*Turin, August 23. N. S.*

**T**HEIR Royal Highnesses continue to take the benefit of the Country Air, for the perfect Re-establishment of their Health. On the 18th of this Month they lay at Count Mazin's Castle, and returned the next Day to St. George, where they are to continue for some time, finding much Relief from the Air of that Place. The King of Spain's Adjutant, who brought hither an Account of the Victory obtained by his Catholick Majesty's Arms on the 27th of the last Month, returned yesterday towards Catalonia. His Royal Highness's Cavalry continues still at Cavour, only one Regiment of Dragoons is encamped at Pro-falco; that of the Emperor is at present at Vigon, where Vaubonne's Regiment of Dragoons is likewise arrived, but Vitconti's Imperial Regiment is at Tirca. Letters from the Army advise, that on the 10th, 11th and 12th Instant the Troops were busied in relieving the several Posts; and forasmuch as the Enemy was found to be too advantageously situated to be attacked in their Camp; that Forage and Provisions was grown scarce; and that the Snow and Cold Weather began to be very troublesome in those naked Mountains, Marshal Thauu resolved to send a strong Detachment to Baron Rhebinder at Oulx, to enable him to penetrate into the Enemy's Country at some other Place. That Detachment, consisting of ten Battallions, under the Command of the Marquis d'Andorno, marched accordingly on the 12th. The Army, the better to favour and cover this Movement, continued in their Camp at Fogliosa that Day and the next. The 14th they marched in sight of the Enemy, and advanced towards the Vally of Sturz, having first blown up the Forts of Arche and Castelet. The Baron de Schulembourg joined the Army in their March with his own Troops, and some other Detachments. They encamped that Night at Argentiere, the 15th at Simbuc, and the 16th at Demont, where they continued the 17th, Count Thauu's Quarters being at Caraglio. During their stay there the Marquis d'Andorno sent Word that he arrived at Abriez on the 14th, with the ten Battallions under his Command, and that he had been to view the Enemy's Posts on the side of Molires. The 18th the Army marched towards Caraglio, where it arrived the same Day. On the 19th, early in the Morning, they continued their March, and arrived in the Afternoon at Castiglione, where they were informed

that the Marquis d'Andorno had joined the Baron de Rhebinder on the 17th at Oulx. The 20th the Army encamp'd at Carda on the Po, from whence it continued its March by P gene-rol towards Fenestrelles, in order to try if any thing might be undertaken on that side. General Thauu marched before the Army with a Detachment towards Susa, that he might be the better able to dispose every thing for the Execution of his Designs. Letters from the Frontiers advise, that the Duke of Berwick being informed of the new Movements our Army had made, had detached ten Battallions for a Reinforcement of the Troops that guarded the Heights of Briaccon, and the Pals of Valoire, and had likewise made another Detachment into the Vally of Queiras, to join the Troops, that were posted in the Plains; and that having sent ten Battallions towards the Vally of Barcelonetta, for the Security of Provence on that side, he continued near Tournes and Guillestre. Our last Letters from Catalonia tell us, that several Places in Arragon had surrendered to his Catholick Majesty, and that the Duke of Anjou was preparing to pass the Cinca at Fraga, in order to cover the rest of that Province.

*Whitehaven, September 3.* Yesterday arrived here the William and Grace of this Port, Henry Wood Master from South Carolina, in six Weeks. He came away in Company with the Friends Adventure, Captain Michael Cole Commander, and reports, that about three Weeks before they sailed the Governor Colonel Dent died; that two Ships with Palatines were arrived there, commanded by Hunt and Belcher; and that the Friends Adventure is gone North about towards London, having parted with her just before she made Land.

*Falmouth, September 4.* On the 2d Instant in the Evening arrived the King William Packet-boat, in fifteen Days from Lisbon, Captain Hooper Commander. This Day put in the Diamond Dogger of and for Zurickzee, from Rochel.

*Cowes, September 6.* Last Night came in here two Ostend Privateers, the Juffrow Jacob, John Lenderts Commander, and the Bonadventure, Anthony le Fevre Commander, of four Guns each, which have been cruising in the Bay of Biscay six Weeks, and have taken four French Barks laden with Salt, whom they ransomed. There is also come in the Juffrow Magdelen of Lubeck, Reynold Ponder Master, bound for Rochel.

*Portsmouth*

*Portsmouth, September 7.* Yesterday her Majesty's Ship the Southsea-Castle arrived from cruising. The same Day the Torbay and Pearl sailed out of the Harbour; the latter sailed directly to Southampton River. There are at Spithead her Majesty's Ships the Torbay, Russell, Angelsea, Southsea-Castle, Foway and Phoenix Fireship.

*Deal, September 7.* Yesterday in the Afternoon came in Commodore Cornwall in her Majesty's Ship the Burford, with the Lancaster, Norfolk, Antelope, Tilbury, St. Albans, Salisbury's Prize, Reserve and Cruiser. Last Night came in her Majesty's Ship the Mary Galley. This Morning her Majesty's Ships the Royal Sovereign and Royal Anne sailed towards the River; and the Antelope, Poole and Sorlings to the Westward. Here remain her Majesty's Ships the Yarmouth, August, Woolwich, Kingston, Pembroke, Portsmouth, and Shoreham's Prize, with several Outward-bound Merchantmen, Colliers and Coasters.

*There are Two Mails due from Holland.*

*Whereas the following Agreement hath been made with the Court of France, for the Security of the Fishing Boats of both Nations, viz.*

*"That from and after the 15th Day of this present Month of September, all Fisher Boats, of both Sides; that shall catch Herrings, Mackarel, Oysters, Lobsters, and all sorts of flat and fresh Fish, as also such Vessels as shall pass to and fro to buy and carry the Fish to Market, shall not be molested, from the Orcaades, round the Coast of Great Britain and Ireland, the Islands of Guernsey and Jersey included, and from the Height of Ostend to Bayonne; but that if any Fisher Boats be found with Salt or Barrels, or any salted Fish of both Sides, and taken, they shall be made lawful Prizes.*

*The Right Honourable the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, &c. do hereby strictly Charge and Require all Captains and Commanders of Her Majesty's Ships and Vessels, as also all Persons who now have, or shall have private Commissions or Letters of Marque, not to molest any of the Fishing Vessels belonging to the Subjects of France, within the Limitations before-mentioned, as they will answer the contrary at their Peril.*

*Whereas since the Agreement made with the Court of France for the Security of the Fishing Boats of both Nations, of which Notice was given in the Gazette of the 10th of May, 1708, several Fishing Boats belonging to Her Majesty's Subjects have been seized or plundered by French Privateers and other Vessels belonging to the Enemy: All Persons concerned in Fishing Boats, who have suffered by the Violation of that Agreement, are hereby required to bring or transmit to the Office of Her Majesty's Commissioners for Sick and Wounded Seamen and Exchange of Prisoners, in Prince's Court, Westminster, particular Accounts of their respective Losses and Damages, together with what Proofs they can make of the Time and Place of Capture; and by whom taken, as also the Value of the Fish, Boats, Tackle, and other things which they have lost, that Satisfaction may be demanded for their Losses. The said Accounts, to be so brought or transmitted, before the first Day of December next ensuing.*
