl of Effex, Ambaflador from his Majefly of Great Britain, baving the 13th inftant made his publick entry, and been conducted to the houfe appointed for the reception and entertainment of Ambaffadors, was at his alighting complimented from his Majefly, and welcomed by feveral of the Nobility, who that night fupped with his Excellency; after three days honourable entertainment upon the Kings account, His Excellency was conducted by Monfeur Parberg, one of the Senators in his Majeflies Coach preceded by thole of the Nobillty to his publick Audience; the ftreets through which he paffed being lined on both fides the way with foldiers, to the Gate of the Pallace, and within the Court were placed the Kings Guards. confifting of Reformed Officers; his Excellency coming up the ftairs, was met by Monfieur Korbitz, the Grand Marefhal of this Kingdom, who introduced him through feveral rooms, filled with the Nobility, to the prefence where the King was fitting under a Cancpy of State, attended by feveral great Officers of the kingdom, of whom he had his Audience, with the ufual ceremonies, wherein his Majefty was pleafed to return his Excellency a Compliment, thewing the double obligation he had to his Majefty of Great Britain, one in lending an Ambaffador, the other the perfon of the Eatl of Effex.

This Ceremony endeds his Excellency was from thence conducted to the Apartments of the Queen and Prince Georges to whom he made his compliments, and reurned to his house in the same flate he came.

Rome, May 17. On Sunday morning laft, the Pope Clement X. was in his Pontificals carried in much flate to St Peters Church, preceded by all his Officers with the Prelates, OG. all the Ambafladors and Ministers of forreign Princes, and the whole Colledge of Cardinals; at the Church Porch he was met by Cardinal Carlo Barbarino the chief Prieft of that Cathedral, who prefented him with the Keys of the Church, the Canons and Clergy of the Church having there the honour to kils his foot ; then entring the Church wich the acclamations and fhouts of the people, he was carried to the Altar of St. Gregory, where the Cardinals again adored him, and from whence he gave his benediction to the people, and putting on his Sacred Rober, as did alfo the Cardinals, Patriarchs and Bifhops, he was thence carried to the Apollies Altar, where Cardinal Maidalobine the chief Descon, put on him his Palliuni, after which followed a folemn Mals; which ending; the Cardinal chief Priest with two of the Canons prefented him with a Purfe wherein were 25 Giulio's in an antient Coyn, which he gave to the Cardinal Dean of St Angels for a folemn Mais ; after this, he went again to his Chair, and was carried to the great and most eminent feat and placed upon a high Throne, where an Olation was mide to him by Cardinal Barbarino; which ending, Cardinal Mai-dalchino put on him his Triple Crown The Popethen gave again his benediction to the people, and at the fame time upon a fignal giver, the Great Guns were fired, and feveral Volleys of thot given by fome Companies of Foot drawn up for that purpole 3 and the Cardinal Descott Barbarino, in the name of the whole Colledge gave the Pope his falutation ad multos annos.

The next morning the Pope held his first private Confiflory, where in a short speech he gave the Colledge thanks for choosing him to succeed in the highest Dignity. Cardinal de Retz went on Saturday last away for France 3 Monsegnior Borvist, Nephew to the Cardinal of that name is chosen by the Pope to be sent Nuncio to Cologne.

Danizig, Alay 29. The people are in moft parts of Paland full of animofities and fears: and the Nobility have in many places of the kingdom held private Councils, which tis feared may be forerunners of new troubles. Here are at prefent in this place the Palatine of Cracow, the Palaw tine of Pomeren, Prince Michael Radzewil, and the Crowns Treasurer; the Great Generals Lady is in three or four days expected here, the fering have had feven ral conferences.

Yesterday returned hither from Coningsbergh Monsteur Acacia, Bnvoye from his most Christian Majesty, his pretensions being to settle a Trade and Commerce with the Towns upon the Balthick Sea. The Vice-Chancellor of the Kingdom is luddenly expect-d here correceive the Homage of this Town in the name of the King.

Letters from Warfam tell us, that the Poles are in great apprehentions of a war with the Turks, upon intelligence lately brought them, that a confiderable body of their forces are ordered to march that way to feile upon Vorofensko, who principally Commands the Coff eks, to-fend thim in Chains to conflantinople, and to establish another Commander in his room; which done, they intended to lay frege to Camienitz. The fame Letters farther faying, that upon the receipt of this information, the King immediately diffestched Letters to the feveral Palatinates, to acquaint them with the approaching danger, to advife them to lay afide all private animolities, and to provide in time for the fecurity of themfelves and the publick, against to powerful pan energy. His Majett y is not only endeavouring to heal the diffempers within the bowels of his kingdom, but to provide alto for its feaurity from without, and is fending away his Envoyes to the Dake of Mufcouy, the Gham of Tartary, and Elector of Brandenbourgh to fettle a correspondence and right understanding with them, fo as to strengthen hinself if possible, with their friendship.

The King has earneftly preffed the Queens Coronation, which he defires may be celebrated at  $War \int aw$  on his Goronation day in *June* next, to avoid much unnereffary trouble and expence, but nothing is yet refolved in this point.

From Lunenbourg we are told that the Dake of Brun [wick Walfembusel having lent one of his Officers to take policifion of the Caffie of Regenstein, which was lately confilcated upon the confpiracy of the Count de Tattenbach, The Bloctor of Brandenbourg who also puts in his claim so the lame place and territory, cauled this Officer to be feiled and carried away prifoner to be fecured within fome Lalle in his own Dominions, of which the Duke of Brunfwick having intelligence, fent out a party to his refcue, who forced the prifon and delivered him. This procedure of the Dutes has been foill referred by the Elector of Brandenbourg, that he immediately fent to tell the Dake, that anlefs the Officer were teturned to the prifon from whence the was taken, he should be obliged to take his own fatisfa- | stion by a like hostility upon fome part of his Countrey : This meffage not being complyed with, the Elector ordered Six thouland men immediately to march towards the frontiers of Lunenbourg. The Dukes of Lunenbourg are feid to have an equal force in readinels to entertain them ; to that tis feared they may fuddenly come to difpute their Titles by the fword, if the interpolations of fome of the neighbour Princes prevent them not.

From Vienna is faid that His Imperial Msjefly ha<sup>s</sup> noryer fully recovered himfelf of his Ague, nor is yet neutroid from his journey of Devotion or Pilgrimige ro our Lady of Zeel.

We are also told that the diffurbances of Hungary are as much if not more formidable now then formerly, the aumbers of the Revolters increasing, to that the Prince Ragotsky is at the head of a great and powerful Ar $my_{n-1}$ .

Tis believed the Emperor intends to deal feverely with the Count de Tattenbach, and the Marquis de Franchipani, in where behalf he will not bestken to any intercefilon. But he feems to be more inclinable to favour the Count Scrini, in confideration of the neernels of blood between him and Prince Ragotiky, which may oblige the latter to bearken the more eafily to fome reafonable Overcures for an accommodation.

Hague, June 5. Sines the Prince of Oranges admilfion into the Council of State, he has received the Comlements of most of the Publick Ministers and perfons of guality, and continues to be daily prefere at the Assemlites of the Council.

Monfieur de Pompone the French Ambassidor, and the Heer de Opdam the States Envoy to, His most Christian Maj. ity are returned hither, the latter has given the States an account of his Reception.

Parts, June 4. On Sunday next his most Christian Majefty is expected here from his progress to the Netherlands.

We have by feveral Letters the news of the death of Ferdinand the II. Great Duke of Florence, who dyed on the 24th patt about three in the moining, in the 59th year of his age, his diffemper was a Drophe in his breaft, which concluded with an Apoplexy.

Paris, June 7. From Arles in the County of Roufillon they write, that the Count de Chamilly has drawn to great a force together against the Miqueless. that he has forced them to leave the lower part of the Country, and to retreat to their faitness in the Mourvains ; and that the fait Count was marched to Arles and was taking a view of all the Countrey about it, and making choice of several places between the Town and the Mountains; to shut up all passages by building of convenient Forts.

The A iquelets have left leveral of their company behind them, who are kept prifoners, and are to have their Procels made by leveral Judges of the Soveraign Council of Perpignan, whom the Count has lent for for the fame parpole, intending that a levere punifhment shall be inflicted on them for a terror to the reft.

The Count intends as foon as he has feeled this Countrey in peace, and provided for its tecurity for the future, to obey the Orders he lately received from the Court, and to march with his forces towards *Languedoc* to purfue thole Countrey people who were guilty of the late infurrections, and are fince retired into the Mountains of *Vivarets*, having been to highly infolent, that when leveral Gentleman their Lords had for demonstration of their obedience to the King, remonstrated to them the heynounfees of their evine in taking Arms, and ufed leveral arguments to perwith fo ill an entertainment, that the people immediately fell upon them, as friends to the new Customers, and killed feveral of them, plundering and burning their houles.

His Majesty has lately sent several new Edicts to the Parliament of *Paris*, to be communicated to such Commissioners of the body as shall be nomminated for that purpose, which said Edicts are to be Verified and Regiitred in few days without the formality of a Remonstrance.

His Majefty intends to keep the Feaft of Corpus Chrifti at Beauvais, and on Friday or Saturday to be at his Camp neer St Germains to take a view thereof, having before hand fent his Orders to Monficur de Louvoy to enlarge the Camp, fo as to be capable with eale to receive thole forces which his Majefty intends shall be drawn thithet to encamp for this Summer.

A confiderable part of the Cavaly which attended his Msjefty in his progress is to be sent to Quarter upon the front ers of Lorrain.
